ABSTRACT:

An abstract not exceeding 300 words should appear here. It should clearly reflect the contents of the paper.

Keywords: Three to five keywords should be written here, separated with a comma.

1. INTRODUCTION

Use this format for each section. Your word count of your full paper ranges between 6,000 – 8,000 words. Provide background and context of the study or discussion. Consider writing down the phenomenon being studied, its significance, and what is already known about the issues.

Consider stating the purpose of your chapter, and end the introduction part with your research questions or objectives.

2. THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

Provide a structured overview of previous studies and theoretical concepts relevant to your topic. Consider defining key terms and concepts, identifying and evaluating existing studies, highlighting any gaps or tensions in the literature, and concluding this part by positioning your chapter in relation to these gaps.

3. METHOD

Describe how your study was conducted. If your chapter is conceptual or theoretical, rename this section (e.g.: Analytical Framework). Write the design by explaining the research approach, the participants or data sources, the instruments or materials, the procedure and the analysis.

4. FINDINGS AND DISCUSSION

Present and interpret your findings. You may divide this section into subsections. Present the results clearly (include tables/figures if needed, see APA 7th format). Consider linking your findings to your research questions and relevant literature. If relevant, reflect on the significance of your study to the field.

5. CONCLUSION

Summarize the main points of your study. Consider writing down the key takeaways, the contribution of your chapter to theory, policy, or practice, the limitations of the study. You can also offer suggestions for future research or application.

Authors should ensure that all references are cited in the text and vice versa. Authors are responsible for checking the accuracy of each reference. APA referencing conventions of 7th edition should be followed (see https://owl.purdue.edu/owl/research_and_citation/apa_style/apa_formatting_and_style_guide/index.html for easy access).
