

Name of Course: U.S. History and Government

Course Overview:
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This course is typically taught to juniors at Wells High School and investigates the history and government of the United States. It allows students to recognize the events, individuals, and documents that caused the United States to function the way it presently does. Students will study cultural differences, geography, as well as political, social, and economic changes that have affected this nation.
