US History I: Economies of North and South Thesis Paper Assignment

Thesis: Your thesis statement must argue whether your topic contributed to rising sectionalism in the United States between 1800 and 1860. Your thesis must be an argument/ statement of opinion that you will use your research to prove. You may choose a more specific topic from the Brinkley chapters on America's economic revolution, slavery and the old south and the era of reforms.

Components:

Works Cited Page due: Monday 3/24 point value: 10

Note: This must be typed, and list at least five sources in proper MLA format. At least two sources must be non-web sources. The works cited list can be changed/updated after this point.

Thesis and citations/notecards due: Wednesday 4/2 point value:20

Students should submit a preliminary thesis and at least 3 notecards from each source they are using (minimum 15 notecards total). Each note card should contain one unique interpretation, fact, statistic or piece of information, and the page it was found on. You will also need at least 3 primary source quotes for this part of the assignment (and in your final paper). You may choose to submit a typed list of citations (the full source information for each source, followed by 3 citations from the source) instead of notecards if you prefer.

Outline due: Monday 4/7 point value: 10

This must be one to two pages typed in MLA format, and should show the preliminary structure of the paper. Include the full text of your thesis statement in the first paragraph section of your outline.

Rough draft for peer edit: Friday 4/11 point value: 30

The rough draft needs to be as close to the final draft as possible: 5-6 pages (typed and double spaced with 1" margins) typed with proper citations and an updated works cited page. You will be peer editing in class on Friday, and should only need to make minor edits to your paper after this point. This phase will not be accepted for late credit.

Final Draft due: Monday 4/14 point value: 100

Your final product will be a well-written, well-edited 5-6 typed, 5-6 double spaced page thesis paper with proper citations and a works cited page attached. Late submissions will be penalized by 10 points per day.

We will go over the research process in class in more detail over the course of the next few weeks. However, the following website, maintained by Purdue University, will most likely be able to answer nearly every question you may have: https://owl.english.purdue.edu/owl/section/2/11/. Use the left menu to navigate through the various topics.

Be aware that any instance of plagiarism will result in a failing grade on that stage of the assignment. Plagiarism consists of passing off another's work as one's own without crediting the original source. Examples of this include directly copying portions of a resource without citing it, using the ideas of a source but slightly changing the words without citing the source, buying or using an essay found online, using an essay written by another student or allowing one's own work to be submitted by another student.
