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## **Hangzhou**

Hangzhou dates back at least 7,000 years to a time when rice was first being cultivated in China. It is considered one of the Seven Ancient Capitals of China and is located at the southern end of China's Grand Canal.

## **Kaifeng**

Kaifeng was established in 364 BC. However, it was wiped out within 150 years by the Qin. By the 7th century AD, Kaifeng was back, becoming a major commercial center along the Grand Canal.

## **Luoyang**

People have been living in the area of Luoyang since Neolithic times. The city is located at the intersection of the Luo and Yi rivers, which was considered to be the center of Ancient China.

## **Nanjing**

One of the oldest cities in China, Nanjing was also one of the most important in ancient times. In the last 2 thousand years alone, it has been the capital for 6 different dynasties.

## **Xi'an**

Xi'an dates back to around 1,000 BC. It was the starting point for The Silk Road, which allowed China to trade with other cities in China, India, Persia, Africa, and Europe, bringing great wealth to the country.

## **Yan'an**

Yan'an was most famous in ancient times for being the burial place of Huangdi, who is credited with being the father of all Chinese civilization sometime around 2700 to 2600 BC.
