Course Information

Description

Academic Coaches will be interning in classrooms as an assistant teacher. They can assist with preparing classroom materials, leading and preparing lessons, and work with groups or individual students on projects or for extra support.

Academic Coaches are different from TAs, because the expectation is they are working with other students and will be learning the fundamentals of teaching and applying what they are learning during their internship in the classroom.

Format

As a part of this course you will be working alongside a teacher three days a week. Monday/Tuesday, Thursday and Friday unless otherwise approved by the AC advisor. Once a week, typically Wednesdays, students will meet in my office and learn foundational teaching skills and concepts. Occasional Wednesday lessons are completed asynchronously in the BHS Library.

Student Expectations

Attendance and Engagement

Please see the <u>Academic Coach: Attendance</u> document for specific attendance procedures for Academic Coaching. Unless ill, all students are expected to participate in all learning activities, whether these are held on campus or online. If a student is unable to participate in these activities, they must make alternative arrangements with the teacher. Because success in this class is determined mostly by participation, we expect students to prioritize regular attendance. Frequently missing classes is likely to affect your grade. Google Classroom coursework and activities will be assigned weekly and are expected to be completed independently unless notified via email or Google Classroom that they will occur in-person.

Academic Honesty

Honesty is a compelling principle by which we operate all aspects of student and school life. Academic honesty is highly valued at BHS. Students should not cheat or plagiarize, nor should they tolerate such among fellow students. Students do not receive credit for work that is not their own. Cheating is defined as an attempt to earn credit or receive a grade for coursework in a manner other than defined as acceptable by the teacher. Plagiarism is the taking of language, ideas or thoughts from another person or resource without acknowledging the source. Students who use plagiarized papers or projects or are involved in any other form of cheating will be subject to reduction in grades and/or disciplinary action for a first offense. Because of the serious nature of academic honesty, violations of this code may result in loss of credit for the assignment with a recorded failing grade. It may also entail loss of credit for the course with a recorded failing grade, removal from the course with a failing grade, and/ or additional appropriate disciplinary action. Communication

Majority of communication will be done via email and Google Classroom. If you would like to be added as a guardian to google classroom to receive summaries, please send me an email and I will quickly get you added to your student's account. Occasionally I will send out a mass email via Skyward messenger. Those messages will come through as an email and will also show when you log into Skyward.

Attendance

Attendance is a key factor to success as an Academic Coach. Attendance is recorded at the start of every class.

Grading

Bainbridge High School reports grades at the end of each semester; progress reports are available for at the end of Term 1 and 3. Letter grades are calculated using the following grading scale:

Google classroom activities and Assignments: Weekly assignments and activities shall count for 40% of student grades. **Assignments are not accepted 1 month after the due date**.

<u>Classroom participation and evaluations</u>: Participation in academic coaching settings and evaluations account for 60% of student grade.
