Design, behavior and detailing of Reinforced Concrete (RC) members under flexure, shear and axial loads; including foundations, disturbed regions and beam-column joints. Design of two-way RC and Post-tensioned (PT) slabs. Introduction to seismic design of RC structures.

Grading Scale

Grades are weighted and averaged on the 4.0 scale. Grades are established per the standards published in the Undergraduate Academic Code as follows:

All unexcused absences count against the comportment grade. Excessive unexcused absences will result in the reduction of a student's final overall grade by one increment for each absence after notification. If absences continue to be disruptive to the class, the student and Dean will be notified, per University policy, that any further absence will result in a failing grade.

Punctuality is expected. A student who is more than 15 minutes late—or who leaves early without approval—may be considered absent by the instructor.
