I'm SO flattered you want to write for FriEdTechnology! Please submit your posts using the guidelines below . . .

1. Topics must benefit teachers or administrators and occasionally educational technology directors.
2. Writers must be educators, not vendors. I appreciate your attention, vendor people, but right now, I am not publishing vendor articles. If you want to see if I'll try your product/tool, etc. please use the contact form on the blog. If I love it and it changes my life, I'll write about it or ask you to. Emailing me daily will not increase your chances of me liking your product. Calling me and harassing me will assure I will not like your product. Please don't. If it's great, I'll hear about it anyway. Right? Right!
3. I am the only one who gets to philosophize on FriEdTechnology.com because frankly no one wants to hear it. Bummer. I know. As a result, posts must be action based and include useful resources, documents, templates, graphics (that you make, no copyright infringement allowed except my occasional inadvertent kind of which I'm sure someone will soon notify me . . . again).
4. I prefer teachers, students, and administrators to vendors, but I do recognize that we've all got to eat. If what you "sell" is free or so incredibly cheap that anyone could afford it, go ahead and hit me up. 5. Write your post in a Google Doc and include at least one picture (for Pinteresting purposes) that is large enough to be pinned. I'd go from 800x1000 at least, but what do I know. You just don't want it to pixelate when it's pinned. An easy way to make that is by exporting a Google Presentation or Power Point slide as a .png. Again, make sure you have the rights to post the pictures. Use ones you take and instagram them or get them from a source labeled for reuse, like [here](#).

7. Check out [David Malone's guest posts](#) and notice how he did his biography at the top. I like that. Don't you?
8. There's no reason you can't post what you write on your own blog too. The whole point of this education thing we're doing is to help everyone, so anything I make is to be shared with the widest audience possible. Hopefully you feel the same way.
9. I'll probably change these directions after each submission I get to help us streamline the process, so please check back if you decide to do this later.
