Marie de France. <u>Lais</u>. Durham, N.C.: The Labyrinth Press, 1978 (late twelfth century). (short narrative poems by the first major medieval woman writer)

The Quest Of The Holy Grail. London: Penguin, 1982 (c. 1225).

Wolfram von Eschenbach. Parzival. London: Penguin (early thirteenth century).

Wace and Layamon. <u>Arthurian Chronicles</u>. New York: Everyman's Library, 1962 (both pseudo-historical chronicles date from the twelfth century)
