Bedford Place is such a nice place to be currently - the outdoor seating is perfect during a pandemic and it will be a wonderful area during summer!

Please don't take us backwards. Car use needs to be reduced, and Bedford Place is so much more pleasant an environment without cars. At least leave it as-is for the summer to give it a fair chance.

Having recently moved nearer to the City Centre with two young children, I would not have chosen to spend time in Bedford Place before. With small pavements, fast moving traffic and a pretty grey and dreary area. Since it was pedestrianised it is a lovely place to go. It is vibrant and interesting and safe! We have taken a stroll down there with the pram and sat outside with the community. It felt great! A feeling that you don't get from a rat run.

The introduction of the closure and effective creation of a Public Square on Bedford Place has revitalised the area and made it more of a go to location.

The closure of the roads around Bedford place has been a wonderful addition to the city. It has made the area feel much safer, many cars would speed along this road unnecessarily using it as a rat run to avoid London road. Often speeding right up to St Anne's Catholic school creating a danger for the students and staff there crossing the road. In addition I would note that unsavoury people would often loiter in and around their souped-up tinted windowed cars in the evening on Bedford place. Creating an intimidating presence for local people, I have not seen this presence since the closure. Not to mention how brilliant the outside seating has been for business, creating a great community between the various hospitality businesses. It is also lovely to see the artwork painted on the floor, employing local creatives and brightening up what is a pretty raggedy road otherwise.

Please reconsider the pedestrianisation of Bedford Place. Please consider the long-term outlook. Southampton needs a place to be creative, colourful and innovative. We have a huge student population with nowhere to go. Thank you.

We live just off Bedford place. Whilst it's great you're asking the businesses it'd be good if you could ask the residents for their opinion too. Personally we love it and are very disappointed that it may be taken away. It gives the area a continental relaxed vibe with has attracted many customers to the area. It has also meant that cafes and bars can open during lockdown. None of us can say for sure that there won't be another lockdown so taking this away is potentially taking away business. Whilst shops have lost trade from passing cars there's still a car park at each end so they have easy access. Since pubs and cafes have been open outside there hadn't been one day where the area hasn't been busy so it's greatly increased foot traffic who are more likely to pop into a shop than those in cars. It also gives places without an outdoor area the chance to offer outdoor seating which in the summer will greatly increase customers.

I have enjoyed the pedestrianisation of Bedford Place, having frequented the cafes and pubs that have placed tables on the road.

Pedestrianisation in Bedford Place has been fantastic - such an improvement for the area. The restaurants having outside seating is so lovely - reminds me of the narrow pedestrian

streets that are lined with restaurants in Brussels! The area has become much more attractive for people to come in and enjoy dining - easy to park in the nearby car parks and safely sit in the outside sim eating without the plague of passing noise/fumes from cars. Delightful!

Outdoor space is more important than ever and remains the safest way to do anything in a covid way. Reducing car traffic will encourage people to use local businesses.

Having Bedford Place closed to traffic, thus opening it up to a more cosmopolitan way of dining and socialising, has improved the area no end. I'm sure there have been some challenges, but it has encouraged more people and footfall to the area during the day. Having visited the area for a number of different reasons, and therefore discussed the change with a number of business owners, recently, I can only see how it has positively impacted these smaller businesses. We know that Bedford Place is popular with drinking culture at night, and I have no doubt this will not change, however, to improve its popularity as a place to visit during the day must be something that should continue. The area can only thrive and develop further if Bedford Place stays closed to traffic.

Undoing the pedestrianisation of Bedford Place is a terrible, terrible idea

It would be an absolute outrage to turn this back into the awful system it used to be. Bedford place is flourishing with the road closures to cars. And after such an awful year the closure would be a real hit to the businesses based there. Also we don't have enough outside spaces for pedestrians as it is and this change has been massive bonus to Southampton

The pedestrianisation of areas of Southampton have been supported by local businesses and local people. As we may have to continue to opt for outside gatherings more often it does not make sense to cut the capacity of local restaurants, bars and pubs - an industry which has already had a significant hit in the pandemic. It would also appear to be against Conservative policy of supporting local and small businesses especially during COVID-19.

Regarding Bedford Place:

It concerns me that closing any part of the scheme may undermine it as a safe, vibrant place to go in the evening. I've spoken with staff who fear going back to the days of boy racers and curb crawlers.

Asides from the benefits to traders being able to utilise road space for outdoor hospitality, cutting the through road means that overall speeds and traffic quantities in the area - even outside the closed zone - have calmed significantly. In terms of disabled people having access, there are 4 large car parks on the edges of the scheme, so if there is going to be this type of scheme anywhere in the city it is ideally placed. I want our city to be hugely ambitious in its visitor offering, and with new street art and vibrant streets, Bedford Place really could be Southampton's "Brighton Lanes".

I'm not going to second guess your proposals for changes to the other schemes, only that I support Boris Johnson's view that not only are we going to have to exchange cars for electric versions to meet our climate change goals, but we are also going to need to reduce our dependence on cars entirely. Personally I have replaced using a car in the city with using the rental e-scooters and trains, and I'm sure many others will follow when this scheme is expanded across the city. Let's make our city cleaner, greener, and a more pleasant place to

live and visit. Southampton is part of the 7th or 8th biggest metropolitan area in the UK and our aspirations should be at that level.

I'm sure you share my passion that Southampton becomes an attractive, vibrant city where people want to spend time and visit.

The car-free area in Bedford Place has been amazing for both businesses and customers. I have been to Bedford Place much more frequently since these changes because the atmosphere is great and has a community feel. As a car driver and resident in the City Centre, I haven't been inconvenienced in the slightest by the changes to pedestrianised these areas and encourage the council to look at implementing these in other areas too. I understand that there were initial objections but these were soon overcome when residents of Southampton began making the most of the new areas. Oxford Street is another area that demonstrates how well this sort of pedestrianisation works.

Regardless of the views on the transport plan, the pedestrianisation of Bedford Place area has been a huge success and has breathed new life into the area. Whilst there is obviously disagreement between hospitality owners and other businesses, the area is brighter and better than before. It is essential we keep this area.

The Bedford Place scheme is a transformative piece of urbanism which has greatly improved the public realm of this area. The Bedford Place area is one of the few areas in the city designated for an evening economy and therefore priority should be given to support the hospitality sector by ensuring the street remains closed providing important space for local independent hospitality businesses to provide outdoor seating. The pedestrianisation of Bedford Place supports independent hospitality businesses which have to compete with national chains at West Quay South / Watermark. You should be supporting them with this scheme not providing a hammer blow removing it. There are so many examples of pedestrianisation actually increasing and boosting footfall to local businesses once the public become accustomed to it. The space is vibrant and creative and provides a new destination in Southampton that looks like The Lanes in Brighton, Soho in London and the Northern Quarter in Manchester. Southampton needs a cultural and vibrant heart to make it a more liveable city, not more pollution and priority to motorists.

The restrictions on car through traffic make the area more pleasant, more usable, more financially viable and support active travel choices. They are essential to moving our city to a clean, green economy that benefits everyone. In Bedford Place businesses can still be accessed by car and plenty of parking is available. Other plans would improve Southampton's performance and attractiveness compared to our peer cities, and help improve the health of our city.

The SCC has made some excellent progress in making the area more enjoyable and accessible for pedestrians and cyclists. Please continue this good work!

I am firmly of the opinion that Southampton has enough car parks and is already very accessible. I am proud of the city's green spaces (in fact, it was one of the main reasons I moved here) and am absolutely horrified at the idea of wasting such beautiful space with drab concrete and extra parking that barely anybody asked for (and the few who are asking for it don't seem to be aware of the city's existing parking provisions). I have also very much enjoyed Bedford Place businesses having room to expand and survive, given that they still cannot serve people indoors. Taking away what in my opinion has been a very successful pilot scheme will put businesses in jeopardy and...well just ruin Summer for local people. I for one urge you to reconsider the current plans to undo all of the previous council's work towards making this a green, pleasant city, with local businesses at the forefront of planning decisions.

Please reconsider opening Bedford Place to cars again. The local businesses need as many customers as possible and they can do this by having extra seating outside. The closed roads give the area a great atmosphere and looks contemporary like Bristol and Brighton. Please keep the roads shut.

These schemes are such a win-win, making the city a more modern and vibrant place whilst at the same time helping with reducing our environmental impact.

The closure of Bedford Place to motor traffic has transformed it into a vibrant hospitality area. The air is cleaner, the area is quieter and it's much more welcoming to drinkers and diners. Other local businesses will benefit from increased foot traffic as lockdown eases and people can enjoy all these trades more freely.

Please retain the pedestrian areas like Bedford Place

We really like the Bedford place pedestrianised zone - it's good for the restaurants and makes for a nicer eating experience when eating outside

restrictions on serving inside would have meant they have to close. I am a resident in the city and a car owner and I don't understand how opening this one road will solve the transport issues in the city.

As a Bedford Place resident, I have greatly enjoyed the changes and had hoped they would remain permanent. Traffic noise and pollution has reduced, anti-social and dangerous driving/speeding through Bedford Place is eliminated and the local area has gained a sense of community/neighbourhood that it was lacking before. It used to be difficult to even cross the road before, such was the state of the traffic and drivers speeding through.

I see the scheme not only as something temporary, supporting trading during the pandemic (and associated restrictions) but also attracting more visitors as we are gradually returning to normal. Local businesses are perfectly accessible through the many car park options, all of which are maximum 5 minutes walking distance. I can't think of a bigger compliment to the area that one of my recent visitors commenting that "this looks like a trendy London area". Please don't take this away from us!

The residents of this city like the cycle lanes and the closing of Bedford Place has led to a vibrant outdoor dining area. Whilst pubs and restaurants start to open again this is needed. Don't let the need to put your stamp on the city reverse the good work the former council did.

Pedestrianising Bedford Place has been wonderful. my friends and family come to Southampton just for that, bringing money in, when they wouldn't have done so before. It is quieter, cleaner and much more sociable. It is also much safer, as cars squeezing down those narrow roads often barely missing pedestrians and children as they cross was awful to see before. With Bedford Place being car free it has helped local businesses to recover from the pandemic. Dear Dan, the pedestrianisation of Bedford Place is one of the best things that have happened in Southampton for a while and it should be preserved and extended, not destroyed. It gives the city more character and overall has made the area more attractive and worth visiting. It would not change much for the cars if one more road becomes available, but it would change a lot for the people who enjoy visiting the restaurants and bars. I say this as someone who has visited 4 times in the past 3 weeks. Please reconsider.

Since the introduction of the Bedford Place scheme I have found that it cuts traffic and reduces pollution in my area (Northlands Road). The no car areas are lovely to sit in, Bedford Place is a narrow and pretty dangerous street and this has made it safer and more accessible. I now visit more pubs in the area because of the scheme and feel that it has made it safer for people in the long run. Please do not revert it back, I would be really disappointed if that happened, it has been a huge success in my opinion and a lot of the businesses have expanded their seating and are able to take on more customers. There are plenty of other roads that people can use, such as the avenue and the ring road to access their residential areas. Bedford Place does not need to be open to traffic. As far as I know all of the people that own businesses in the area that I have spoken to have seen an increase in trade, not a decrease. And the scheme is overwhelmingly supported by locals and the public, anyone I talk to loves it there is very little negativity.

As a person that drives a lot, Southampton city centre is never somewhere I would drive to, I always walk. If pedestrian routes were better and safer and there was a park and ride scheme this would reduce pollution and ensure public safety. I believe that this is what will help the city, supporting people driving their cars will not and this view is outdated in my opinion. To look to the future we must think greener, the only way to do this is to invest in public transport and ways of reducing traffic on the roads.

Reopening Bedford Place would be detrimental to local hospitality businesses that are already struggling to recover from the pandemic

My partner and I regularly go to Bedford place currently - it would be a shame and a disgrace for the new Conservative council to abolish something which thousands of people have learned to love and enjoy over recent months. Make Southampton liveable.

I feel a lot safer at work in Bedford Place, where I often have to stand outside the venue I work at to supervise door staff etc, whilst there are no cars in that area. I am normally extremely worried about drunk drivers & crime, this will significantly reduce if it stays car free. It's also so much safer for people getting home after nights out if they are directed to dedicated taxi ranks that can be policed.

Please consider the pedestrianisation of some roads in Southampton, to allow the change for outside dining and drinking gin the warmer months. Its something that Southampton has lacked for years.

As both a resident, and a frequent customer of businesses in Bedford Place I have found the pedestrianisation to have been a welcome change.

Please don't unpedestrianise Bedford Place. It's a really nice area.

We recently moved out of the city centre but visit regularly and still own a property a short walk from Bedford Place. We have visited Bedford Place on several occasions since the road closure and have been impressed with the vibrancy and atmosphere it has brought to the area. It provides an equal footing for those businesses that did not previously have

outdoor space, and particularly as we move to the summer gives them the opportunity to compete on a more equal footing with businesses that have outdoor space already. As many workplaces are moving towards a hybrid work from home model then traffic will be reduced long term and so the route is not as in demand. I feel it would be short-sighted to reopen the road, at least during the upcoming summer months.

What a shame that the Bedford place closure could be removed. It creates such a lively, community atmosphere that could inject new life into a tired street.

We need to support alternatives to car travel in our city centre.

I was equally sad and concerned upon hearing within days that immediate plans were to create 1000 new parking spaces and reverse the pedestrianised Bedford Place. Living in the City Centre, we're really not short on parking spaces and should strive to encourage people to utilise public transport where possible.

Bedford Place has really "come into its own" recently; embracing outdoor recreation space which also allows space for disabled people to easily manoeuvre around. I haven't yet spoken to anyone who actually lives in or utilises the area in its current form who objects to it, most are really enthusiastic so rather confused why this is a local priority? Without undertaking some research to refer to the relevant legislation, but isn't Southampton under government regulations regarding air pollution targets? I thought for instance that DEFRA signed off the cycle lanes? Will the government be moving environmental goalposts for the new administration? Just a plea really that we don't move backwards on a really important issue. Circa 1000 related deaths a year is a little more serious than annoyance over having to take a different route. Please do listen to those living here. We appreciate your attention in this matter.

I've been really happy with the pedestrianisation Bedford Place which has made it a more vibrant and enjoyable place to be. Reverting it back to a rat run would be, I feel a mistake. Instead I would love to see similar schemes in other parts of the city such as Portswood where the shop I work at and help run is based.

I have also been keen to see the proposals to create a greener and more people friendly city centre. I hope these changes of a bold new vision for Southampton are not put on hold. I am a car owner and indeed have chronic fatigue so often need to use my car to assist me in managing my energy levels. However I feel the multi-storey car parks in the city are more than adequate and reducing the amount of space cars take up on the roads, with unnecessary parking etc preferable.

Bedford Place is so much more attractive as a destination now that it is closed to motor vehicles. I come in to St Anne's school and work at the Highfield campus and it's been lovely

to meet my wife here a few times for a coffee and a wander. Would never have done that before.

I'm absolutely disgusted by the proposed plans to remove the pedestrianised area in Bedford Place and the bike lanes. I have used these facilities a lot and believe they make Southampton a much more pleasant and liveable city. It is imperative that we support active transport options, for reasons of health, community, wellbeing and sustainability. I do not believe that SCC should be forcing people off of their bikes and feet and into cars.

Really keen to keep Bedford Place pedestrianised for so many reasons, not least to enjoy supporting the businesses there, and am in favour of opportunities to improve non-car movement around the city and other local hubs.

I think reducing options for outdoor seating at hospitality outlets is short sighted both for health and economic reasons. Bedford Place should become more pedestrianised in my view while allowing vehicular access for residents and deliveries. This is a common practice in Italy, France and Spain.

My household loves car-free Bedford, and the plans for a more open, pedestrian-friendly city centre. I've been local for 20+ years and I love the sense of togetherness and community I feel now when around Bedford; its always bustling and looks a lot more welcoming, it's a much more social environment than before - which feels very cathartic after countless lockdowns and the isolation COVID brought on for many; personally I will really miss this space if it's changed back, it's a version of Southampton I would love to see more of.

As a manager of a local pub I feel that the Bedford place road closure should stay, especially the Carlton place closure.

I have two main reasons:

- 1: Cars driving very quickly down Carlton place was a huge issue (boy racers)
- 2: Safety. On most nights of the week cars of men would drive non stop around the Bedford place/Carlton place area. Essentially looking for young drunk women to offer lifts home to. This was a big issue and not what Southampton needs. Keeping the roads closed will improve safety for women

Reviving the businesses in Bedford Place has been helped immensely by the closing of the street and allowing it to become a busy, attractive place for drinking and dining. There are many examples of this kind of development across UK cities which focus on returning public spaces to leisure and retail experiences. We need to rethink the use and space for city centres, and the Bedford Place changes have made a great start. I hope you will also take very seriously the issues of air pollution in our city too. People are dying because of it. Cramming our city centre full of cars really isn't the solution.

I use several of the businesses in Bedford Place and Carlton Place and have been looking forward to the summer and sitting outside, Parisian Cafe style.

In a period where we are still cautious the possibility of spreading new variants through close contact I feel it would be folly to undermine the positive steps Southampton council have already taken.

I was so happy when Bedford place was pedestrianised. It was just used as a rat run previously and there is still access to city centre through London road so I don't see the issue of having to take it away.

Please continue to work on the schemes to reduce car usage and traffic in the city, it makes for a much nicer place to visit which will ultimately lead to improved business. Bedford Place is so much improved and so many users have offered positive feedback.

Bedford Place has become such a lovely place and feels much safer without idiot cars whizzing down the narrow roads. Southampton needs that pop of colour to help it thrive!

Please keep Bedford Place closed to traffic.

Bedford Place and Carlton Place have both had life breathed into them. Where once was a dead road where cars would speed past on a regular basis now we have a beautiful outdoor space similar to the likes of Oxford Street. I own Cheshire cat clothing and jewellery at 21 Carlton Place and it has both helped my business and made it a nicer road to work on. All my neighbours I have spoken to also agree. I hope you take this into serious consideration if you truly have small businesses best interests at heart. All the best

The Bedford place area has been great, it offers so much for both residents and visitors to our city.

My husband is the owner of a hospitality business in Bitterne Triangle. Unfortunately it is not possible to have increased pedestrianisation in this area but we would strongly support it if it were possible. We have been to many other countries where outdoor cafe culture is embraced (including cold places like Scandinavia, where blankets are available), and it is very pleasant to sit outdoors enjoying a drink or meal, especially when you don't have cars roaring past. There is evidence that small businesses really benefit from 'walkable communities'.

Furthermore, I have a 16 month old daughter. She loves going out on the bicycle and every day she does the sign language for 'bicycle', or toddles over to the bicycle and points at it. It is such a shame because I mostly do not feel safe to take her out. The only route I can take with quiet roads and cycle lanes is to and from the common or to town. Bitterne Road West has been made slightly less terrifying due to the bus lane there, but we still have to cycle on

the pavement near Bitterne Station which is extremely narrow. The cycle lane in Portswood has been allowed to wear away, and is a hazard anyway due to the risk of being 'doored' (I have seen this happen).

Following lockdown rules relaxing, the roads are becoming full of cars again when most journeys could easily be taken by bicycle. People I have spoken to (including friends from Denmark and the Netherlands) have said that the main thing stopping them from cycling is that they don't feel safe on the roads here. More, and safer cycle lanes would remediate that.

A number of my highly skilled friends have moved away in recent years, partly because Southampton really isn't a nice place to live compared to the alternatives. There are creative and vibrant cities in the south: Brighton, Bristol, Bournemouth, and even Portsmouth outcompete us on this front. I frequently work in Brighton, and they have a 20mph speed limit and extensive cycle lanes which really help people on foot or bikes to feel safe on the roads.

Even if the pedestrianisation of Bedford Place is removed, leaving the pedestrianisation of Carlton Place in place would provide a much safer environment for the public in that area and provide significant benefits to local businesses, without any significant impact on traffic flow through the area.

The parallel and adjacent streets are still open to drive through, so the businesses who are claiming they have suffered a drop in trade really need to interrogate whether it's the closure or other factors involved.

Cage Culture! So many people love it. Bedford Place looks amazing right now. A much better 'draw' for visitors as a pedestrianised area.

I was a Southampton resident for several years. I think the Bedford place car free scheme is amazing, and I was really looking forward to coming to Southampton and experiencing this for myself as soon as lockdown has eased enough. However, without this scheme Bedford place really loses its appeal. In general any proposal which increases the amount of traffic going through Southampton is going to negatively affect the area. Considering all of the great work which has taken place to turn it into a cultural hub, this really would be a big step backwards, and I can't say I would be keen to visit Southampton in the future.

The pedestrianisation of Bedford Place/Carlton Place has had such a positive impact on the area for reducing pollution and congestion, brought a heavily increased footfall to the area allowing independent and locally owned business to help rebuild themselves after lockdown. Public safety has been increased with the extra staff and security teams visibility with outdoor hospitality service and crime has also been reduced in the area.
