Analysis:

The Orioles have been nothing short of dreadful against left-handed pitching this season, consistently falling flat no matter who takes the mound against them. Lefty openers are breezing through the first few innings with ease, and Mitchell Parker nearly tossed a complete-game one-hit shutout on Tuesday night—a testament to just how lost Baltimore looks against southpaws. The numbers are damning: a .165/.247/.225 slash line versus lefties, which ranks 29th in MLB in OPS. Things won't get any easier as they now face one of the league's premier left-handers, a strikeout machine currently leading the majors in punchouts. On the flip side, the Nationals may not boast a powerful lineup, but the top of their order has shown signs of life this week—just enough to capitalize on a matchup like this. They'll face Cade Povich, who has struggled mightily on the road with a 1–6 career record, a bloated 6.81 ERA, and a 1.70 WHIP. Beyond the pitching woes, the Orioles have looked disengaged on a nightly basis and have become a liability in the field, lacking both effort and execution defensively. With the matchup heavily favoring the Nats' starter and Baltimore's continued struggles at the plate and in the field, this is a spot worth backing the home side. 58% of the Public likes Washington to win this one outright

Analysis:

This season, the Thunder-Grizzlies matchup has been a one-sided slugfest—think George Foreman vs. Joe Frazier, with OKC delivering every blow. Oklahoma City is a perfect 6-0 both straight-up and against the spread against Memphis, with no win coming by fewer than 13 points. A change of scenery to Memphis isn't likely to shift the balance either—OKC already won by 13 and 17 points in their two visits to FedEx Forum during the regular season. The Thunder's defensive length has completely smothered the Grizzlies' offense, which has been held under 100 points in both playoff games so far. Making matters worse for Memphis, Ja Morant is clearly not at full strength, battling through a leg injury, leaving the Grizzlies

undermanned and outgunned. What's most striking is that OKC hasn't even needed Shai Gilgeous-Alexander to dominate; he's averaging just 22 points in this series—well below the 36.3 points he averaged against Memphis in the regular season—yet the Thunder are still pulling away with ease. Back the Thunder to keep rolling. 83% of the Public is riding on the Thunder to cover the spread here.
