Introduction

Manuscript is written neatly by using Microsoft Word. The spacing is 1.5 and Times New Roman size is 12pt as the letter model. If there are verses or hadiths (Arabic writing), it should be typed using traditional Arabic, size 14 pt. The introduction contains problem background which is supported with concept, theory, and result of research from relevant and sophisticated literature sources or references. The referencing method in text should indicate clearly the name of author and source citation which are in forms of the published year and the page of the manuscript. For instance: ... the improve of human resource quality of countries in the world which had been done by UNDP (Anggraeni et al., 2022; Dilling & Vogler, 2023), Indonesia since 1995 to 2014 in fluctuating decreased and it was approximately on 104th to 123rd rank. The last was in 2015 when Indonesia was on the 110th rank (Figure 1). In the last part of the introduction, it is mentioned the objective of article writing or research scope clearly.

Research Methods



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In the Method section, you explain clearly how you conducted your research order to: (1) enable readers to evaluate the work performed and (2) permit others to replicate your research. You must describe exactly what you did: what and how experiments were run, what, how much, how often, where, when, and why equipment and materials were used. The main consideration is to ensure that enough detail is provided to verify your findings and to enable the replication of the research. You should maintain a balance between brevity (you cannot describe every technical issue) and completeness (you need to give adequate detail so that readers know what happened)

Result

Result part contains the correct and complete quantitative and/or qualitative research results of the problem that can utilize information in forms of figures/graphics/tables/explanation. They are put on the below or above part of the page to simplify the visualization. The result which is presented in this part is the “net” result. The data analysis processes such as statistical calculation and hypothesis testing do not have to be presented. Only analysis and hypothesis testing results that should be reported. Tables and graphics that can be utilized to clarify the result presentation of research verbally. Tables and graphics should be commented on or discussed. For qualitative research, the result part makes detailed parts in forms of subtopics which are related directly to the focus and categories of research.

Discussion

The discussion of research is aimed to: (1) answer the problem formulation and questions of research; (2) indicate how the findings are obtained; (3) interpret findings; (4) relate the research finding result to established knowledge structure; and (5) present new theories or modification of research, the result of research should be concluded explicitly (Miles et al., 2014). The interpretation towards finding should be done by using existing logics or theories. Reality finding in the field is connected to the result of previous research or existing theory. Referral is required to this matter. In order to present new theories and confirm or reject the old ones, some old theories are required.

Figure and Table Writing

The figure title and name inclusions are written below the figure. The Figure is written by using Times New Roman letter, size 12, and center margin. It is also numbered in its order, as provided in the below example. Meanwhile, the figure in the form of a photo is sent in high quality (1200 dpi for line art, 600 dpi for grayscale, and 300 dpi for color, at the correct size).

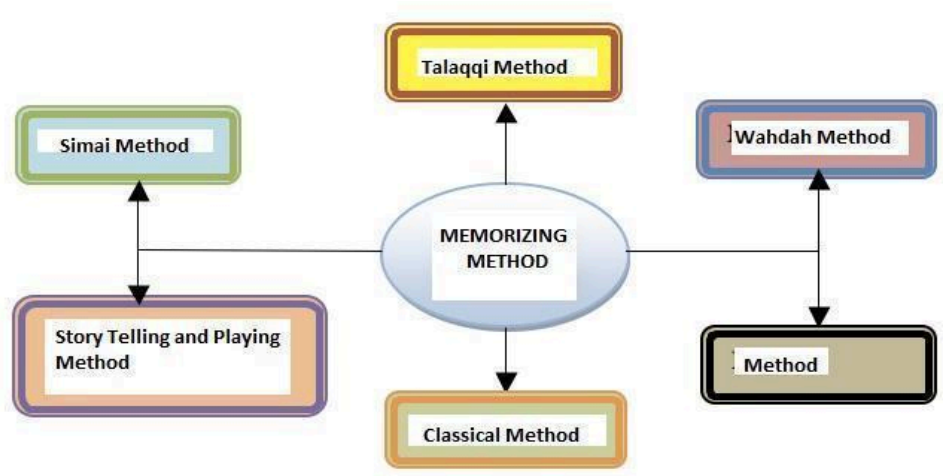

Therefore, the author is obliged to fill out the Al-Bidayah Conflict of Interest Declaration Form, and upload the form as a supplementary file at the time of submission of the article. Declaration of conflicting interest is written by using Times New Roman in font 12.

Funding contains a declaration of any funding or research grants (and their source) received in the course of study, research or assembly of the manuscript. Funding is written by using Times New Roman in font 12.

The items on the reference list must be arranged according to the American Psychological Association (APA) Style 7th Edition. Citation and reference writing must utilize reference managers Zotero/Mendeley. Footnote uses Times New Roman in font 10 and single spacing. Reference uses Times New Roman in font 12 and single spacing (before 0, after 6). References amount to at least 30 journals published in the last 10 years, at least 10 of which are from Scopus-indexed journals. The following is an example of bodynote and references
