1. Introduction (*Heading 1*) (bold, 12 pt)

The introduction should be clear and provide the legal issue to be discussed in the manuscript. Before the objective, the author should provide an adequate background and concise literature survey to record existing solutions, to show which is the best of previous researchers, to show what you hope to achieve (to show the limitations) and to show the scientific merit or novelties of the manuscript. Finally, you should explain the urgency of your study and state its aims. In the end, explain the speed, clearly state the aims of your study and mention the problem of the research in this section. Write the issues that are studied from your writing here. The problem must be apparent. At least one subject matter is reviewed.

2. Methode (*Heading 1*) (bold, 12 pt)

The Methods section should be written descriptively, systematically, and clearly to enable readers to understand how the research was conducted. Authors should provide a clear statement regarding the research methodology, including the type of research, research approach, data sources, data collection procedures, and data analysis methods. Authors should also explain the mechanism or steps used to analyze the research problem. To ensure clarity and consistency, the Methods section may include the following components:

1. **Research Design**

Describe the type and design of the study, such as quantitative, qualitative, mixed methods, experimental, descriptive, cross-sectional, case study, literature review, or other appropriate designs.

2. **Research Setting and Time**

Describe the location, context, and period in which the research was conducted.

3. **Population and Sample**

Explain the population, participant characteristics, sampling technique, and sample size.

4. **Data Collection Methods**

Explain the data collection procedures, such as observations, documentation, or others

5. **Research Instruments**

Explain the instruments used, such as questionnaires, observations, documentation, or other relevant instruments.

6. **Data Analysis**

Describe the analytical methods and procedures used to analyze the research problem and interpret the findings.



7. **Ethical Considerations**

Provide information regarding ethical approval, informed consent, confidentiality, and other ethical aspects of the study when applicable.

The Methods section should be concise yet sufficiently informative to allow readers to understand and potentially replicate the study. This section is optional and primarily intended for original research articles, depending on the journal policy.

3. **Results (Heading 1) (bold, 12 pt)**

Results should be clear and concise. Discussion should explore the significance of the results of the work, not repeat them. Avoid extensive citations and discussion of published literature.

Number tables consecutively by their appearance in the text. Place footnotes to tables below the table body and indicate them with superscript lowercase letters. Avoid vertical rules. Be sparing in using tables and ensure that the data presented in tables do not duplicate results described elsewhere in the article. Explain your findings here based on the result and concept or literature. The author's opinion must be clear to answer the purposes of the research.

The answer to the second question (bold, 12 pt)

Explain your findings here based on the result and concept or literature. The author's opinion must be clear to answer the purposes of the research

5. Conclusion (*Heading 1*) (bold, 12 pt)

The study's main conclusions may be presented in a short Conclusions section. The conclusion section should lead the reader to essential matters of the manuscript.

6. Reference (*Heading 1*) (bold, 12 pt)

Expect a minimum of 20 references, primarily with 80% of journal papers published between 2016 and 2026.

All of the references must be written with the single line spacing. Use a tool such as Zotero, Mendeley, or EndNote for reference management and formatting, and choose APA style 7th
