Use either of the two following picture walk activities to help introduce students to a new topic and activate prior knowledge before interacting with a text. The first works well with a textbook reading that has graphs & images. The second is a more general format that works well for generating ideas and predictions before interacting with a new text.

## Picture Walk – Text with Images

- 1. Guide the students to each picture, map, graph, etc. in the chapter.
- 2. Give students a few seconds to look at and analyze the picture, graph, and map.
- 3. Discuss what the picture, graph, map, etc. depicts.
- 4. Discuss what this could indicate about the content of the chapter.
- 5. Write down the predictions made by the students on a sheet of large paper.
- 6. Hang up on the wall in the room.

## Picture Walk - General

- 1. Post several pictures around the room that connect to the upcoming text.
- 2. Give students a few seconds to look at and analyze the pictures around the room. For example, have students start at one picture and rotate through the stations for a minute each.
- 3. Students should take notes about what they think each image shows.
- 4. Discuss what this could indicate about the content of the text.
- 5. Write down the predictions students make for the text on a sheet of large paper.
- 6. Hang ideas on the wall in the room. Class can revisit these after interacting with the text to see if their ideas were accurate or not.
