Headline: ACT NOW: How recent government actions threaten Michigan families, providers, and economy

Michigan has made significant progress in strengthening early childhood systems and expanding access to quality, affordable child care. But the recent actions at the state and federal levels threaten to stall or even reverse all that progress. Michigan's state budget bills have been signed into law, but in Washington, D.C., the federal government has officially shut down after failing to pass a budget for fiscal year 2026.

Every dollar invested in quality early childhood programs generates a <u>return on</u> <u>investment of up to 13%</u> by increasing school readiness, boosting high school graduation rates, and ultimately reducing poverty rates.

Decisions made in the coming days will directly impact families with young children and essential early childhood providers across our state, putting Michigan families and our economy at risk. This is in addition to the harm already being caused by not having a budget in place, forcing our early childhood network to prepare for a worst-case scenario.
