— The term Decolonial Minimalism was first conceived and rigorously cultivated by IJWBAA beginning in August 2022, laying over two years of sustained philosophical, aesthetic, and cultural groundwork prior to its formal declaration. In February 2024, the movement was given its definitive name.

Becoming Decolonial functions as an evolving intellectual space, critically engaging with fragmented memory, resistance, and the aesthetics of decolonization. It provides theoretical depth to Decolonial Minimalism and documents its artistic and cultural interventions.



Historical Influences & Antecedents

While firmly situated within contemporary visual art, *Decolonial Minimalism* engages with several key movements that inform its aesthetic and ideological foundation:

Minimalism (1960s–present) – The movement's rejection of excess and focus on essential form parallels artists like Donald Judd and Agnes Martin. However, *Decolonial Minimalism* subverts traditional minimalism by embedding postcolonial critique within its stripped-down forms.

Postcolonial Art & Theory – The works of Frantz Fanon, Edward Said, and Filipino scholars in cultural studies provide a critical lens for reinterpreting minimalist aesthetics as a tool for reclaiming lost histories

Indigenous & Filipino Visual Traditions – The movement draws from pre-colonial iconographies and indigenous artistic philosophies, recontextualizing traditional symbols through new media and VR installations



IJWBAA's practice of *decolonial minimalism* represents a distinctive artistic and intellectual framework aimed at critically reinterpreting aesthetic hierarchies through postcolonial methodologies. As such, all references to decolonial minimalism within the <u>Catalogue Raisonné</u>—including artworks, annotations, research materials, and intellectual discourse—are protected under the following terms:

1. Intellectual and Cultural Ownership

The concept, terminology, and artistic works related to decolonial minimalism are the intellectual property of IJWBAA. Any unauthorized use, adaptation, or representation—whether in written, visual, or digital form—without explicit written consent from IJWBAA is strictly prohibited.

2. Usage Restrictions

- Personal and Scholarly Use: Scholars, researchers, and individuals may reference decolonial
 minimalism for academic study, educational purposes, and non-commercial analysis, provided
 proper attribution is given to IJWBAA.
- Commercial and Institutional Use: Any commercial application, publication, exhibition, or institutional adaptation of decolonial minimalism requires formal permission and licensing from IJWBAA.

3. Cultural Integrity and Ethical Representation

Any engagement with decolonial minimalism must uphold the ethical principles of anti-colonial discourse and respect its intended conceptual framework. Misrepresentation, dilution, or distortion of its meaning is not permitted.

4. Copyright and Legal Enforcement

Violations of this clause—whether through unauthorized reproduction, commercial exploitation, or misattribution—will be subject to legal recourse under applicable intellectual property laws.
