

Part 1: Explanation

Countable Nouns:

- You can count them (1 apple, 2 apples, 3 apples...).
- Use **many**, **few**, **a few**, **a lot of** with countable nouns.

Examples:

- How **many** apples are there?
- There are **a few** oranges.
- I have **a lot of** friends.

Uncountable Nouns:

- You **can't count** them. They often come in mass, liquid, or abstract form.
Examples: water, rice, sugar, milk, time, money, advice.
- Use **much**, **little**, **a little**, **a lot of** with uncountable nouns.

Examples:

- How **much** water do you drink?
- I have **a little** money.
- There is **a lot of** information.
