HOMEWORK POLICY

Teachers will assign homework to reinforce concepts taught and learned in class as appropriate for a student's age and development. The type, frequency and quantity are determined by each teacher. Homework may or may not require parental assistance. If you notice that your child is frustrated or confused and you are unable to help them, please discuss this with your child's teacher. Some study club options are available after school.

Students have one day for each day of absence to get make-up work completed and turned into the teacher.

DRESS CODE

In an effort to maintain a safe, healthy and academic learning environment, the following provides quidelines for appropriate dress:

- → Clothing and accessories should be tasteful and non-disruptive of the educational process.
- → Avoid wearing the following:
 - Clothing depicting, suggesting, or promoting the use of alcohol, drugs, tobacco, or rude and inappropriate language.
 - Tops which bare the midriff.
 - Tops which have arm holes where the chest area or underwear is visible
 - ◆ Clothing or accessories giving the suggestions of gang attire.
 - ◆ Jewelry and accessories seen as dangerous or disruptive.
 - Pants which show underwear or are excessively loose wasted.
 - ◆ Shorts, skirts, dresses above mid-thigh.
- → Special clothing Needed:
 - Gym shoes for PE and indoor recess that leave no black marks on the floor.
 - ◆ Hats, coats, boots, gloves as needed during cold weather.

PE AND INDOOR RECESS

Every student will participate in a physical education class unless she/he has a medical release from a licensed health provider. Students need separate non-marking, rubber-soled shoes that will remain at school and not be used outside.

This dress code applies to all classroom and school sponsored activities. The school will provide alternate clothing if other clothing can not be accessed for students wearing inappropriate attire.

GRADING SYSTEM

TRANSPORTATION

Walking/Drop off to school

Students must understand the importance of using sidewalks and crosswalks when walking to school. Students need to be alert for cars coming and going, especially when crossing the highway. Arrival time is no earlier than 7:45 am at school.

Students will ride only on their assigned bus unless written permission to do otherwise has been received by school officials.

Bicycles/scooters/skateboards

All wheeled transportation items may be ridden to school when weather permits. Students must park their wheeled transport in the bike rack, and remain parked until school is dismissed. If students eat breakfast at the High School their bike must remain there until after school and the bus will provide transportation to the elementary school.

The grading system for grades <u>TK-5</u> is as follows:
4 Above grade level standards (>85%)
3 At grade level standards (50-84%)
2 Below grade level standards (25-49%)

- Significantly below grade level standards (<25%)

Riding the Bus

(School Board Policy 6600 & 6605)

Students should arrive at the bus stop no earlier than 5 minutes before the expected arrival of the bus. Prior to the first day of school, the transportation office will notify family/students of the time and location of the nearest bus stop. Elementary students participating in the breakfast program will be taken to the high school, then transport these students to the grade school after breakfast. Bus students are expected to obey the bus driver, aid, teacher or coach at all times. Those who behave irresponsibly on the bus will have a written referral to the principal's office. OUTCOMES may result in assigned seating, warning, suspension or expulsion based on the infraction or number of occurrences.

Level 1: 5 excused absences in a month or 10 in a school year a letter will be sent home notifying parents of our concern of academic and social learning.

Excused Absences

Level 2: After 7 excused absences we will hold a conference with families to discuss absences from school and develop a plan to help the child be successful

Level 3: After 9 excused absences in a school year we will hold a conference with families & Truancy Liaison to discuss absences from school and a doctor's note will be required for the absence to be excused.

Level 4: All absences will be considered unexcused without a doctor's note.

Valid Excuses

- 1. Health condition, illness, or family emergency when prior arrangement is not practical.
- Participation in school approved activities
- Parental Approved activities and medical/dental appointments with prior arrangement with the principal or designee
- Disciplinary actions or short-term suspension
- Extended illness or health condition
- Sacred days arranged by parents in advance with principal or designee

Level 1: After the 3rd unexcused absence a letter will be sent home explaining the district and state policies and procedures related to attendance and we will hold a conference to discuss questions, concerns and next steps.

Level 2: After the 5th unexcused absence in a school year the principal will schedule a meeting with the parent/guardian (members at the meeting could include: teacher, counselor, truancy liaison, principal, etc.). The district will enter into a signed agreement with student and parent, OR refer student to Community Engagement Board OR file a petition with Juvenile Court.

Level 3: After the 7th unexcused absence in a school year the district will file a truancy petition with Juvenile Court

ATTENDANCE POLICY

As stated in the Becca Bill, all parents in the State of Washington of any child eight years of age and under eighteen years of age shall cause such child to attend the public school of the district in which the child resides and such child shall have the responsibility to and therefore shall attend for the full time when such school may be in session (28A.225.0 10) The district superintendent must approve exceptions to this law.

Students will attend regularly scheduled classes and activities unless ill or excused by a planned absence. We believe that children need to be in school every day except for legitimate reasons (illness, death in the family, a pre-arranged absence, or unanticipated emergencies). Please note that attendance and participation are factors that can affect grades.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY

It is the policy of the Tekoa School District that all employees and students be provided a school environment that is free from all forms of harassment or discrimination. Conduct defined as sexual harassment includes the following:

- Sexual comments, innuendos, or jokes
- Unwelcomed invitations to sexual activities
- Unwelcomed touches, pinches or hugs
- Pressure to engage in sexual activity as a condition of employment, promotion or a grade
- Sexual assault
- Verbal abuse of a sexual nature
- Graphic or degrading verbal comments about individuals or their appearance
- The display of sexually suggestive objects
- Subtle forms of harassment, such as unwelcome pictures, posters, cartoon, or jokes of a sexual nature

Should it be determined that there is a violation of this policy, appropriate disciplinary action will be taken, which may include termination or suspension from school. All sexual harassment complaints should be reported immediately to a staff member, building principal, or supervisor.

HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION & BULLYING POLICY

RCW 28A.600.477-Our Schools Protect Students from Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying (HIB) Schools are meant

to be safe and inclusive environments where all students are protected from Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying (HIB), including in the classroom, on the school bus, in school sports, and during other school activities.

What is HIB?

HIB is any intentional electronic, written, verbal, or physical act of a student that:

- Physically harms another student or damages their property;
- Has the effect of greatly interfering with another student's education; or,
- Is so severe, persistent, or significant that it creates an
 intimidating or threatening education environment for other
 students. HIB generally involves an observed or perceived
 power imbalance and is repeated multiple times or is highly
 likely to be repeated.

Rude vs Mean vs Bullying: Know the Difference

- Rude: Inadvertently saying or doing something that hurts someone else. Incidents of rudeness are usually spontaneous, unplanned inconsideration based on thoughtlessness, poor manners or narcissism, but not meant to hurt someone else.
- → Mean: Purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone once (or maybe twice). The main distinction between "rude" and "mean" has to do with intention. While rudeness is often unintentional, mean behavior very much aims to hurt or depreciate someone.
- → Bullying: Intentionally aggressive behavior, repeated over time, that involves an imbalance of power. Experts agree that bullying entails three key elements: an intent to harm, a power imbalance and related acts or threats of aggressive behavior.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

APPEAL PROCESS

In the course of the school year, students, parents, guardians may have questions or concerns regarding school policies or procedures. In the event such concerns arise, the District has a specific standard procedure to follow:

- 1. The individual(s) should first attempt to resolve the concern with the party or parties involved.
- 2. If the concern is not resolved to the satisfaction of the individual(s), a conference may be requested and held with the principal.
- 3. Within 10 school days, the individual(s) and the district employee will be given an explanation and decision from the supervisor.
- 4. If the determination is not to the satisfaction of the individual(s), s/he (they) may appeal to the superintendent.
- 5. It is the intent and belief that problem solving is most effective when dealt with immediately and with the help of the concerned staff member. All members of the staff want to work with members of the community to make our school a valuable and rewarding experience for students.

PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports)

At Tekoa Elementary, we are committed to fostering a positive and inclusive school environment through proactive and consistent behavior practices. We implement a school-wide PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) framework that emphasizes prevention, skill-building, and the reinforcement of positive behavior.

PBIS is grounded in best practices for behavior management, focusing on school-wide systems of support that define, teach, and encourage appropriate behaviors. This approach is designed to promote a safe, respectful, and welcoming environment for all students.

We use a continuum of positive, proactive behavioral supports across all areas of the school, including classrooms and non-classroom settings such as playgrounds, hallways, buses, and restrooms. These strategies help students succeed socially, emotionally, and academically by reinforcing prosocial behaviors.

School-Wide Expectations: "PAWS"itive Expectations

Tekoa Elementary has adopted school-wide expectations known as "PAWS" itive Expectations, which are applied consistently across all instructional and non-instructional settings. These expectations serve as a foundation for behavior standards throughout the school and help guide students in making respectful and responsible choices.

"Paws"itive Notes

Students who consistently meet or exceed behavior expectations and demonstrate exceptional character may receive "Paws"itive Notes as recognition of their efforts. These notes celebrate positive behavior and are entered into a weekly drawing for special prizes and acknowledgments.

Response to Behavior

While our focus is on prevention and reinforcement of positive behaviors, we recognize that students may occasionally need support in meeting expectations. To ensure consistency and fairness, Tekoa Elementary utilizes a **Behavior Response Matrix** (see below), which outlines:

- Levels of behavior (e.g., minor to major)
- Appropriate proactive interventions
- Logical consequences when expectations are not met

This framework helps guide staff responses and provides students with clear, predictable outcomes that support learning and growth.
