Past/current experiences working in the field of disabilities:

I am a doctoral student in Occupational Therapy at the University of Illinois Chicago and previously served as a paraprofessional in a Life Skills program, supporting high school students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. My work included facilitating inclusive classroom activities, community-based learning, and collaborating with educators and related service providers to promote student success. Previously, as Manager of Education Programs at the Frank Lloyd Wright Trust and Manager of Public Programs at The Walt Disney Family Museum, I designed and implemented accessible programs, including Family Access Days and resources for visitors with sensory, visual, and auditory needs. Across my career in public and museum education, I have centered accessibility, equity, and inclusion.

Goals for your LEND training experience:

Through my LEND fellowship, I aim to deepen my knowledge of interdisciplinary approaches to supporting individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. I hope to strengthen my skills in systems-level advocacy, policy development, and leadership in order to create sustainable, community-driven change.
