Experience Food Shortages In Foreign Land

Mrs. Doris Zuhlke, 530 Seventh at St., has four sons in military service, three of whom are serving in foreign countries. ET2 Paul Zuhlke and his wife are stationed at Rhoades, Greece, where they are experiencing some of the discomforts of that trouble zone.

Letters from the young couple reveal that things have changed considerably since they went to Greece two years ago. Their greatest discomforts, however, concern the food supply. According to Mrs. Zuhlke they are not permitted to eat food produced in Greece because of the danger involved, and shipments of food from the U.S. are so delayed that much of it is spoiled upon arrival.

A son born to the couple on Jan. 6 arrived at an Army hospital at Szmir, Turkey, the nearest one to their home in Greece. The mother spent two weeks previous to the baby's birth at the hospital and is required to remain two weeks afterwards due to Army regulations regarding service men's families.

The young Mrs. Zuhlke, with other wives of Army personnel, is organizing children in her neighborhood into groups similar to Camp Fire Girls in this country and the young women are trying to provide clothing, meat and milk for children who have very little.

Mrs. Zuhlke is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Sanders of Neenah and is a graduate of Mercy Hospital School of Nursing.

To help the family abroad with its food problem, Mrs. Zuhlke sends food packages to them frequently.
