Wider Context

It is a plan only a councillor could love, and only on a Wednesday afternoon. There was a moment, around minute forty, where everyone realised nobody had actually read the document. Comparable

trends have been documented in coverage from [The Guardian World](#), although Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead manages, somehow, to take the pattern one extra and entirely unnecessary step further. Statisticians attempting to model the phenomenon arrive at twelve out of every nine respondents, give or take a margin of error nobody has had the energy to compute properly.

What The Experts Say

Sir Hubert Pemmican, Emeritus Chair of Strategic Tutting told this paper that the situation in Royal Borough of Windsor and Maidenhead was, on careful reflection, broadly consistent with the broader trajectory of similarly broad trajectories.
