Overview

Detailed Notes

Idea 1: to create an accelerator or an incubator for promising Haitian tech startups. We need to know how those startups can be helped and who we should meet.

[comment from Patrick Attie]

This would be a wonderful idea as we are currently working with the Ashoka network to integrate, in ESIH's curriculum, an entrepreneurship program. Also, one of our (most dynamic, leader oriented and entrepreneurial) Master level student (he created a Haitian social network called jolisjolis.com), just started to teach the Startup creation MOOC available on Udacity.com and he is doing a great job. So there are a few initiatives going on. The reality is that those will probably not be enough to create entrepreneurs. We need to induce a culture of entrepreneurship and to be able to fund those with the greatest ideas. We can try to find 5 or 6

projects that we could pre-select and submit to you before your coming to Haiti. Then we can organize an event around it (Hackathon or other). The chance is that they will not be well trained to present a great pitch, organize an efficient business plan, etc. They are generally trained to focus on the technical details, not on the big picture. So ideally, we would need to process potential candidates (6 or 7 projects as a pilot) before organizing a "final" event in haiti. The pilot would serve as a "replicable proof of concept" from which we would draw lessons to further push this at a bigger scale.

There is also an incubator initiative at Université Quisqueya that we should put in the loop. It is run by M. Bénédique Paul (benediquep@yahoo.fr), a guy who I would recommend to work with. Creating an incubator in haiti requires commitment and time. So my question to your team: are you ready to dedicate commitment and time for the "after Haiti event" period? How many hours a week can you guys dedicate to this (as your expertise is unique and can hardly find a match in Haiti)? for the pilot, we need to maximize the chance that the selected projects go all the way in the journey of creating their venture and making it work.

Also, I would like to mention the opportunities of creating a maker lab in Haiti to give the creators the possibility to design/create prototype of objects. A good make lab today costs around 15K-US\$ (look at www.makershed.com). The are today so many opportunities in the maker movement that do not limit us only to the more classic software idea and opportunities! Creating a maker lab means having someone to train 2 or 3 human ressources on the equipment (3D printer, CNC mills, laser cutting equipment, etc.) so they can redeploy the knowledge here to our students or professionals. Should we use tools like www.kickstarter.com and/or www.quirky.com. Just an idea, I think, worth exploring as this would also be the first maker lab in the Caribbean and the trend is still building critical mass in the world:-)
