Okay, we'll have those at the next meeting. Uh, we'll move on to, uh, recognitions and presentations. And, uh, the first is our last Unsung Hero of the Year award. Um, this is the December Unsung Hero for the Clayton Valley Women's Club, and I'm just going to read, um, a short piece about them. In 1973 Eldora Hoyer and Emmy Jochimsen were inspired to invite local women to join them at Endeavor Hall to form a women's club. Thus, Clayton Valley Women's Club was organized and federated a year later. Emmy became the charter president, and the first meetings were held at Endeavor Hall. Members immediately made decisions on fundraising and the process for donating the proceeds from those events. They formed committees, special interest groups, and adventure groups. Those early years set the standards and precedence for the club to follow, and the club's purpose was, and still is, service. In the early years, they organized the first Christmas home tour and craft and bake sale. They completed the bicentennial quilt, which is on permanent loan to the city of Clayton. It's— you can see it there in the back of the room. They published 2 cookbooks, organized fashion shows, and held art auctions and wine tastings. They walked for the March of Dimes, organized blood drives and several Black Diamond Balls, chili cook-offs, casino night, and fashion shows. Today, service is still their mission, and every year They offer a \$2,000 scholarship to a girl graduating from Diablo Valley College who is matriculating to a California college or university. They also give donations to the Clayton Community Library, the Clayton and Concord Historical Societies. They collect donations for Pennies for Pines to support reforestation in our state, as well as collect for the Heifer Project, which purchases chickens, cows, and other animals for needy families. They also donate to a women's shelter, Silverwood School, and several local food pantries. For over 50 years, Clayton Valley Women's Club has accomplished so much by giving to Clayton and beyond, and they are still going strong today, making friends and having fun and always welcoming new members. So I am deeply honored tonight to present the December Unsung Hero Award to the Clayton Valley Women's Club.

On behalf of all of the members of the Clayton Valley Women's Club, and many of them are here tonight, I want to thank you for this award. Our club is smaller in size, in numbers, than it has been in years in the past, but but it is still very active in supporting the community of Clayton and the community at large. And the co-president, Linda Garden, is going to say just a couple of more words about the quilt that you saw.

Good evening. Thank you so much. I would like to draw your attention to the quilt on the back row— wall, excuse me. It is on loan to the City of Clayton from the Clayton Valley Women's Club. It is prominently displayed on the wall. It is 6 by 6.5 feet large. It is handmade by our members in honor of the American Revolution Bicentennial, 1776 to 1976, and it was installed July 23rd, 1996. 65 CVWC members worked on the quilt. Their names are embroidered around the center bicentennial logo. 38 6x6-inch squares frame the entire quilt with embroidered signatures obtained from President Gerald Ford, Vice President Nelson Rockefeller, 50 state governors, Governor of Guam Territory, Governor of Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, California US Senators, US Congressmen from California, California State Senator and Assemblyman, County Supervisors Clayton, City Council Members, Mayor of City of Clayton, Clayton Police Chief and Postmaster. So, thank you.

And tonight we have 3 people that we are recognizing for their years of service. The first one is, is not here unfortunately, but that is Zachary Richardson, who is one one of our— is in our maintenance department. Um, he's recently been appointed to the position of senior maintenance worker, so he is helping lead the crews on a day-to-day basis. Uh, Zach has been serving the Clayton community now for 5 years, and we are happy to have him. Um, Zach is one of those guys with a smile on his face, a can-do attitude, and is here to get things done and support his crew and the rest of the Clayton team to get the work completed. If you're not aware, our maintenance division is small but mighty. There are 5 full-time employees at this time to serve the entire city. So they are running from activity to activity, if you will, and then something else breaks and they run to that one. So with that, I would just like to recognize Zach for his 5 years of service and congratulate him on that achievement. The next person, a little bit longer than Mr. Richardson, is Richard Ania II, who has been serving the Clayton community in the police department for 20 years. Quite, quite a lengthy stay here to be commended, obviously. Rich, if any of you know him, is dedicated to Clayton, has been obviously for staying here for 20 years, ingrained in the community, knows the community, knows many, many residents by name and face, and has built a trust with the community, which is critically important in law enforcement, especially in these times. And with that, I will turn it over to Chief Crone for a few words and to congratulate Rich on his 20 years of service.

From his earliest shifts, he was the officer others talked about, the one with an unmatched nose for impaired drivers, the proactive cop who watched over the streets and neighborhoods of Clayton. Year after year, his enforcement efforts removed countless impaired drivers from our roads, undoubtedly saving lives and making our community safer. In 2019, he earned the promotion to sergeant, a role in which his leadership, work ethic, and devotion have shone even brighter. There's simply no one more invested in the Clayton Police Department or the city of Clayton than Sergeant Rich Ania. He lives to serve, whether it's volunteering for extra shifts, making sure the team has every resource they need to succeed, or providing the historical context that helps us understand where we've been and where we're going. Rich is always there, steady, dependable, and all in. As president of the Clayton Police Officers Association, he advocates tirelessly for the men and women who wear the badge. Ensuring their voices are heard and their welfare is protected. Sergeant Enilla's commitment is unwavering. He doesn't just serve and protect, he embodies what those words truly mean. He sets a standard, the example we point to when we speak of pride in this profession. Today, with deep gratitude and genuine admiration, the City of Clayton and the Clayton Police Department proudly honors Sergeant Rich Enilla for 20 years of selfless, exceptional service. Thank you, Rich. Clayton is a better— Clayton is a better, safer place because of you. We are proud to serve with you, Sergeant. Thank you. Would you like to say a few words?

I know that I've developed personally and professionally in the last 6 months working under you, and I appreciate that. So again, thank you.

I can tell you about the first time he and I met, but I won't embarrass him tonight. He did not pull me over. No, no, no, no. He thought I was somebody else. But that's okay. That's, that's for another time. As I said, very dedicated to this community. A pleasure to be around. The conversations I've had with him, the responses that he provides me in real time when we've had some situations that he's dealing with that I need information. I truly appreciate that. And that goes for Rich as well. We have a great group of officers who are dedicated here that are very responsive to the needs of

this community. And that starts with the chief and it follows through to our sergeants who take that lead of the officers on the street. And I think Tim exemplifies that model for the other officers out there. So with that, I'll turn it over to Chief Crone again.

Uh, in 1998, Tim Marshute joined the Clayton Police Department as a reserve officer, and even then, the chief of police took notice of something special: a young officer who already knew the community by name, who treated every call as an opportunity to serve, and who carried himself with a level of professionalism that set the standard for others. In 2000, he became a full-time police officer, and in 2008, he earned the promotion to sergeant. a rank he has worn with quiet pride and steady leadership ever since. For a quarter century, Sergeant Marchute has been far more than a badge number. He is the officer who genuinely cares, who measures success not by the calls he closes, but by the positive difference he leaves behind. He has mentored generations of young officers here in Clayton, patiently passing on the institutional knowledge, practical wisdom, and the unwavering ethical compass that only can come from decades on the job. He is the one you call when the radio system glitches, when a patrol vehicle thingamabob isn't bobbing, or when you need to settle a bet about the best one-hit wonder of 1994. She is the vice president of operations at Choice in Aging, a nonprofit organization that's 76 years old, serving frail elders, people with disabilities, and youth. And I see her every day. She shows up for work. She shows up having read, having studied. She's prepared. She's a fair human being. She's not always easy. She does not take the path of least resistance. She calls out—

I would say that her barometer is this is right or this is wrong, and we go with what's right. And if she learns that something is not right, she corrects, course corrects. She has humility, and she leads with strength and justice. And I think by not having her in a leadership role on your city council, you're doing a disservice to the city of blatant. You're also doing a disservice to this woman who spends a lot of her time and energy and effort giving to this community. And I hope that you consider what is right, what is just, and it's what it looks like when you roll over and don't do what you do for your other colleagues who may not work as hard, who may not have been here as long, and who may not be as admired and respected in the community. Holly Tillman shows up for Holly Tillman shows up for all members of community. Holly Tillman shows

up for those in greatest need. Holly Tillman shows up ready to do work without a previous agenda. And I see it every day, and so do our staff, and so do the frail elders she serves every day. So I hope you consider this. Thank you.
