What is Concurrent Enrollment- College level courses taught in your local high school classroom. You receive college and high school credit at the same time. They are taught by qualified high school teachers who are adjunct professors through the university. Concurrent enrollment is the first step to creating a permanent college transcript. It is the gateway to your college experience.

Who is eligible to take a concurrent enrollment class:

- ✓ Utah high school students
- ✓ Homeschooled students must be enrolled at their local high school
 - Students without an accredited high school transcript showing a qualifying GPA
 - You will need to provide ACT test scores to meet basic eligibility requirements
- ✓ High School cumulative GPA 3.0 for academic courses that give general education credit
- ✓ High School cumulative GPA 2.0 for CTE courses
- ✓ Some courses may require college entrance exams (ACT) and (AP)

What costs are associated with concurrent enrollment:

- ✓ Admission to the university(If your school uses more than one university, you may have multiple admission fees)
- ✓ Registration/tuition for each concurrent enrollment course you take
- ✓ Textbooks/online ebooks
 - Admissions to Weber State require a \$30.00 **one time fee**, and you will not be asked to pay this again. Registration/tuition is \$5.00 per credit hour for every concurrent enrollment course you take. Textbooks and online books may range anywhere from 50.00-150.00.
 - Tuition questions for college courses can be discussed with your counselor or the CE office.

What is a credit hour in college:

- ✓ Each college course has a specific number of credits earned per subject. For example, Math 1050 is a 4 credit hour course, so the cost would be $5.00 \times 4 = \mathbf{20.00}$ for the class.

How many college credits can I earn each year while in high school:

- ✓ You can earn up to 30 credits a year, distributed over both semesters (e.g., 18 credits first semester, 12 credits second semester, or a combination of up to 30 credits). This is considered full-time college enrollment.

How do I enroll in a concurrent enrollment course:

- ✓ You receive information from your CTE/CE office, counselor and high school teacher each semester. Your teacher will provide you with a link to follow (see below). Deadlines for enrollment are announced by your teachers in class and in your Canvas/Google classroom. See Tami in the Lighthouse if you have questions regarding fees, admissions and registration.

Creating a permanent college transcript:

- ✓ Taking your first concurrent enrollment course generates your permanent college transcript. What that means for you:
 - Just like a high school transcript, your letter grade is posted and generates your college GPA and academic standing at the university.
 - This is a permanent record and cannot be changed.

What if I don't like the class or am not doing well in it? Dropping a course vs. Withdrawing from a course:

- **Dropping** a class within the appropriate deadline deletes the course from your college transcript, like you never took it. This deadline is generally the same day as the last day for registration/tuition due. Your teachers provide these deadlines as well as on the WSU concurrent site.
- You will need to meet with your high school counselor and see Tami in the Lighthouse to completely drop a course.
- **Withdrawing** from a course happens after the drop deadline has passed, resulting in a permanent "W" on your college transcript. This does not affect your GPA, but can have other consequences.
- To drop or withdraw from a course, meet with your high school counselor and see Tami in the Lighthouse to finalize it.

Can I take a concurrent enrollment course again if I fail it:

- ✓ Yes and No:
 - Unfortunately, students are not allowed to retake CE courses at the standard CE tuition rate. They can take it again but are required to pay full tuition. You can retake college courses when you attend the University.
 - You can retake a course that you DROP (refer to above description). However, after that you would pay the full tuition.

CE courses are taken for reduced tuition:

- ✓ With only a 15.00 fee for a three credit concurrent course as opposed to 858.00 for a three credit course at the university the savings are immeasurable.

Accommodation for Disability, IEP's and 504's

PPM 3-34 notes: "When students seek accommodation in a regularly scheduled course, they have the responsibility to make such requests at the Center for Students with Disabilities before the beginning of the quarter [semester] in which the accommodation is being requested. When a student fails to make such arrangements, interim accommodations can be made by the instructor, pending the determination of the request for a permanent accommodation." **Weber State University Concurrent Enrollment students** who have a pre-established 504 Plan or IEP may continue using the accommodations established therein during CE courses, provided that the accommodations have proven effective and are reasonable for a university level course. Faculty, staff, parents, and students may contact WSU Disability Services at any point to discuss or verify accommodations for CE classes. CE students should discuss their accommodation needs with faculty as soon as possible. Most questions or situational issues can be discussed and subsequently resolved to meet the students' needs. Students should provide faculty with written (print or email) requests of accommodations for their approved 504 or IEP plan.
