MEMORIAL DAY PROGRAM.

THURSDAY, MAY 30.

JUNE 5, REGISTRATION DAY

TITUSVILLE, Pa., May 13, 1918.—Official word has been received by the Local Draft Board that the new law governing the registration of all men who have become twenty-one years of age since June 5th, 1917, has been passed by Congress and signed by President Wilson. The President has proclaimed June 5th, 1918, as the day on which the new registration is to be made. Last June the registration was made by the regular Election Board of the various voting precincts throughout the county but this new registration is to be accomplished by the Local Board whose office is in Titusville. It is expected that permission will be given to open registration offices in Canton, Spartansburg, Tinsville, Sagarstown, Cambridge Springs, and Coudersport, as well as in Titusville.

The registration offices will be open from 7 a. m. to 9 p. m., on June 5th, next, and every man, regardless of race, color, nationality or citizenship, must register provided he has become twenty-one years of age on or before June 5th, 1918, and is not already in the naval or military service of the United States. Men who were twenty-one on or before June 5th, 1917, must be registered under this new act. Any resident of this district (eastern half of Crawford County) may register at any one of the registration offices that may be opened in the district, that is he may select the registration office nearest and most convenient regardless of where he usually resides. Any man absent from his home district may accomplish his registration at any registration office near which he may happen to be living by applying to the Local Board or registration office a day or two before June 5th, that is, it is not necessary for a man to return to his regular home district in another county or state, to be registered, but he should apply for such registration a few days before June 5th, in case he wishes to have his registration recorded in his home district, otherwise he can be registered on June 5th the same as a resident of the district.

Men who are sick and unable to come to the registration office may be registered by having a good apply at the registration office for a registration card.

Any post master in the district will be able, by May 25th, to answer inquiries and direct intending registrants to the nearest registration office, and any inquiries by mail or otherwise to the Local Board at Titusville will be promptly answered.

EDGAR TAYLOR TAKES HIS OWN LIFE.

Edgar Taylor, who resided near Hyde's Pond, told his family Saturday morning that he was going to a neighbor's house. Instead he came to this place and went to the meat market of Rickerson & Kinney and borrowed a revolver of Donald Kinney, a nephew of Mr. Taylor, telling him that he was going out to buy some corn and that he had quite a sum of money in his pocket and felt that he needed a revolver for protection. He went down the old railroad bed behind the home of J. B. Winans and fired the revolver, then returned to the corner of Main and Mechanic streets where without warning he aimed the weapon to his breast and pulled the trigger. Death was instantaneous. There were a number of people within speaking distance, and on hearing the shot rushed to him. A doctor was called at once, but nothing could be done for him.

The body was taken to the undertaking rooms of J. E. Winans and prepared for burial. As there were several witnesses to the tragedy no inquest was thought necessary. A search of the pockets revealed but ninety cents in money which with actions during the past few weeks would indicate that the deed was premeditated.

He is survived by the wife and two sons, Glow Taylor and Edgar Taylor. One brother, Lawrence Taylor of this place, and two sisters, Mrs. A. C. Kinney of this place, and Mrs. Viola Goodrich of Bradford also survive him.

The funeral was held at the Calvary church at 11 o'clock Monday. Interment was made in the cemetery at East Branch.

Dairymen's League Held Important Meeting

On Saturday evening there was a large attended and enthusiastic meeting of the Spartansburg Branch of the Dairymen's League held at the Grange hall. A number of new members were enrolled and considerable business was disposed of.

County Farm Agent H. O. Henderson of Mandyville was present and gave an instructive talk on the best method of raising calves to keep up the supply of dairy cows.

The question of re-opening the creamery and installing a cheese outfit was thoroughly discussed and a committee was appointed to secure further information as to the costs of changing the equipment of the creamery to include the making of cheese, and to report at the meeting called for Monday evening, May 27th. The condensery outfit cost \$1.00 per hundred for three per cent interest for the month of June, the price offered was not satisfactory to the producers, thus the question of starting up the creamery.

SPRING GREENS—GOOD TO EAT, GOOD FOR BODY

It is springtime! Don't neglect to give your family some good old-fashioned greens. If you live in a large city, you may have to depend upon the greens which some country woman brings to market or upon spinach or kale, which can usually be bought even in winter. Stir flour into melted fat and mix with cold milk. Put the thoroughly cooked dandelion leaves through a sieve or chop them fine and add to the milk. Stir until thickened.

Rice a La South Carolina.
No food, regardless of its merits, will appeal to the consumer unless it can be made into an attractive dish. In this country rice usually comes to the table as an unattractive, glutinous mass, except in certain sections of the South, where it is served with such every tempting and appetizing dish. A platter heaped with loose, fluffy kernels of rice is not only pleasing to the eye, but satisfying to the appetite. Iron is Essential.

What is the particular use of iron foods to our bodies? All green leaves contain in combination with the green coloring matter more or less iron. We are to have rich, red blood we must furnish this iron to our bodies. Dandelion greens are one of the very good sources of iron, containing more than many other sorts of green leaves. We serve greens with hard-boiled eggs for garnish, we have a dish very rich in iron for the egg yolk contributes its share.

Besides the iron and other mineral salts, the leafy vegetables contain a very important substance which the body must have for normal growth and development. This substance, recently discovered and for which a name has not yet been given, is also found in butterfat and some other animal fats, but not in every food.

Greens have a place of real worth in the diet and should be used in every household not only in springtime but late into the summer and, when procurable, in the winter also. The tender leaf tops, celery tops, radish tops, onion tops, and turnip tops should not be discarded, but served as greens. A little spinach in the garden devoted to spinach, New Zealand spinach, or French chard will supply the family with summer greens and also afford some material for eating for use during the winter months.

Lettuce leaves, which are sometimes cooked for greens, and spinach, both being mild flavored and containing much water, require no water for cooking in addition to that which clings to the leaves from washing. Other stronger-flavored greens are usually cooked in a small amount of water. Greens should be cooked until tender, but not overcooked. A tiny bit of boiling water added to the water they are cooked in will help the greens to retain their color.

In the country where meat is raised at home, it used to be the custom to keep the joint of the hog for the special purpose of cooking it with greens in the spring. If the joint is not of hard, small pieces of salt pork or the kind of meat which gives richness and flavor when cooked with greens.

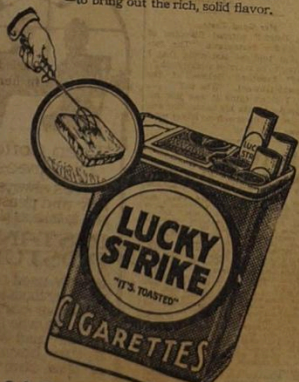
Children should be encouraged to eat greens, as they especially need the iron and the growth-promoting substance which greens furnish. Sometimes they object to the slightly bitter taste which some greens have, but if made into milk soups, the flavor is diluted so that it is not noticeable.

USE A LITTLE VINEGAR IN CLEANING GREENS

All greens must be picked over carefully and carefully washed. This is sometimes a long process, for a large quantity of greens is required to make a dish of the cooked greens. It takes about a half bushel of greens to make a little more than a pint when cooked. A half cup of vinegar in the water in which the greens are allowed to stand before washing is of advantage as it kills the small insects that are sometimes hard to distinguish from the leaves themselves.

When buying cooking greens choose those with round corners, instead of square, whenever possible. They are easier to keep clean.

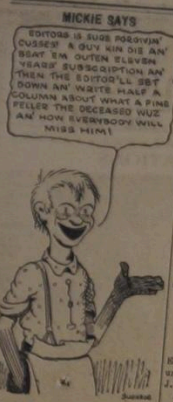

Hence it is readily seen that any of these factors named above may start incubation where the males are kept in a flock. However, it produced a tremendous saving in eggs will result.
