- 5. **Cosset:** to treat as a pet; pamper; coddle.
- 6. **Dichotomy:** division into two parts, kinds, etc.; subdivision into halves or pairs
- 7. **Draconian:** unusually severe or cruel
- 8. **Eschew:** to abstain or keep away from; shun
- 9. **Exegesis:** critical explanation or interpretation of a text or portion of a text
- 10. **Expunge:** to strike or blot out; erase; obliterate
- 11. **Feckless:** having no sense of responsibility; indifferent; lazy
- 12. **Fecund:** producing or capable of producing offspring, fruit, etc.; prolific
