A framework is a real or conceptual structure intended to serve as a support or guide for the building of something.

 - b. Confrontation: makes the readers care about finishing the story by throwing obstacles at the characters.
 - c. Resolution: shows the reader why the story has a purpose and prompts them to have a long-lasting interest in the story.
