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Scholarship Advising Mission and Services

The Scholarship Advising Program supports the mission and vision of The New School in its student-centered approach, by connecting students with scholarship opportunities that further their academic and career goals.

The Scholarship Advising Program provides specialized advising for degree-seeking students to identify and apply for a number of national and international fellowships and scholarships. The Scholarship Advising team works to inform students, faculty and staff about a full range of opportunities and to help students determine which programs best meet their intellectual, professional and personal goals.

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Intro to Scholarships, Fellowships and Grants

What are scholarships, fellowships and grants?

Scholarships: These are funds you don't have to pay back offered by institutions, companies, organizations and foundations to support your education. They can be used for tuition, housing, supplies, books, transportation, travel, study abroad and more. I categorize scholarships into two initial groups: general and specific. General scholarships are those open to almost every college student, and specific majors are not required to apply. Specific scholarships are just that, specific to certain populations, fields of study, majors, experiences and skills. I encourage students to focus more time on the specific scholarships, as they will find more success applying for those; they are better candidates based on their background, experiences and interests.

Fellowships: Fellowships provide funding for education (including graduate school and beyond) and access to more opportunities like internships, study abroad, jobs and more. They are also related to professional development and last a short period of time, usually from three months to two years.

Grants: These are non-repayable funds or products provided by the government, a foundation or corporation for use towards a specific purpose, usually to fund projects, travel, and other non-tuition needs.

These are all funding sources that require an application and supporting documents, in most cases, essays and/or examples of your work, resumes, recommendation letters and academic transcripts. For grants, a proposal and budget breakdown is usually required. In the end, these are all necessary to understand who you are, why you are a strong candidate, and why the scholarship/fellowship/grant committee should choose you over all other applicants.

How to Begin to Search for Scholarships, Fellowships and Grants

Focus on scholarships that are related to your academic, career and personal goals. General, or 'generic', scholarships make it easy for almost every student to apply, which could mean thousands of students are applying for one scholarship; these are the scholarships with very few requirements, and are often offered by non-education-related

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companies. The chances that you will win a general scholarship are very small, and therefore it's not really worth too much of your time to apply to these.

I encourage you to use the following questions to self-reflect on your skills, experience, goals and dreams; you can use the answers to help focus your scholarship search.

As you are starting your funding opportunity search consider these questions in order to help you focus your search:

- What do I enjoy doing?
 - What am I passionate about?
 - What do I already have experience in? (Volunteer work, internships, jobs, projects, clubs, etc.)
 - What do I want to continue doing?
 - What do I hope to do in the future?
 - Do I plan to continue my education post-grad?
 - What resources are available to me?
 - Can my career/scholarship/academic advisor connect me with a former grant/scholarship recipient or former fellow in my area of study/interest?

Where to Find Scholarships, Fellowships and Grants

Look first for organizations, associations and foundations dedicated to students and professionals in their field of interest. They often list scholarships, fellowships and grants on their sites, and sometimes offer their own. Some examples include:

There are many scholarship search engines, some of which include [Profellow](#), [Scholly](#), [Fastweb](#), [Unigo](#) and [Cappex](#). See them more as tools and not as the only resources of information on scholarships. Good old-fashioned Google is another reliable

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tool for the scholarship search - be persistent and patient, as it can take several pages of results before you may find relevant scholarship opportunities.

Talk to your professors, colleagues and classmates, as funding opportunities can sometimes not be as well advertised or accessible for everyone to find. Religious communities, family employers, and clubs can sometimes be a good resource for educational funding as well.

How to Apply for Scholarships

My (scholarship) mantra is Apply Early & Apply Often. It's not a good idea to apply for only one scholarship per semester, and put your hopes all on that one. You can improve your chances of winning scholarship money by applying to as many scholarships as you're eligible for, and all year long. Most scholarship deadlines occur in the spring (like in April and May), as the funds are typically awarded before the start of the fall semester. Plan and apply for funding at least two semesters before! Keeping up the habit of applying makes the process much easier in the future. And, AND, you could end up repeating all of the same stuff you wrote/created for multiple applications, so easier for you in the long run.

Yay! You found some scholarships to apply to - prioritize them by level of interest and deadline, then create a to-do list and timeline for each one. There's the application deadline, yes, but work backwards from the date to plan out when you're going to work on each component of the application. Should you factor in multiple drafts of your essays? When are you going to ask that busy professor for a recommendation letter (that should be at least a month in advance, by the way)? Did you put in a calendar reminder for yourself to request an electronic copy of your transcript? Did you factor in enough time to balance school, work, personal responsibilities, and your scholarship applications?

The process really depends on the funding opportunity, but generally, most applications require a resume or CV, academic transcript, recommendation letter and, most importantly, an essay or portfolio work. Almost every scholarship

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application is required to be submitted online (though there are those strange random ones that ask for the application to be mailed to their offices!).

Don't wait to the last minute to submit your scholarship application online, as websites crash, computers break, and documents can be lost. Plan ahead and save your work on another platform, just in case.

Scholarship Payout Process

When and How Scholarship Funds Are Distributed: Scholarship payout timelines depend on the organization, foundation or company that awards them. Check with the funding organization to find out when to expect the funds from your scholarship. If you were awarded a scholarship in the spring semester, for example, you should expect to receive the funds in advance of your fall semester.

Most scholarship checks are sent directly to the institution, so the New School's Student Financial Services office would receive the funds, and apply it toward your balance. Most scholarship organizations work on the academic calendar, so that awards arrive in time for the start of the fall or spring semester.

Maintaining Institutional Scholarships

Most scholarships distributed by The New School to students when you're first admitted are renewable scholarships (for the duration of your degree up to a certain number of years or credits). In order for Financial Aid to renew a current institutional scholarship, you are expected to maintain a 3.0+ GPA (for graduate students), your current student status (full-time or part-time), and must remain within your current college (e.g. Lang students looking to transfer to Parsons might be at risk of losing their scholarship). Any changes should be communicated to your Student Success Advisor and Financial Aid

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as soon as possible, including if you're thinking about taking a leave of absence, switching from full-time to part-time status, or changing colleges.

External scholarships that can be renewed usually have their own rules for students to continue receiving scholarships from year to year. Most stipulate that you maintain a 3.0+ GPA (by checking your academic transcripts), and that the funds be used directly for educational costs (including tuition, housing, transportation, supplies, books, etc.).

Avoiding Scholarship Scams

Scholarship Scams are more common than you think. Any scholarship that asks for a student's social security number, credit card number or other personal information, is a scam. You should never have to pay to apply for scholarship (there are a few exceptions, such as competitions' and associations' fees), and a 'guaranteed' scholarship is never legitimate. Fellowships are open to students from any discipline who are interested in studying key ideas in political economy and learning how to utilize these ideas in academic and policy research

The Hispanic Scholars Fund

The Hispanic Scholarship Fund seeks to double the rate of Hispanics earning college degrees by providing a wide range of scholarship aid. The Fund supports Hispanic undergraduate students at all levels including community college students and transfer students as well as graduate students. Students must be of Hispanic heritage, be American citizens or legal permanent residents. A 3.0 GPA is required and students must plan to enroll full time in a degree seeking program. Students must also apply for federal financial aid by completing the FAFSA. The amount of the awards varies by scholarship.

Successful candidates are selected on the basis of academic achievement and financial need as well as personal strengths and leadership. Students may apply to as many scholarships for which they are eligible but may receive only one HSF scholarship per academic year.

To be selected for the Impact Entrepreneurship Graduate Fellowship, students must be committed to promoting positive change through entrepreneurship and be admitted to a participating master's program at The New School in fall 2023. Open to incoming fall 2023 graduate students in eligible programs.

Through the Smithsonian Climate Change Fellowship, the Smithsonian seeks to support five fellows as they conduct independent research in the spirit of the Smithsonian's wide-ranging research effort and in support of the Smithsonian's goals to understand and inform solutions to climate change. These fellows will be able to leverage the Smithsonian's resources, including its researchers, collections, exhibits, and data sets, to advance scientific understanding of climate change and its impacts on nature and human

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well-being. A Smithsonian Museum or research center will host fellows. Postdoctoral Fellows will receive a stipend of \$62,000 per year for 2 years. A maximum research allowance of up to \$10,000 is available for the fellowship.

Thomas R. Pickering Graduate Foreign Affairs Fellowship

The Pickering Foreign Affairs Graduate Fellowships provide full funding to graduate students as they prepare to join the U.S. Foreign Service as diplomats. Fellows are funded \$37,500 per year to help cover tuition costs first then room and board, books, mandatory fees, and travel, pending availability of funds. Graduate-level Fellows receive stipends during participation in one 10-week domestic summer internship, and one 10-week summer overseas internship following the second year of graduate school. Fellows must obtain graduate degrees in international affairs or a related subject such as public administration, public policy, international relations, business administration, economics, history, political science, communications, or foreign languages at a graduate school approved by the Pickering Program.
