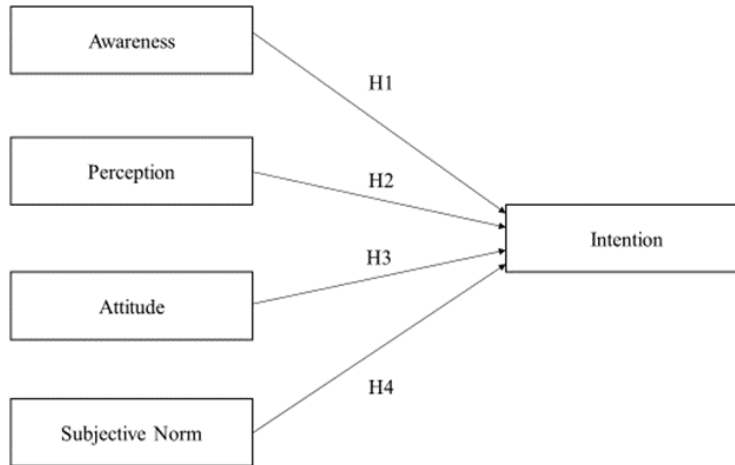


Figure 1. Conceptual Framework
