Assignment Directions:

- 1) Reread "How to Tell a True War Story" and note how O'Brien uses stylistic elements to convey meaning. Pay particular attention to motifs/patterns of imagery, contrasts/juxtaposition, metafictional narration, symbolism, irony, and paradoxes.
- 2) Read and annotate Steven Kaplan's article "The Undying Uncertainty of the Narrator in Tim O'Brien's *The Things They Carried,*" making connections to the chapter "How to Tell a True War Story".
- 3) Write three interpretive style questions based on the chapter and your notes. Respond to your questions in writing with analysis and textual evidence to support your claims.

Use *at least* two of the following question stems for your 3 questions. You will use these questions during our class Socratic Seminar.
