How to Write A Great Letter to the Editor:

Keep it short. Stay within the publication's rules—likely no longer than 250 words. This may seem very short, but shorter letters are the most effective. Get to the point. Also, many people will stop reading after the first paragraph, so put your best material at the top!

Tell your story. Begin the letter with a brief story about you or someone you know. People can argue with your positions, but they can't argue with your experience. Describe how this issue has affected you, your family, a coworker or a friend. Make it personal.

DON'T worry about delving policy. There is not enough room in 250 words to make a nuanced policy argument. When using facts and numbers, use only one or two, and choose the most powerful. A long string of facts and information is not an argument.

Make a call to action. End your letter with a specific call to action to your local lawmakers or community members. Your LTE will only be effective if it gets others to take action!

Sign your letter. Be sure to write your full name (and title, if relevant) and to include your address, phone number, and e-mail address. Newspapers won't print anonymous letters, though in some cases they may withhold your name on request. They may also call you to confirm that you wrote the letter before they publish it.

Get ready to submit. You should submit your letter to one paper only -- so decide which is the best choice for you. If you're looking at a very local issue, it might be your hometown paper; if it's something broader that impacts the whole state, it would likely be one of the bigger papers like the Press Herald or the Bangor Daily News.

Just press send! This might be the most difficult part of publishing a letter to the editor. All too often, we spend too much time wordsmithing and hoping the perfect combination of words will appear. The best LTEs and the ones published are the ones that are authentic, personal and have been submitted. Papers are looking for local content to feature, you've got something you care about, it's a perfect match!

Publications

Here's a list of Maine daily and prominent local weekly newspapers. Note: It is important to keep your submission within each publication's guidelines for length. Typically, newspapers reject submissions that exceed their requirements. Make sure to include your name, your town, and a telephone number. If the newspaper decides to publish your LTE they'll call you to make sure you wrote the letter. Good luck!
