Field Studies/ Field Trips		Skate City- the skate city field trip focuses on Newton's Laws of Physics. There is an hour-long lesson taught by staff at SC. Students experiment with skates and different laws of physics. They record their learning during the lesson to bring back afterwards. Then students get lunch and an hour of free skating. The field trip connects to our force and motion unit.	History Colorado Museum- 4th grade social studies curriculum focusing on Colorado History. The museum field trip lets students explore primary sources, experience the Dust Bowl, Mining, Westward Expansion, and Native American culture in a way they cannot in the classroom. Students have assigned jobs during the field trip (reporter, historian, photojournalist, etc.) to collect information during the field trip. When returning to school, they work in groups to create a presentation of their learning.				Young Ameritowne- The field trip focuses on economics, government, and personal finance. Students work for 6 weeks to prepare for the field trip by completing the YA curriculum in class. Students learn about economics, government, and personal finance by voting for mayor and judge, applying for jobs, and keeping track of their money from their paychecks and investments. Afterwards, students complete the YA assessment to show their learning.			Plains Conservation Center Overnight Trip- Students immerse themselves in historic Colorado by exploring a Cheyenne Camp, a 1800s homestead, make their own dinner, and explore the prairie ecosystem. This learning connects to 4th grade social studies standards for Colorado History. Students show their learning by keeping a journal while on the trip and reflecting upon their learning when back at school
