Letter of Solidarity

On Thursday, November 7th, the Center for Sexual and Gender Diversity (CSGD) received notice that the Westboro Baptist Church — an inflammatory hate group — would be preaching publicly at the Duke School of Law on November 18th. The following day, the Dean of the Law School released a statement emphasizing that the hate group is not permitted to protest on campus. It is believed that in light of this statement, they intend to stage a protest in Durham instead.

We — as members of our respective organizations, as Duke students, and as members of the greater Durham community — extend our solidarity to those affected by this hate group and other groups like them, which serve no purpose other than to spread intolerance. At the end of this letter, we've outlined some resources available to students for support at this time.

This group is empowered by being given a platform to spread their hate. Despite the anger many of us feel at their presence, we will not be hosting a counter protest. We hope that, in doing so, we further deplatform them and remove the means by which they can spread messages of hatred and intolerance.

Although this act of hate is a very visible manifestation of the larger issues of homophobia, transphobia, anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, and white supremacy, we want to emphasize that this is not an isolated incident. It is indicative of the greater need to work against all manifestations of these forces in our daily lives. Know that the groups represented in this letter are working to acknowledge and provide a space to process the various manifestations of hate experienced in our communities.
