Tikanga Māori

Ahakoa ko wai, no hea koe, ko tēnei te wā!

No matter who you are or where you're from, this is the time to immerse yourself in the richness of te ao Māori

(the Māori world).

Contextualised course title: Tikanga Māori

Credits: 11 at Level 1 Credits: 18 at Level 2 Credits: 21 at Level 3

Learning areas: Tikanga, Māori Performing Arts

What is this course about?

This course is an opportunity for all students who have an interest in learning about **te ao Māori** and learn the foundations of the Māori world. You do not need to have prior knowledge of te reo or te ao Māori to achieve success!

This course will cover **tikanga** (correct protocols), **atua Māori** (Māori gods), **pūrākau** (traditional stories and legends), **mahi toi** (art) and **performing arts**. This course is taught across year levels, giving you the opportunity to learn supported by Year 12s and Year 13s in a tuakana-teina relationship.

If you plan on having a career in Aotearoa, especially any mahi with:

- ★ local and national government
- ★ health or wellbeing sectors
- ★ sustainability
- ★ education
- ★ law

Then this is the course for you!

In the last year, the jobs requiring knowledge of te ao Māori have more than doubled, and this course will provide you with the foundation of knowledge you need to succeed as a citizen of Aotearoa.

What sort of things will I do?

We will focus on a different area of **te ao Māori** each term, building up an awareness of te ao Māori and how to operate in Māori spaces. This class will culminate in a trip to a marae at the end of term 3 or the beginning of term 4, where everything we learn throughout the year can be applied.

Term 1

Tikanga or the cultural customs and practices that allow us to operate correctly in te ao Māori.

Term 2

Māori performing arts where students will learn waiata, mōteatea and haka - the basics required when on marae to tautoko or support your ropū or group.

Term 3

Inquiry where you will build together all the mahi you have done so far into an application. The general application for all ākonga will be to attend and participate in a pōwhiri. There will also be the opportunity for you to apply your learning to an area of special interest co-constructed within the class, such as kaitiakitanga (guardianship), hauora (wellbeing), hītori Māori (Māori history), or Māori-Pākehā relations in colonial or post-colonial Aotearoa.
