

Premack Principle

How do you get good behavior from your dog if you don't have treats on you? What if you accidentally get too far into a situation to get your dog's focus back on you, how do you turn that into a training opportunity? Luckily, it's pretty easy with the "[Premack Principle](#)."

The Premack Principle states that you can use what your dog wants to do **right now** as a reward for what *you* want him to do. Basically, you're using "[functional rewards](#)" to get the behavior you want.

Let's say your dog wants to sniff a tree and he starts dragging you toward it. Instead of just going along for the ride, you can use this as an opportunity to reinforce loose leash walking. When he pulls, stop and wait for him to put slack in the leash and look at you. Then, praise him and reward him by going to smell the tree together. Remember to use your own enthusiasm so the dog understands that you're walking over to sniff that tree *together.*
