Providence Academy - 3, Hope Academy - 0

The Providence Academy boys opened the season with a 3-0 win against Hope Academy. PA began the game with intensity, but struggled to settle the ball down and play on the ground through a crowded midfield. Defensively the Lions remained stout, hardly ever letting the Hope boys get an attacking chance.
