LEFT HOME TOGETHER, MEET AGAIN IN ENGLAND

Meeting somewhere in England recently were two Oshkosh boys, Pvt. First Class Stanley Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Clark, 162 Third avenue, and Pvt. First Class William Tarala, son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Tarala, 264 Sawyer avenue, according to information contained in letters received by the parents.

The soldiers apparently met accidentally, probably being assigned to the same post for a brief period. Both are well and happy.

Of interest in the letter written by Private Clark was his description of the American Red Cross, of which he spoke highly, stating that "they sure treated us swell" in several places enroute to England.

Private Clark, who is a member of the engineers, and Private Tarala, a member of the medical corps, both graduates of the January, 1941, class of Oshkosh High school, entered the service with the same group Feb. 4 of this year at Fort Sheridan, Ill.

Private Clark prior to his overseas assignment was stationed at Camp Swift, Tex., and Shreveport, La., and Private Tarala was stationed at New York City and Fort Devens, Mass.

Prior to entering the service, Private Clark was employed at Neenah and Private Tarala in Oshkosh. Both are former members of troop 10, Boy Scouts of America.

Corporal Telleson explained he had been selected as six from a group of 10 from overseas duty and sent to the states for training Point. The young soldier leave Sunday for La Fol school at Easton, Pa., where he will be located until next when he will go to West.

Both mechanics in crew of the Eighth air force corporal Telleson and his Corp. Theodore Telleson the service Jan. 6, 1943 received training together at Field, Biloxi, Miss., Boeing aircraft school at Wash. They arrived over 15, 1943. Both are holders of overseas ribbon and promotion, the latter of which awarded all members of for outstanding performance duty. Promotions to first of corporal were received by both brothers on the day the regiment completed its 100th.

England, to Corporal Telleson, is 50 years old though he said the English are very hospitable to American soldiers.

The Telleson brothers are honor graduates of Oshkosh school. Prior to entering service Merle attended NYA at Oshkosh school and was employed at the marine supply.

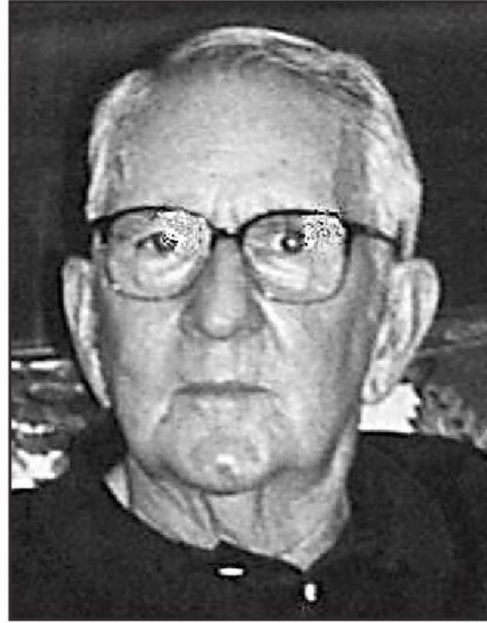

Sgt. Stanley Clark is home on a nine-day furlough visiting his wife, Mrs. Shirley Clark, and son, Dennis, Route 2, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Clark, 162 Third avenue. He has just returned from 25 months overseas duty in the European theater of war, where he served with an engineering battalion which participated in five major campaigns from D-day until V-E day. At the end of his furlough, Sergeant Clark will report to Fort Sheridan, where he will receive his discharge from the service.

Stanley E. Clark, age 89 of Neenah, died Monday, September 3, 2012 at The-da Clark Medical Center. He was born February 10, 1923 in Saskatchewan, Canada, the son of George and Mary (Doering) Clark, and moved to Oshkosh, WI as an infant.



On December 19, 1942 he married Shirlee Worden in Oshkosh. He served in the US Army 146th Combat Engineers in WWII and participated in the D-Day invasion of Europe. He was employed by Kimberly Clark Corp. for 40 years. In 1955 he and his family moved to Neenah.

Stanley is survived by his wife, Shirlee; son Dennis (Juva) of Corvallis, OR, and their children, Leo and Michelle Clark of OR; Prama "Florence" Clark of CA; daughter Jill (Lee) Storch of Neenah, and their son, Kevin (Heidi) Storch of GA; and daughter Lisa (Allan) Bell of Appleton. He is further survived by two great-

grandsons, Jackson and Brody Storch.

A memorial gathering for Stan will be held Friday, September 7, 2012 from 5:00 P.M. until 6:30 P.M., followed by an informal memorial service and military honors.

Clark, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Clark, 162 Third avenue, was a member of the first group of assault engineers to land in France on D-day, it was revealed in a letter sent by him to his wife, the former Shirlee Worden, who resides with her parents on Route 3. The assault engineers cleared away the mines, traps and barriers the nazis had planted along the shore. Corporal Clark has been in the army 17 months, and has been overseas about nine months. His brother, Pvt. First Class Arthur Clark, is in England.
