and when he opened it, all the people stood up.

⁶Then Ezra blessed the LORD, the great God, and all the people answered, 'Amen, Amen', lifting up their hands.

Then they bowed their heads and worshipped the LORD with their faces to the ground.

⁷Also Jeshua, Bani, Sherebiah, Jamin, Akkub, Shabbethai, Hodiah, Maaseiah, Kelita, Azariah, Jozabad, Hanan, Pelaiah, the Levites, helped the people to understand the law, while the people remained in their places.

⁸So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation.

They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading.

9 And Nehemiah,
who was the governor,
and Ezra the priest and scribe,
and the Levites who taught the people
said to all the people,
'This day is holy to the LORD your God;
do not mourn or weep.'

For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law.

Reading the Writings This Week

This it the one Nehemiah text in the RCL cycle
I've preached it only in 2010 and 2019 this century
and treated the Chronicler's books in overview study,
late intertestamental products

Our bibles place Chronicles, Ezra and Nehemiah after Kings, As if a continuation of those Former Prophets, as histories Though Chronicles rewrites Samuel-Kings eras Tanakh places them near the end of Ketuvim, writings

Our Ezra-Nehemiah was Esdras I and Esdras II in the Vulgate, Esdras B and Esdras C in the Septuagint Only as late as Luther does this book get the name Nehemiah

Esdras A (LXX) is Esdras III (Vulgate), First Esdras (Apocrypha) Esdras (Prophet(LXX is Esdras IV (Vulgate, II or IV Ezra (Apoc) They're offering contested accounts of the early Second Temple From late 500's BCE through 400's BCE (up to 8 Maccabees books survey the Greek era BCE) This tale of rededication of the Second Temple
Within the rebuilt walls of Jerusalem,
In the high holidays season,
Portrays residents of Judea gathered
In a court by the Water Gate

It may remind you of other tales:
Moses addressing Israel at the Jordan
Hezekiah reading the law at the First Temple
60 inauguration ceremonies in the Excited States

It's a model ritual for a nation,
No longer claiming independent isolation as a state,
led by governor Nehemiah, scribe/prophet Ezra
but not a Davidic king, just Persian appointees

Aaronic/Zadokite priests and Levitical ones Listed in the verses omitted in the lectionary read aloud the ancient Hebrew scrolls for hours translated into Targum Aramaic and interpreted

> The people weep and celebrate, in a liturgy of atonement, confessing the Torah not followed, and sharing with needy neighbours

Reading the Epistle This Week

This second half of 1 Corinthians is well-used by us a homily of diversity within a greater unity, organizational encouragement to members of a whole

Our Calvinist predestinarian ancestors read roles as given –
If your place is foot or eye, don't deny it, or change it
Nor reject what God made as part of our whole

Our consumerist Arminian individualism
With emphasis on choice, conversion
May find this text chafing

That may give an epiphany about the closing bit

The weaker or less respectable members –

And how we embrace them in solidarity, identification

Reading the Gospel This Week

Luke presents this launch of Jesus' ministry on the heels of baptism and temptation in the desert – back to Galilee, before disciples are called – in Nazareth a rejection postponed till c.13 in Matt 13, c.6 in Mark

The Isaiah 61:1-2 and 58:6 is only in this gospel it lays out a template of a prophet's programme, for Luke's Jesus the prophet to enact, shaping his life

If you try to act out the story —
How does Jesus read one bit, then roll back to another,
Does he read and teach in Hebrew, Aramaic, or Greek,
From Nevi'im, Targum, or Septuagint?

In the last century, we sang and preached Luke 4 lots the campaign rally slogans of a 'social justice' church when the UCC touted a social welfare state, as conscience of the nation – but now?

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
