Different identities within a culture have different privileges and contribute to a hierarchy of supremacy. Nationalism arises from American expansion and Manifest Destiny. Changing technology significantly impacts the course of history. 	Create Identity Collages: Have students create collages that represent their individual and collective identities, incorporating aspects such as culture, family background, interests, and beliefs. Citizenship Timeline: Task students with researching and creating timelines illustrating the evolution of citizenship rights and responsibilities in the United States, highlighting key historical events and legal changes. Nationalism Debates: Organize debates or discussions exploring the role of nationalism in shaping American identity, focusing on historical events like Manifest Destiny, the American Revolution, and contemporary issues. Economic Systems Analysis: Assign students to research and compare different economic systems and their impact on governmental structures, power distribution, and societal values. Identity Reflection Journals: Encourage students to keep reflective journals where they write about their personal experiences with identity, considering factors like ethnicity, gender, socio-economic status, and cultural background.
