Marquee: Can We Have a Better Pandemic?

Led by: Wilk Wilkinson, Jay Bhattacharya

Description: What can America learn from the Covid pandemic so that we can do it better the next time? And what would that improved response look like? Stanford professor Dr. Jay Bhattacharya, co-author of the Great Barrington Declaration and one of the leading critics of the government's response to the pandemic, will take up these issues with a leader who disagrees with him in a full and free conversation. We'll discuss missed opportunities, lessons learned, and how we can have a better pandemic response in the future.

Marquee: How Can Our Elections Be More Trustworthy?

Description: What happens when you bring together an unusual and politically diverse group to discuss trustworthy elections? This extraordinary conversation, moderated by Judge Thomas B. Griffith, will dive into the recommendations of the Braver Angels "Trustworthy Elections Report," and feature responses from Americans across the political spectrum: David Becker, founder of the Center for Election Innovation and Research; Tom Cook, a pro-Trump voter concerned about election integrity; and Cheryl Clyburn Crawford, executive director of MassVote and a leader of the NAACP-Boston branch. Together, they'll take one of the most pressing questions facing America: moving forward, what can be done to ensure that Americans across the political spectrum can agree that our elections are trustworthy?

Marquee: Is the Class Divide Bigger Than the Partisan Divide?

Description: Donald Trump's election in 2016 shed light on a growing reality: many people in America's working class feel as if they have been left behind and disconnected from the rest of America. Many distrust that America's political class is looking out for working men and women. Is this growing class divide an even bigger challenge than the partisan divide? And what can be done to bridge this class divide? Batya Ungar-Sargon, author of the new book, *Second Class: How the Elites Betrayed America's Working Men and Women* and Newsweek opinion editor, discusses these issues with two leaders who see themselves as part of America's working class: Wilk Wilkinson, a red and host of Derate the Hate Podcast, and Corrie Zech, a blue and someone featured in Ungar-Sargon's book. David Lapp, co-founder of Braver Angels, will moderate this conversation.

Braver Angels Songwriting Workshop, Part 1 of 3

Braver Angels Volunteering - How to Better Recruit, Engage & Retain Volunteers

Description: The breakout session is targeted for state coordinators. Other field leaders actively involved in volunteer recruitment, engagement and retention are welcome to attend as well. The format will be a brief presentation from the Braver Volunteering initiative followed by an interactive discussion to share tips and techniques you have implemented to increase volunteerism in your area.

A Braver Campus Dialogue (ABCD): Piloting a New College Debates & Discourse Alliance Workshop

Description: Developed by the College Debates & Discourse (CD&D) team with guidance from Braver Angels co-founder Bill Doherty, this workshop draws upon elements from existing BA debate and workshop models, as well as BridgeUSA conversations. This will be a highly participatory and immersive experience in which participants delve into pressing social/political issues, explore their rich complexity, and air diverse perspectives on root causes as well as potential solutions. Rather than taking affirmative or negative stances as we do in Braver Angels debates, participants will be encouraged to grapple with open-ended questions within a solution-oriented conversation. This format is ideally suited to address the nuances of complex topics such as climate change, gender issues, and the student mental health crisis.

Braver Listening for Better Understanding: Taking the LAPP Model to the Next Level

Led by: Yael Petretti and Joel Berman (Compassionate Listening Project) **Description:** The tools that we offer can help us listen in a non-judgmental way, especially when we are not in agreement with someone. We have used this type of deep listening skill for over thirty years in different parts of the world where there is conflict. Our experience

has taught us that "re-humanizing" the other is the key to managing and resolving conflict. While this breakout session is open to anyone, it's especially recommended for those already familiar with Braver Angels' LAPP model (Listen, Acknowledge, Pivot, Perspective).

Catch 'Em Early: Seeding Braver Angels in High Schools

Led by: Sara Silver

Description: Our rationale for taking BA to high schools is to address the increasingly polarized nature of school communities across the nation. Our presentation will equip participants with the knowledge and skills: (1) to market the Braver Angels (BA) high school (HS) workshop in their communities; (2) to plan with school staff; (3) to moderate the high school workshop; (4) to train teachers to turnkey the workshop with their students; and (4) to facilitate embedding the BA habits of discourse into HS curricula.

Common Ground Workshop: Addressing Immigration

Description: This will be a demonstration Common Ground Workshop on one of the top four issues chosen by our membership to be explored at the convention. This demonstration 90 minutes workshop will bring together a small group of Reds and Blues to see where agreements can be reached on values, concerns, and solutions. Observers are welcome.

Debate: "Resolved: American capitalism promotes human flourishing."

One Small Step by StoryCorps: Conversations Across Differences

Description: This breakout brings together convention delegates with different political views for one-to-one conversations—not to debate politics, but to learn who we are as people. Participants are encouraged to share their lived experiences in order to understand the origins of their beliefs. The goal is to remind the country of the humanity in all of us, even those with whom we disagree.

Principles and Priorities: Facing the Future of Federal Budget Policy

Led by: Phil Smith (The Concord Coalition)

Description: Principles & Priorities is an interactive group budget exercise that puts us in the shoes of Congress. Participants learn and engage about US fiscal policy by attempting to build our own ten-year, economically sustainable federal budget plan. Working in groups of five to ten, we will "role-play" as members of the House of Representatives and review

current tax and spending policies, suggest priorities for the future, and apply our personal principles throughout the immersive exercise.

Putting the FUN in Fundraising: Empowering Your Alliance to Grow

Description: Grow your alliance through FUNdraising! In this breakout, learn ways to approach individuals and local businesses to fundraise for your alliance. During this fun, interactive session, learn fundraiser ideas, how to craft your fundraising pitch and get all of your Braver Angels finance questions answered.

Transgender Care: Finding Common Ground

Description: The topic of gender-affirming care for minors presents unique challenges. In this session, we will delve into international best practices, such as the recent UK NHS Cass Review recommendations, to explore common ground and discuss potential implementation in the US. Led by Zander Keig, a trans man and the Red Co-Chair of the Equality Caucus, and Jamie Reed (Blue), one of the first public whistleblowers from a pediatric gender clinic in the United States.

Why Should Reds Like Braver Angels? Perspectives from Reds

We will share our appreciation of the freedom from scorn and shaming that we have found in Braver Angels, and how that has enhanced our lives. Marquee: Can Faith Communities Help America Navigate 2024?

Description: Some people believe that faith communities have been just as much a part of the problem of polarization as they have been part of the solution. But can't faith communities both be faithful to their convictions and be forces for depolarization? In conversation with various religious leaders—including a Southern Baptist leader, an Episcopal bishop, a Jewish interfaith organizer, a Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints expert on religious pluralism, and a Catholic priest—participants will hear how faith communities can draw on their own traditions and principles to help Americans both stand for their convictions and be peacemakers amidst a polarizing election year. This session is moderated by Anne Snyder, editor-in-chief of Comment magazine.

Marquee: How Can Media Be Less of a Problem and More of a Solution?

Description: This panel will be moderated by lifelong journalist Mónica Guzmán and will feature Batya Ungar-Sargon, Deputy Opinion Editor at Newsweek, and Joy Mayer, Director of Trusting News. Together, they'll explore why the public's trust in media has been broken and how we can work to rebuild it.

Artificial Intelligence (and Algorithms): Threats, Remedies, and Governance

Description: Al and other algorithms have the potential to make the polarization of our society even worse; they also have the potential to reduce polarization, but without well-thought-out governance, negative effects are much more likely. This breakout session will focus on both threats to civil discourse caused by Al and other algorithms, and on ways governments can mitigate the threats and support applications with positive effects. The session will have three parts: first, establish a common basis for discussion with information about A+AI; hear the current perspectives of experts (including at least one AI staffer of a member of Congress) and then engage in open discussion.

Come learn why veteran Republican pollster Frank Luntz said of the Index, "It is long overdue, and no one's tried this before: it has the potential to be incredibly impactful.

A Grand Bargain: A Practical Way to Resolve America's Critical Problems

Marquee: A Gay Man and a Conservative Christian Walk Into a Culture War...

Description: During the gay marriage wars, Glenn Stanton, a senior leader at Focus on the Family, was one of America's leading advocates for traditional marriage. Jonathan Rauch, a gay man, was one of America's leading advocates for gay marriage. Then an amazing thing happened: these two ideological opponents began to talk with each other, became friends, and eventually became founding board members of an organization tackling polarization (Braver Angels). This session is moderated by David Blankenhorn, the president of Braver Angels—and a leader who, in an earlier career, found himself on both sides of the gay marriage wars, and a matchmaker to Glenn and Jonathan.

Marquee: Is it Racist to Be Colorblind?

Description: Is it racist to be colorblind? Martin Luther King Jr. called upon Americans to be judged by the content of their character and not the color of their skin. But does not seeing color also mean we blind ourselves to the racism against which King fought? Monica Harris (President of FAIR), John Wood Jr., and more confront the arguments for and against colorblindness in this exciting conversation on race in America.

America's Unfinished Work

Description: Eight Score and one years ago Abraham Lincoln made a speech at Gettysburg which was rooted in our past, relevant to his present, challenges us today, and continues to provide inspiration for us as we seek to shape America's future. Join us as we take a deep dive into Lincoln's immortal words uttered at Gettysburg, along with other speeches and documents that help trace the trajectory of America's "Unfinished Work." Last year, Braver Angels member and Gettysburg Licensed Battlefield Guide Bob Steenstra led us on tours of the battlefield. He joins us again this year to lead this presentation.

Braver Angels Songwriting Workshop, Part 3 of 3

Description: Want to learn to write songs? And then perform them? Guided by professional musicians eager to teach and inspire you? Here's your chance! Participants in the Songwriting track do not need formal musical or songwriting experience to participate, but must participate in all three breakout sessions in order for the process to work. Bringing a Debate to Your Community

Participants will leave ready to fill out the Event Request Form (ERF) and assemble a star debate team. *Please note that this breakout focuses on organizing a debate—not on serving as a debate chair.*

Common Ground Workshop: Upholding Free Speech and Challenging Hate Speech

Cultivating Student Leaders in Civil Discourse
