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III. TEACHING AND LEARNING PROCEDURE

BEFORE/PRE-LESSON PROPER

ACTIVATING PRIOR KNOWLEDGE

Review of Previous Session

In the previous lesson, we explored **integrative creative work**, where different art forms (such as dance, music, visual arts, or theater) were combined to create a meaningful artistic expression. Today, we will focus on how to evaluate such works using **Feldman's Model of Art Criticism**.

II. Understanding Feldman's Model

Feldman's Model is a structured approach to analyzing and evaluating artworks. It consists of **four key stages**:

- 1. **Description** What do you see?
 - Identify the elements used (colors, shapes, movements, sound, composition, etc.).
 - Focus on observable facts without interpretation.
- 2. **Analysis** How is the work organized?
 - Examine how different elements interact (balance, contrast, emphasis, rhythm).
 - Look for patterns, repetitions, or unique artistic choices.
- 3. **Interpretation** What is the meaning or message?

- What emotions, themes, or ideas does the work convey?
- How does it connect to cultural, personal, or social contexts?
- 4. **Judgment** Is the work effective and successful?
 - Evaluate the overall impact and creativity.
 - Consider if it achieves its purpose and connects with the audience.

III. Applying Feldman's Model in Evaluating Integrative Creative Work

When evaluating an integrative creative work, ask these guiding questions:

Description:

- What different art forms are integrated into the work?
- What are the most noticeable elements?

Analysis:

- How do the different elements (music, movement, visuals) work together?
- Are there contrasts or harmonies that enhance the piece?

Interpretation:

- What is the story, emotion, or message behind the work?
- How does it reflect creativity and personal or cultural expression?

Judgment:

- Is the work engaging and meaningful?
- What are its strengths and areas for improvement?

LESSON PURPOSE/INTENTION

Lesson Purpose

The purpose of this lesson is to guide us in the **creation** and **assessment** of integrative creative works that combine multiple art forms (such as visual arts, music, dance, theater, or digital media)

1. Demonstrate Creativity and Artistic Expression

- Develop a unique creative work that integrates different artistic elements.
- Apply imagination and innovation in their production.

2. Enhance Collaboration and Problem-Solving Skills

- Work individually or in groups to brainstorm, plan, and execute their creative projects.
- Solve artistic and technical challenges during the creative process.

3. Apply Critical Thinking in Artistic Evaluation

- Use structured evaluation methods (such as Feldman's Model) to analyze and assess their own and others' works.
- Provide constructive feedback to improve artistic output.

4. Understand the Role of Art in Communication and Expression

- Explore how integrative creative works convey messages, emotions, and cultural narratives.
- Reflect on the impact of their creations on an audience.

- 12. **Feldman's Model** A four-step process of evaluating art: Description, Analysis, Interpretation, and Judgment.
- 13. **Description** Identifying and stating what is seen or experienced in a creative work.
- Analysis Examining how different artistic elements interact and contribute to the composition.
- 15. **Interpretation** Understanding the meaning, message, or emotions conveyed by the work.
- 16. **Judgment** Evaluating the effectiveness and impact of a creative work based on set criteria.
- 17. **Perspective** The viewpoint or personal understanding applied when analyzing an artwork.
- 18. **Constructive Feedback** Thoughtful and helpful comments aimed at improving a creative work.
- 19. **Artistic Intent** The purpose or message an artist aims to communicate through their work.
- 20. **Impact** The emotional, intellectual, or cultural effect a creative work has on its audience.

DURING/LESSON PROPER

READING THE KEY IDEA/STEM

I. What is an Integrative Creative Work?

An **integrative creative work** is a project that combines multiple art forms, such as visual arts, music, dance, theater, literature, or digital media, to create a meaningful and expressive piece. These works often

communicate a story, emotion, or message by blending different artistic elements into a cohesive presentation.

Examples of Integrative Creative Works:

- ✓ A dance performance with digital projections and live music
- ✓ A theater play incorporating painting and multimedia effects
- ✓ A poetry reading accompanied by visual art and sound effects
- ✓ A short film that includes elements of drama, music, and animation

II. Producing an Integrative Creative Work

The process of creating an integrative creative work involves **planning**, **designing**, **and executing** an artistic vision. Here are the key steps:

1. Concept Development

- Identify a theme or message for the project.
- Decide which art forms will be integrated.

2. Planning and Collaboration

- Assign roles and responsibilities (e.g., who will create visuals, who will handle music, etc.).
- Sketch a storyboard or outline of the creative work.

3. Execution and Production

- Create and refine each artistic element.
- Ensure that different components blend well together.

4. Rehearsal and Finalization

- Practice the performance or presentation.
- Make necessary adjustments to improve quality.

5. Presentation and Exhibition

- Showcase the final work to an audience.
- Deliver the intended message through artistic expression.

III. Evaluating an Integrative Creative Work

After producing the creative work, it is important to assess its effectiveness. A structured evaluation process helps artists improve their craft and appreciate others' work.

One common method for evaluating art is **Feldman's Model of Art Criticism**, which consists of four stages:

- 1. **Description:** Identifying what is seen or experienced in the creative work.
 - What elements are present? (e.g., music, movement, colors, shapes)
 - o What art forms are integrated?
- 2. **Analysis:** Examining how different elements interact.
 - How do the various components contribute to the overall piece?
 - Are the transitions and combinations smooth and effective?
- 3. **Interpretation:** Understanding the meaning or emotion behind the work.
 - What message or story does the piece convey?
 - How does it connect to cultural or personal experiences?
- 4. **Judgment:** Evaluating the effectiveness of the creative work.
 - o Did it achieve its intended artistic goal?
 - What are the strengths and areas for improvement?

DEVELOPING and DEEPENING UNDERSTANDING OF THE KEY IDEA/STEM

Part 1: Group Creative Production

* Instructions:

- 1. Form groups of 4–6 members.
- 2. Each group will create a short integrative creative work (3–5 minutes) that blends at least two different art forms.

- Examples of art forms to integrate:
 - nter/Drama
 - Visual Arts (paintings, drawings, digital art)
 - Music (live or recorded)
 - Dance/Movement
- 3. The performance should convey a theme or message (e.g., culture, environment, emotions, social issues).
- 4. Groups will have 30–45 minutes to plan, practice, and prepare their work.

Guiding Questions for Creation:

- What is our main message or theme?
- Which art forms will we integrate?
- How will we make the elements blend effectively?

Part 2: Presentation and Peer Evaluation

★ Instructions:

- 1. Each group will present their integrative creative work in front of the class.
- 2. After each performance, the class will evaluate it using Feldman's Model of Art Criticism:
- ✓ **Description** What elements are present in the work? (Music, dance, visuals, etc.)
- ✓ **Analysis** How are the different elements combined? Are they balanced and effective?
- ✓ Interpretation What is the message or emotion conveyed?
- ✓ **Judgment** How effective was the work? What are its strengths and areas for improvement?
 - 3. Groups will receive constructive feedback from their classmates and teacher.

Alternative Evaluation Method:

- Use a rubric (scoring creativity, execution, integration, and impact).
- Have groups self-evaluate their own performance before receiving peer feedback.
