Key Areas to Focus On:

1. Courses

If you're striving for academic excellence, competitive scholarships, and top-class rankings like Valedictorian, Salutatorian, or Top 10%, it's not just about taking rigorous courses—understanding how your GPA is calculated is just as important!

- Enroll in Rigorous Courses
 - Taking AP, Dual Credit (DC), or IB courses strengthens critical thinking, problem-solving, and analytical skills—and boosts your GPA in weighted ranking systems. Competitive colleges and scholarships look for students who challenge themselves academically.
- Learn Your School District's GPA Policy Not all GPAs are calculated the same! Some schools weigh advanced courses more heavily, while others may exclude specific grades from their calculations. Understanding your district's rules can help you make informed decisions about which classes to take. Check your district's course guide or ask your counselor for clarity!
- Stand Out in College Admissions Admissions officers value advanced course students because it demonstrates initiative, discipline, and academic ambition. A strong transcript with challenging coursework can give you a competitive edge.
- The Path to Top 10% (or Higher!) Your class rank is directly tied to your GPA. Since AP, IB, and Dual Credit courses often carry more weight, excelling in them can increase your weighted GPA, helping you rise in rank and earn distinctions like Valedictorian, Salutatorian, or Top 10%. These honors can open doors to automatic admissions and merit-based scholarships at many universities.













Final Tip: Balance is key! Challenge yourself, but be strategic—excelling in a few rigorous courses is often more effective than overloading and burning out.

2. Extracurricular Activities

- Explore Interests: Join clubs, sports teams, or volunteer opportunities to discover your passions and develop new skills. Internships and part-time jobs can also provide valuable experiences.
- Keep Records: Maintain a detailed list of activities, leadership roles, and awards you have received. This will be helpful for resumes and letters of recommendation later.
