Welcome, Neighborhood Investigator

This journal asks you to study how Dory, Fish, Pike, and the people around them respond to wartime uncertainty. You will investigate the difference between luck and help, freedom and responsibility, a hiding place and a home, and hope and denial.

Central mission

Build and defend an answer to this question: Are the novel's miracles extraordinary events—or ordinary people, places, choices, and relationships seen clearly?

You Will

- Read all 22 chapters of the teacher-approved novel.
- Track changing ideas about home, family, risk, community, grief, and hope.
- Use chapter-based evidence rather than page numbers when editions differ.
- Compare the fictional setting with verified historical sources.
- Revise ideas when new evidence changes what you notice.
- Create a final product for an authentic audience.

Reading Care

The novel includes parental absence, a mother's earlier death, wartime danger, fear of family separation, housing insecurity, bullying or intimidation by an adult, grief, and uncertainty about a parent's return. You may preview sensitive sections or use an approved alternate response format.

Miracle Taxonomy	Classify events as chance, choice, community action, discovery, hope, or extraordinary coincidence.
Place Biography	Trace one location's factual history and its transformation in the novel.
Responsibility Audit	Compare the burdens carried by Dory, Fish, Pike, Pop, neighbors, and institutions.
Risk Lab	Evaluate when Dory's rule-breaking is justified, effective, reckless, or necessary.
Neighborhood Network	Model how food, information, shelter, labor, and trust move through the community.
