Thank you for being such an important part of our school community. Wishing you all a wonderful weekend ahead, and we look forward to seeing you at the exciting events coming up next week.



LEADERS REPORT - SIMONE NOTT

LEARNING AND TEACHING - A SPOTLIGHT ON READING

At Christ the King, we are incredibly proud of our commitment to fostering a lifelong love of reading and building exceptional literacy skills. Our approach is evidence based, reflective of the Science of Learning principles that guide how we effectively teach students to read. This means our teaching is systematic and explicit, focusing on the foundational building blocks of literacy and building upon them each year.

In the early years, our focus is on building a strong foundation. Beginning in Prep, we utilise the Phonics Plus program, a comprehensive approach that systematically teaches the relationship between sounds and letters. This direct instruction gives students the decoding skills they need to confidently read new words. We also begin to introduce students to a rich variety of texts to spark their interest and imagination.



As students become more proficient decoders, our curriculum expands to include a more rigorous literature study, where they engage with high-quality, authentic texts. We believe that reading is more than just sounding out words; it is about understanding, interpreting, and connecting with stories and ideas. At this stage, we place a strong emphasis on building fluency—the ability to read with speed, accuracy, and proper expression—which is crucial for comprehension. The CARS and STARS program is used to teach students twelve specific reading comprehension strategies, which are then explicitly applied to high-quality literature during classroom studies to deepen their understanding and analysis of rich texts.



As they are ready, our students move beyond basic comprehension to critical analysis. We have a strong focus on grammar, teaching students the rules and structures of language that enable them to comprehend complex sentences and express themselves clearly in their own writing. Our students learn to evaluate texts, identify author's purpose, and synthesise information from multiple sources, preparing them for the demands of more complex texts,

For the small number of students who require additional support, we offer targeted intervention programs. These include MiniLit and MacqLit, evidence-based programs designed to provide intensive, one-on-one or small-group instruction. This ensures every child receives the tailored support they need to become a confident and capable reader.

This rigorous approach has helped students at Christ the King achieve consistently outstanding NAPLAN results in reading. For a number of years children at Christ the King have









performed well above the national average, a testament to the dedication of our staff and the hard work of our students.

We are excited to share that this year's NAPLAN results continue this tradition of excellence, with the following data:

Our school concert **It's a Jungle Out There** is being held on Tuesday 9 September at the Playhouse Theatre, Geelong Arts Centre (50 Little Malop Street, Geelong). We are very excited about how well the production is coming together. You are in for a great night! Please be reminded that tickets will not be available on the night. Some final

arrangements regarding the musical are as follows.

DRESS REHEARSAL:

We have a full dress rehearsal on Monday, September 1. To make this dress rehearsal as smooth as possible, parents are asked to send their child's costume to school in a named plastic bag by no later than Thursday 28 August. Please ensure all your child's clothes are clearly labelled. All costumes will be sent home with students following the dress rehearsal so they are ready to wear to the Geelong Arts Centre on the big night!

COSTUME, HAIR AND MAKEUP:

On the night of the concert, the <u>children will need to come to the Geelong Arts Centre wearing their full</u> <u>costume</u>. Please ensure all your child's clothes are clearly labelled. All students are expected to wear their full costume home after the concert.

All main cast members are required to wear a base layer (ie: leotard or singlet and bike shorts) underneath their costumes. This is to help with fitting microphones on the night.

Make up is optional for the show and not mandatory. We understand that some parents would prefer not to put makeup on their child and we respect your decision either way. If you choose to put makeup on your child we recommend: Foundation/powder, skin coloured blush, light-coloured eye shadow, mascara, eyeliner and bright red lipstick. If you choose to put makeup on your child please do so at home and do not send cosmetic products with them on the night.

Hair styles should be reflective of the costume brief provided for each class.

DROP OFF AND PICK UP:

To ease congestion drop off and pick up will be staggered from 4.30pm.

4.30PM	Main Cast arrive to the GAC Foyer (Malop St. Entrance)

5.30PM	Prep Students arrive to the GAC Foyer (Malop St. Entrance)

Children are to line up with their homeroom teachers **IN THE FOYER** of the Geelong Arts Centre (Lt Malop Street Entrance). As students arrive, teachers will take their classes to be marshalled in the Open House. When the whole class is present teachers will mark the roll and move backstage.

We want to ensure all students feel confident on the night and it is important that no one feels rushed, so please be on time. If you have children in younger year levels they can be dropped off at the same time as the eldest sibling.

To avoid delays in pick up and drop off students are asked to not bring any unnecessary items with them on the night. We ask that students have eaten dinner prior to arriving at the theatre. The school will make water available to students, so additional food and drinks are not required.







The concert will begin at 6.30pm sharp. No latecomers will be permitted into the theatre until 10 minutes after the show has commenced, so be sure to allow plenty of time to get to your seats before the performance begins. The concert is anticipated to run for approximately 70 minutes.

After the concert, the teachers will return to the Open House with the students who will be released one class at a time to their parents/carers. We anticipate that all students will be collected by **8.30pm**. As soon as you have collected your child please leave the space. We appreciate your patience and cooperation as we ensure a quiet, safe and calm pickup for all our students.

PHOTOS AND VIDEOS:

A reminder that at the Geelong Arts Centre photography and any filming during performances is not permitted. As such, the school has engaged a professional videographer to record the show and the link to this video will be made available to all families free of charge.

While we are expecting to see all our children at the Concert, if your family is unable to come, or if your child is sick, then as a courtesy, please contact your child's teacher and the School Office by Tuesday morning, 9th September, so that staff can plan to make arrangements as needed.

From Monday 1st September, a random selection of families will be invited to participate in the MACSSIS survey, a wonderful opportunity to share your valuable perspective on our school.

Parent feedback is crucial to our ongoing efforts to create the best possible learning environment for your children. It's a key way we gather insights from our entire community—students, staff, and families—to understand what's working well and where we can improve. The survey was created specifically for Catholic schools in Melbourne with the help of education experts and school principals.

Invited parents can easily complete the survey at your convenience, using the secure, online link and password we will email to you. Participation is completely voluntary and you can withdraw at any time.

Based on feedback from the MACSSIS survey, our school has made several important operational changes to better meet the needs and preferences of our community. Your input directly led to these enhancements, demonstrating the value of your participation.

Community Conversations

Parents and staff found evening sessions for Community Conversations difficult to attend due to family commitments and busy schedules. In response to this feedback, we moved these conversations to an after-school block. This change has led to a significant increase in parent attendance, making these discussions more inclusive and effective for everyone.

Participation Tactics for Student Learning

Student surveys indicated a strong desire for more active and varied learning experiences to maintain their engagement. In response, our teachers have introduced Participation Tactics into their lesson plans. These are specific strategies designed to ensure every student is actively involved and learning, such as Think-Pair-Share and targeted Probing Questions.

Liturgies

Parent feedback highlighted a desire for more opportunities to engage with the school's Catholic identity and to see their children actively involved. We responded by increasing the frequency of our student-led liturgies. These services are now presented more often by students for parents to engage with, strengthening the







connection between our school and family faith life while providing students with a chance to lead and express their spirituality.

CHILD SAFETY - Important information for Volunteers

At Christ The King, the safety and well-being of our students is our highest priority. To help us maintain a

secure and protected environment, we now require all volunteers to register their Working With Children Check (WWCC) card on the Services Victoria website.

This process is very simple and only takes a few minutes. By linking your card to Christ The King as a volunteer organisation, you help us ensure that we are immediately notified of any changes to a WWCC card, which is a key part of our child safety policy.

This applies to both volunteer and employee-type cards.



How to Link Your WWCC to Christ The King

Log in to your account: Go to the Services Victoria website and log in to your account.

- 1. Find the WWCC section: Navigate to the "Working with Children Check" section.
- 2. Update your details: Select the option to "Update your details" or "Change my details."
- 3. **Add an organisation:** Scroll down to the "Organisation details" section and click the button to "Add an organisation."
- 4. Enter our details: Fill in the fields with the school's information. You will need to enter:

- 5. Save your changes: Once you have added the details, be sure to save or update your information
