IRVINGTON BENCHMARK PROJECTS

9th Grade: The *Change Project* is the first of Irvington High School's benchmark projects. 9th-grade students work in teams of four to make a positive change to an environmental problem they identify in our community.

10th Grade: The *World Issues Project (WIP)* refines students' research and writing skills learned during the Change Project, focusing on global challenges.

12th Grade: **QUEST (Question, Understanding, Experience, Service, and Testimony)** is a five-component project designed and completed by all 12th-grade students. Students continue their research and writing skills by answering an essential question about a social issue of their choice and presenting their entire **QUEST Project** to a panel of staff, parents, and community members.

CENTER FOR CREATIVE ARTS (CCA) MAGNET

The *Center for Creative Arts (CCA)* is a program that integrates the arts into students' core classes, allowing them to continue exploring their artistic nature through various arts classes. As Fremont Unified School District's arts magnet school, students from each of the five comprehensive high schools can apply as magnet students.
