The problem with that is I went to a Christian school, and I got detention when my teacher found out, but I've kind of always just had an entrepreneurial spirit about me like can I charge people for this? So I have been doing copyrighting, content writing, some social media stuff for people, and it's been amazing. It's been a wild ride, but I definitely have made a lot of mistakes and learned a lot of lessons. So today, I just wanted to share those with you guys. So whether or not you are someone who works for yourself, maybe you own a business or are kicking off a brand of some sort, maybe you have ambitions and goals to do your own thing, or maybe you just work in an office or you lead a team or you're just trying to do better at work in general or build your career, or if you're a student who wants to grow and expand your knowledge, all of these lessons, I think, are applicable.

So let's get started with number one.



The first business lesson that I learned in 2021 is that community genuinely changes everything. it's not just about who you know -- let me say this, it's not just about what you know, it's also about who you know, and I don't meant that in a way of yucky networking or being slimy on Instagram and trying to get people to do favors for you, but when you genuinely seek to serve, when you genuinely seek to do things for other people that help them, that put them in a better position, when you are doing things with the goal of building community and helping other people, the relation for me has just been that that will come back to you in more ways than you might ever expect.

Community is everything, so if you're always only thinking about yourself, how you can expand opportunities for yourself, how you can make your name bigger, make yourself more famous or whatever but you're never thinking about the people around you and how you can serve them, you're not gonna go far, and you're not gonna go far fast. So community changes everything. That's the first lesson that I learned in 2021, and I could stop right that because that one has honestly been so important, but I'll keep going 'cause I told you I would!

So number two, one of my favorite people online, her name's Ashli Pollard. I took a business course from her last year, and I'm in a business group right now that she leads, but her big thing that she always says is 'it's not hard, it's new.' That really hit me when I first heard her say it because it's so true that sometimes we are hesitant to try something new because of that scary feeling of, like, I'm about to jump off this cliff and I don't know if I'm gonna make it, or just getting started on something and feeling so overwhelmed by the process or not knowing what we're doing that we back out, or having an opportunity and not taking it or not fully living in it because of our fear of messing up.

What we need to remember is that it's not hard, it's new. The first time we do something is always going to feel difficult, it's always gonna feel hard, it's always gonna feel a little uncomfortable, but guess what, after you've done something once, when you do it again, it's gonna feel a little bit better. The first time I recorded a podcast episode I was like, "Oh, my gosh, I'm shakin' in my boots, and my hands are sweating as I upload it," and now I'm how many episodes in? I don't know, 16, and I'm just rambling, dude, and it's fine. It's not hard, it's new. Don't be afraid to try new things just because of the discomfort. You need to embrace the discomfort, and, eventually, it won't feel hard anymore. Eventually, it'll feel natural if it's something that you actually are meant to be doing.

Number three, the lesson I learned, you are your greatest critic.

I promise you right now, no matter what you have coming up, no matter what you're working on, what you've got going on, what you posted on your Instagram feed, no one is gonna criticize you more than you do yourself. The reality is that most people spend most of their time thinking about and worrying about themselves and what other people think about them. So I promise you, people are not absolutely just focused on every move you make, everything you say, everything that you do. People are worried about themselves, so you need to worry a lot less about what other people think about what you're doing, right, and just move. Just do something. Don't worry all the time about your critics or about what people will think about what you're doing. if you're walking in your calling, in something that you feel passionate about, that's what counts, okay? It doesn't matter what other people think about what you're doing; what matters is that you're walking in your purpose and what you've been called to do.

Number four, not everyone needs to understand.

This is a lesson that I'm still learning, and it kind of relates to the last one about you are your greatest critic, but especially when you are starting a business, when you are kicking off a service that no one else you know offers, when you're working with clients that you've never worked with before, not everyone needs to understand what you do. I don't know if you've ever tried to explain to your parents what your job is, but I find that it's difficult sometimes to explain exactly what my job is and how it relates with, like, email marketing and social media and how all those things connect together, because they're just from a different generation, so it's a little bit hard for them to understand, but that's okay. Just because the other people in your life don't understand what you do does not mean that what you do isn't important or that it doesn't matter. Not everyone needs to understand. Same as what I said on point number three. If you are walking in your giftings, your calling, your purpose, not everyone needs to understand what your calling, your purpose is.

You just need to understand it, believe in it, have a direction, and go after it.

Number five, know your "why." If you are going to start a business, if you're gonna try to grow a brand, if you're gonna try to kick off a music career, if you're launching a clothing company, know why you're doing it, and I will give you a big hint: make sure your reason is bigger than money. Money is not a big enough reason to do something because it's not gonna keep you going when times get tough and when things get hard, right? So know your "why." Know your "why" for why you're doing what you're doing.

For me, I started a business because I want to help contribute financially to our family. I want to establish, kind of, a baseline and plan financially for our family and be able to contribute to that so that we can be comfortable when we're older and, also, so that our kids have something to



inherit and walk into. And so, that's why I launched my business and why I spend so much time working on it because I want to prepare my family and set us up for the future, right? So know your "why."

Know why you're doing what you're doing, and make sure it's something that's bigger than just yourself, or else you're not gonna keep going when it's hard. It's gonna be really difficult if you don't.
