Dear parents and students,

Welcome to English II! I hope you all enjoyed your summer and look forward to starting a successful year as a Cuthbertson Cavalier! Though I intend the semester will be full of excitement and discovery, I want to emphasize that learning and safety are the *most* important factors in our classroom. In order to create a safe classroom conducive to learning, the following rules, policies, and procedures will be implemented and upheld.

# **Classroom Procedures**

- 1. Students will enter the classroom without disruption or excessive noise.
- 2. Students will sit in assigned seats.
- 3. Students will copy homework assignments each day in their agenda and begin working on the daily warm-up.
- 4. Students will transition between classroom assignments and activities without talking.
- 5. Students will pack-up and exit the room only when dismissed by the teacher, not the bell.

# **Classroom Rules**

- 1. Be Pesponsible. Students must be on time. Students must be in their seats in order not to be counted tardy and avoid Lock Out. All tardies will be handled according to the tardy policy in the Cuthbertson Student Handbook.
- 2. **Be Prepared and Productive**. Students must be prepared. Students must come to class everyday with all necessary materials. Being prepared also includes prepared with information for the day's lesson. If there was reading assigned the night before, come to class prepared with annotations and questions. Maximize our learning time!
- 3. **Be Kind**. Students must be respectful to their peers, their teachers, their materials (books, desks, supplies), and themselves. **No** forms of disrespect will be tolerated. Any issues will be sent to an administrator via a discipline report.
- 4. **Be Your Best**. Students must come to class daily ready to grow as English Language Arts learners. Be positive. Students must not be disruptive. Any unnecessary disruptions will result in detentions, phone calls home, and/or office referrals. All incidences are to be handled on an individual basis and Dr. Weycker reserves the right to handle them as she deems necessary.



### **Classroom Policies**

- **1. Cheating:** All cheating results in a zero, a phone call home, and in certain cases, an office referral. This includes plagiarism and using abbreviated text in place of authentic reading (aka. Shmoop).
- **2. Daily Assignments:** Students will write down their daily assignments/homework in their agenda everyday to begin class.
- **3. Food and Drink:** Water will be allowed if disposed of properly. Water must have a lid and be in a clear container. The teacher reserves the right to cancel this policy at any time.
- **4. Late work:** Assignments are late if they are not handed in when collected by the teacher. If the student was present on the day the assignment was given and is present on the day the assignment is due, the assignment will be a zero until it is made up. If the student is present on the day the assignment is given, but absent on the due date, then the assignment is due the day the student returns. Long-term assignments (essays, projects) are due on the assigned due date unless there is an unforeseen emergency. 10 points per day will be taken off for major projects/tests/assignments up to 5 days. For late daily assignments, Dr. Weycker can assign a zero OR take off up to 30% off at teacher discretion. Students can find all missed assignments on the Daily Assignments Google Doc (Canvas).
- **5. Absences:** It is the responsibility of the student to check the Daily Assignments Google Doc for absent work. Students can access the daily plan/calendar on Canvas.
- **6. Cavalier Block:** Additional support or enrichment is available during Cavalier Block each week. Additional tutoring is offered after school every Monday afternoon or by appointment.
- **7. Grading:** Students' grades will be calculated by points:

Homework/Classwork 20-30 points Vocabulary/Grammar Work 20-30 points Quizzes 20-40 points Tests/Essays/Projects 100 points

Daybooks Formatively assessed and scored

**8. North Carolina End of Course Test:** All English II students must take the North Carolina English II End of Course Test. The student's converted exam score will count as twenty-five percent of the student's final average. Students must also have a combined final average of sixty to pass the class. In other words, to pass English II, students must perform well on the EOC, pass the teacher portion of the class, and meet the state requirement for attendance.
