PPTG mtg (3/19/25)

PPTG Chair, Beenish

- Next year, we want to coordinate volunteer efforts to avoid volunteer burnout—encourage more volunteer activity, not only in parents' children's classrooms.
- Thinking about Girls Who Code for next year, but that will need a leader

Principal Sudduth

- Stem fair: Principal Sudduth is trying to get teachers to do a classroom project, but kids can do a project on their own too
- School annual academic testing: kickoff rally after Spring Break on Mon 4/7, Testing will start on Tuesday 4/8.
 - Peralta wants to make the testing low key, and low stress. Parents are encouraged to make sure children are sleeping properly and eating. Testing is typically about an hour, but it isn't timed, some kids might take longer
 - 2 weeks of testing total

Safety meeting

- main topic was ICE protocol. We don't have much ICE presence in our area. And, the school doesn't provide information to ICE, and they aren't allowed on our campus.
 - If it looks like there will be an issue, the school will call a 'Culture Keeper' to support.
 - If anyone in the family is in jeopardy, the school will meet with the family in advance to have a safety plan in place for the children, including who to contact if they're detained. All of this is on the OUSD website.
- Question about the email Principal Sudduth sent earlier this week regarding younger grade students using racist language at school
 - Answer: This has been observed in the younger, 1st-3rd grades, students using inappropriate and racist language. For example, students being referred to as 'a black monkey', and students being teased about their hair. Nuances of language that kids are picking up on and using. There's a disconnect with the younger groups, they're crying because they know it's bad but they don't know that it's racist.
 - People have also said things about stundents gender
 - Principal Sudduth gives the younger, K-2nd grade kids a pass because they don't understand what they're saying. She doesn't think it's intentional. Parents are encouraged to talk to their kids about how 'everyone belongs'—everyone belongs, even if they're different.

Treasurer update, Jennifer

We made \$14K with the FUNraisers and \$29K with the auction, which means combined we've met our goal!

Budget survey will be sent out to parents soon. This is especially important given the upcoming OUSD budget cuts next year. Look out for the survey, and please fill it out.

One of the parents talked about their experience volunteering in their son's classroom. How helpful and hopeful it's been, especially now given how difficult this year has been so far.

Principal Sudduth

Next year's financial/budget cuts: Katherine Ramos, SIPPS / literary tutor, will be impacted, which is a big hit for Peralta. Three OUSD schools lost their literary tutors. The grant they used to pay for that was audited and because we're a high performing school we don't qualify for a literary tutor.

Supplemental funds were also taken away from Principal Sudduth, and moved to the central office. The central office will decide how they want to spend that money. Supposedly they're using it for Jennifer Everheart and Christina Means' budget.

- Ms Asha, who's been in the district for 20 years and is close to retirement, the district recently reduced her hours to part-time. Principal Sudduth reached out to PPTG who was able to assist in getting her back to full time.

- The OUSD budget hasn't been finalized yet, though they have made some initial reductions.
- The state is recommending that elementary schools have 500-800 students. There are priority schools—Peralta isn't one because we can't expand our student body, given our space limitations.
- There's been talk for a while about Peralta merging with Sankofa, which could happen since we're not a 'priority school'.
- Question: Teachers' contracts are up this year, any chance of a strike?
 - The district doesn't have a lot of money for raises, which teachers were aware of, but after a letter on 3/15 there are more unhappy teachers. OAA didn't approve the budget cuts. Principal Sudduth isn't sure there won't be a fight.

PPTG budget:

Fireside chat with Principle Sudduth and Brian Wiley, Seeds and Seeds learner Developing Social Emotional Learning for neuro-divergent students and more broadly

Sudduth: Peralta's had more students that are autistic or neuro-divergent, just in the last 3 years, how did Brian get into this field?

Brian: started out as a Manny, for a 4 yo and 7 yo

- 7 yo had autism
- 4 yo had ADHD

Loved mentoring, working with youth, worked as a teacher, worked as a photo-journalist, started working 1:1 with children, studied at Yale

Charters in a class: capturing how students and teachers want to feel

Drawn to helping classrooms and families that need support

Sudduth: how do you know, as a parent, that your child is near-divergent?

Brian: once worked with the family of a 10yo, father was very frustrated, there's a checklist online where parents can go to see if their child is neuro-divergent

- Disorganized
- Unable to focus on one thing

Recommends that parents don't think their child is 'bad', 'lazy', etc, instead talk to the child

Sudduth: a lot of diagnoses: ADHD, autism, aspergers, dyslexia, neuro-divergent

Brian: spectrum is deep and wide, all over the place

- ADHD: child is trying to do 5 things at the same time, difficulty completing things
- Dyslexia: various types of dyslexia

It's challenging if you're a teacher, trying to sort through IEPs, especially in public schools where the teacher might have 20-30 students in the class

Recommends looking for the signs/triggers:

- Child won't look you in the eyes

Seeds: business partner is based out of NY,

Student that was triggered by writing, he felt agitated when the teacher asked the kids to take out their pencils to write about an experience, the student started feeling agitated—

- Step outside for a 'body movement break'
- Jan 26, 2024: the day Brian met the student
- This kid was very fixated on numbers and dates and he immediately knew the significance of that date

Seeds: they meet the student where they're at

Sudduth: what are the things parents can do to set the student up for success? Resources to support parents at home?

Brian: main thing parents can do to help their children is to be on the same page as the teacher, working toward the success of the learner, model some of the behavior for the child - for parents and teachers, show them your strategies and tools that will benefit parents and the learner

Sudduth: one struggle we have is work-refusal, what are some key strategies for this behavior

Brian: focus on the things they love to do, once had a 4 yo preschooler who refused to do circle time, would use a gong and rain stick and breathing ball, get to their eye level

- Start with this to get them grounded in their body
- Front load: talk about what can be done to allow the learner to participate
- at Seeds they take meticulous, detailed notes to figure out if they're growing
- requires patience, stepping outside of the box, flexibility, creativity, step out of your comfort zone

Sudduth: how do you address parents anxiety around children being different

Brian: has several parents that saw it as a death sentence if their child was near-divergent, recommends that parents reframe this to what the child needs, loves working with neuro divergent kids, goes to households that have a visual checklist/chart so everyone knows what's next, recommends that parents take deep breaths, give themselves positive self talk

Questions from the room

parent: Are these practices realistic for Peralta teacher?

Sudduth: a big challenge is moving children at the same pace as the rest of the class

Parent: what is Seeds? Is there a partnership with Seeds & Peralta?

Brian: SEEDS stands for: Social Emotional Education and Development of Self

- Does projects at libraries, for example 2 hour art classes
- Highlights for learners that being different is cool, alright

Parent: more about the company?

Brian: has been around for ~3 years, 10 specialists on staff, likes to have specialists in the area so there isn't a huge commute, visualization, visualize your best self; similar to being an athlete, you need to practice; be the best you can be; positive self-talk; model the things you want your child to do

Sudduth: what kind of work does SEEDS do with the parents?

Brian: observe the home setting first, worked with a family that didn't eat meals together, created 'chef Wednesday', asked 3 questions to get the conversation started, vicious cycle of the family not being together

Principal Sudduth, school updates

- Peralta didn't receive a threat today (unlike other OUSD schools), our emergency procedures are in the school handbook
- Culture plan, good
 - there have been a lot of changes
 - New TK classroom, Mr B has been subbing for Ms Nina in TK
 - Ms Famous is also out on leave, we have a great sub in her class
- Trying to make instrumental music work
 - Starting a Ukulele club on Tuesdays with 4th & 5th grade students instructor: Ms Nona, working with Ms Choi
 - PEACE also started a music program last week
- SSC started
 - Zoom meetings monthly
- Lead
- Principal Sudduth is working with the district

- Oakland schools are mandated to have aftercare available at all schools
- PPTG PEACE Liaison is Mike Sabel
- Family Resource Center at the district there's an EBAC representative who was very helpful
- 'Unduplicated families': are based on household income and/or foster kids, this are kept private, but have priority to any open spaces at PEACE.
 - The 'unduplicated list' for this school year hasn't been published yet

- Waiting for Gavin Newsom to approve the state budget, usually done in June
- Dana will put some of our discretionary budget toward the library
- Ms Lola has done an amazing job, which has changed the culture of reading at our school
- Note: it takes a lot of money to run a library

Ms Lola: book fair

- This money helps fund books in the classrooms
- We got ~\$20k worth of free books this year

Learnings:

- Peralta had one of the worst libraries in OUSD
- Next year will have more class visits to the library
- Libraries are a safe space at schools
- Need 1-2 more years of building and investing to have something modern and useful
- Needs ~\$5k a year to keep the library growing

OUSD budget next year

Dana: don't have specific info yet, other than there will be budget cuts

- Expectation is that OUSD will either close schools or show in their budget how they can be sustainable without closing schools
- Won't know the total budget until June
- It will be difficult to close schools, especially if African-American schools are cut disproportionately
- This is affecting a lot of school districts in the bay area: SF, San Leandro, Hayward, etc.
- SF is planning on closing schools the following year (2025-26 school year)

- Jennifer Everhart was brought in a few years ago to help teach kids how to properly use computer, so our kids are better set up to take the computer based tests than they used to be

Kate Besocke, 4th grade teacher, Portable B

- Testing happens Grades 3-5, sophomore in high school, and senior in high school
- Every state participates except for Nebraska, not sure why

- Paper tests with bubbles and number 2 pencils used to test for whether students could infer. Now they
 are computer focused. Reading multiple texts, short answer responses. A lot of reading, a lot of
 thinking, a lot of writing for ELA. Also math and science test.
 - Question: are kids learning typing skills? Yes there are gamified typing programs we are teaching them
- This year we are doing the Smarter Balance tests. iReady testing will be at the end of the year, separate from the Smarter Balance tests. Should be a lighter lift. 4th graders are prepared. Ms. Besocke's students just completed a university level exercise with pride.
- Super important child be on time, relaxed, good breakfast. Homework will be lighter the next couple weeks. It does ask a lot and the children do need some stamina to get through them.
- First week is ELA, next is math
- T, W, Th are testing days, then a makeup day
- Q: upper grades last year scored much lower than in previous years. What can we do to prepare our students?
 - They have more preparation this year
 - Stronger readers since COVID impact
 - Were given a Smarter Balance pre-assessment earlier in the year and students scored well
 - Kids that were already identified as needing support have received support. This was not the case last year.
- Classroom changes during testing
 - The educational charts come off the wall otherwise trying not to change the classroom too much
 - Added privacy screens to computers, the kids love them. They are decorating them with Ms.
 - There has been some research that chewing gum can help relieve anxiety and help with focus.
 And that sour candy can spark your brain this has been very motivating for the students
 - Cell phones and smart watches are not allowed, they need to be put away
- Students with IEPs will be in a smaller group setting, this will be written on their IEP
- When the test is over they can draw, read a book. They are not able to access any content on their computers. There is a makeup testing room available for students that need some extra time
- This testing does not impact student grades. It can show when a kid is not a great test taker. It helps inform the district what do we need to uplift our kids?
- Results released August or September in Aeries
- 4th grade students in the mixed % class will be taking the 4th grade tests

Auction Update (Jenny & Karen)

- Went over our goal of \$40,000 raised
- Fun-raisers were separate this year brought in \$15,000
- Next year Kathleen is chairing, along with an incoming Kinder mom named Rebecca
- Looking for someone to chair the Fun-raisers. Fun-raisers are parent-hosted events that we sell tickets for. Examples: playdates, meals, activities, hikes.
- Auction ticket sales we only sold 62 tickets, there were 40 volunteers. There are 650 parents at the school, turnout disappointing.
- There was lots of food, open bar, music, great auction items, many deals.
- What can we do that will engage more of the community in events like these? A rich discussion ensued, points raised included:

- Community needs to be cultivated in the day to day. Coffee hour excludes the people that have to go to work. Suggestion: say hi to children, say hi to the parents, embody the community energy you want to see
- Syreeta & equity committee with Dana -we have begun an outreach effort to reach more members of our community.. Turnout is still low. We have been speaking directly to parents of certain ethnic communities, asking a lot of questions Does your child feel seen? Do your children feel comfortable bringing up issues of their identity? Parents responded that the environment is not encouraging people to bring their identity. The team will report back - this is what we heard, can we come together and solve these problems collaboratively
- Suggestion: Use the classroom as a connecting platform. Eg: "Hi, I'm _____I know your child, I'm so and so's parent"
- Suggestion for direct communication rather than Konstella, less personal means
- Is there some value to think about fundraising options that have a more grade based aspect?
 Some grades do camping trips, these ones seem to have more community. Also some modest fundraising.
- Previous racial justice group some of the group wanted to work on policy, others on school climate. No longer operating.
- Question about what is the responsibility or capacity that people have to carry a little bit more when they join PPTG events. If I go, am I going to be asked to do more? Who is welcome in this group? How many black dads have been to the meeting? A lot of these meetings are to try and get more resources from the community that may not have those resources. Or folks might not feel comfortable coming know that they're going to continue to get hit up for money when that is not something they are in a position to offer
- Syreeta We have selected an area to create a Native American garden, requested by Native American community
- o Some feeling that the events we do aren't _____[missed this word]
- Request to bring back the Diversity dinner calling it a Welcome Dinner instead shifted the energy away from celebrating the many cultures and foods that folks were bringing
 - Response: the goal was to shift away from putting the burden of representation on minority families. Worried that minority families had an obligation to teach others about their culture. Maybe more outreach and messaging could be done around this.

Fireside Chat with Syreeta - Diversity co-chair and Nica, Peralta mental health intern

- S: How are our kids doing? How is their mental health? Some kids missed a lot with the pandemic, how are they integrating? Tell us about you and what you do.
- N: From Southern California. Studied psychology at UCLA. Interest in alternatives to punitive discipline. Taught in NYC preschool, 1st, 2nd grade. Behavior intervention specialist, lots of experience with IEPs. Passionate about teaching social-emotional skills. Currently doing a Masters of Social Welfare at Cal, interning at OUSD. Former intern at Destiny Arts social work program.
- N: Meets weekly with each student referred, there are 4 other interns. Play therapy-based, working in the Nest here on campus provided by the PPTG. Important that the children have a sense of connection and safety. A lot of relationship-building, coping skills, varies depending on age.
- · What's the reach of the mental health services?
 - Somewhere around 20 in this program.
- S: Why type of challenges?
 - o N: Overall children have control over so little. I'm seeing that the children feel like they don't have a voice, not feeling seen, heard, understood, not having a sense of agency. For younger kids changes in routine, transitions difficult. If they're associating change with loss they may be afraid of change, transitions can be very disregulating. A lot of peer pressure, expectation of academic rigor. In school in order to perform (school is about performing) when not feeling seen, that can be really triggering. Can impact self esteem. Upper grades: developmentally at this stage social relationships are huge. Social identity is developed by peer validation. If students are feeling left out or have changing relationships, it can be a really big stressor.
- S: How do we help? If our children aren't feeling seen, how do we know that? How do we let them know that we see them? What can we do?
 - o N: Validate and affirm our children. In conversations, we maybe downplay our childrens' knowledge and awareness of what's going on. Work on not talking at them, but with them, at their level.

- o Normalize talking about feelings and the range of them. Model something like this "I'm having a rough day, I'm going to need a little extra patience." Or, "I'm having a hard day, I'm going to take some breaths, do you want to join me?" They are looking at us normalize hard feelings. Tell stories of when you've felt overhwlmed or left out. Keep that conversation open. Kids can feel shame or not want to open up, so keep that communication open. Listening is huge. The biggest thing that I have learned is listening is so powerful. Look in your child's eyes and really listen. Children do not have a lot of agency showing them that we see their humanity helps.
- If kids aren't opening up to you play with them. Let them know that you are there for them. It's the little things.
- S: Are there warning signs, behaviors that we could be looking out for? Signs that our children might need some external support?
 - N: Different levels of severity. Sometimes kids get upset, they don't want to go to school.
 Duration can be important if it's not going away. Also the intensity pay attention to that. All behavior is a message the language they speak is through behavior. Behaviors are not arbitrary and there's always a message behind them.
- If this resource isn't available for our children what can we do?
 - o Modeling. Children are looking to us. Model how to regulate, take care of ourselves. Name your feelings, suggest an exercise to do together that might help you, invite them in. Narrate what's happening for you when you are having difficult emotions. Like, my shoulders feel slumped, I feel slow, I feel sad. Name your emotions and how you're going to cope with those emotions. Help kids narrate what's going on for them. If child is kicking and screaming saying something like "I can tell you must be really upset, you must be frustrated." Or, "I can see your face dropped down, are you feeling upset?" You're not necessarily waiting for a response, just helping find a name for the emotion
 - o Validate their feelings! Let them know it's okay not to feel ok. It's ok to be in a bad mood, to be disappointed. Opening up dialogue. Affirm them. The validation will help inform their internal dialogue. This can empower them.

1/10/2023 PPTG Meeting Notes

Erin Lenhert presented an overview of the budget. Budget planning for the following school year typically starts around Spring Break. The treasurer team (3 members) and co-chairs look at historical spending and fundraising goals to present a draft to the leadership team (20 people) provide feedback, and the Principal reviews. Spring survey of parents help's prioritize programs. Over the summer, the budget is refined and than brought to the full PPTG in the fall for approval.

This year was our first back-to-normal (ish) budget since Covid. Even last year, expenses and fundraising were different. This year, costs went up particularly for employee wages to ensure full staffing. We dipped into reserves (35K) to support kids recover from Covid. Fundraising looks like we'll come in at projections. STIP is a permanent sub (Jennifer Rosen SY 22-23) who also assists in classroom interventions. See budget in agenda for specifics. The majority of spending (classroom support and enrichment) funds staffing.

Title 1 schools (50+ low income) get federal funding to support enrichment and other programs. Peralta is under that threshold, so we have to ask the District for support. Wages have increased significantly, which means PPTG cannot continue to fund. This year's TSA was Melinda Vargas who moved to teach 1st grade. The position was changed to be an additional STIP sub and Principal Suddeth plans to staff soon. Our site with have 50k to spend for the additional coaching/staffing this year. It's possible that the District has support from the ESSR grant that could support a TSA and a STIP sub. But the STIP sub is all that is guaranteed. District hopes to fund STIP

We spend about 950/kid and we may want to consider moving that up. That might help us raise enough to add a $4^{th}/5^{th}$ grade aide.

Looks like we'll get 50K for arts from prop 28. We might be able to use for Luz but it's uncertain if that's possible or if the role needs a credential. The bond continues until the prop changes.

District support for STIP and Prop 28 funding relieves the pressure on the PPTG budget.

Ms. Jill's role is expanding and moving from vocal music for 4th/5th grade to supporting classroom math. She is a credentialed teacher and tutor. This change was made in response to standardized test scores. She may squeeze in a little more vocal music if possible and 5th grade will still have a performance at the end of the year.

Still planning on having puberty workshop, skipping lice check.

Expecting to have a ½ grade combo class to make the increased K enrollment work. We need to have an average class size of 24 across K-2.

The SSC meeting is tomorrow at 6:15. Join for more information on school academic plans.

Equity Chair Syreeta Mussante will be at SSC to strategize how to support testing for the entire school and to address the racial equity gap, particularly for African-American students. Much of the effort is supporting students and families to maintain a positive attitude for success. Improve Peralta's community and sense of belonging.

Sam Davis – measure 8 continues the existing tax that supports Oakland high schools. Yes on H. Sets up high schools into academies which helps with success rates.

Principal Suddeth update: kids are eating inside due to a rodent problem. Decision was made with lots of stakeholders to develop a vector abatement plan. Poison application and garden landscaping plan. AIG grant – provides a theater program with ACT. Delayed start date because of a contract issue. Mental health services start soon – ask Irma for referrals. Halloween parade will be Monday at 1:30. Don't wear costumes to school; will change in class. Safety plan – earthquake drill on Friday morning.

Update from Kindergarten teachers: Camille, Sonia & Nina. English Language arts program – studying the weather. Sight words and stretching words help kids develop building blocks of reading and writing. Focus on sight words at home. Biggest leap in writing and reading happens in 1st grade. Teachers will share out the sight words with families (moved from 25 to 75). Studying numbers through 5 in math, working with partners on number games. Multiple ways to solve a problem. Will go through teens by the end of the year. Pandemic delay in Kinder has abated this year. SEL was tougher last year than this year. It's helpful to support kids in independence. Parent conferences happen the week before thanksgiving – early dismissal all week.

Jamie Dunbar, Walkathon Co-chair. – update on the Walkathon. Was a big success. Thank you to Erin Lenhert. 250 kids participated and it looks like we'll raise 45k. Used a new portal (gift butter) and it went well. Maybe next year be more descriptive about ways people can contribute. Maybe set goals for fundraising? Kid-led fundraiser.

Introduction to equity chair, Sareeta. Kinder-parent. Role is to be available to access/make suggestions about the school's traditions. Assessing the current resource groups for marginalized communities. Reach out to her about issues of concern.

Jenny funraiser update. Raised 5,500 K. More for sale in the spring, particularly those hosted by teachers.

School Updates from Shirley

- COVID updates
 - Last week all negatives for COVID testing. Short period with 0 cases
 - o 3 cases called in over the weekend, 1 rapid case found this morning
 - 95%-98% vaccinated 53 Peralta students have had a case that we know of. We're not seeing spikes in cases - school is not a super-spreader environment.
 - Only 10 families don't want to be tested.
 - Kids are doing well with this variant, about half of them didn't have symptoms. On the other hand many families have gotten very sick and lost people. Please keep up with protections.
- New staff hired- Mark Jager and
- School Climate Survey 150 students took this. Kids overall feel safe and really like their school
- Stewardship teachers have been working on instilling kindness, responsibility, accountability among students. How to be a good friend, help the environment, etc.
- School closures: Peralta is fiscally sound, we're not in danger of closing because of high enrollment and good attendance. Keep in mind Oakland is in crisis, please attend meetings, stay present to what's happening in our communities and amongst our friends.

Safety Patrol Team Need -Dylan Nolfi

- Dana street drop-off zone
- I've been doing this for 7 years. Students are showing up and enthusiastic.
- 20-30 students participate in the program every year. 4th and 5th grade students, 3rd graders are
 invited to join at the end of the year. One student commits to one day a week. They're usually
 enthusiastic in the beginning and want to come every day, but this can lead to quick burn-out. One daily
 parent volunteer. Depend on parent volunteers to operate the crosswalk. Kids can't do safety patrol
 without an adult. Adults stay from 8:05 to 8:35
- This program is 100 years old, run by Alameda county, underwritten by AAA. Some schools run their own school patrol programs. What we get from the program is insurance for the students that are participating as well as stop signs and other materials (we own the materials however). Some requirements of the program are to join a meeting once monthly (during non-covid times). Peralta could move away from this and create their own program.
- Dylan's role is as advisor. Mentors students and coordinates with them. I'm at school every day from about 8:15 to 8:45. It teaches really great community service, being kind to each other, thinking about

the safety of one another. Keeps a safe drop off zone to prevent people from stopping where they aren't supposed to, could endanger those that don't go to Peralta

- We could reduce the amount of time someone in Dylan's role would take by having a second parent come for when the kids go inside to school.
- Some years the role gets a stipend. Also some school sites have a staff member that participates on the team.
- At minimum 5 parents should be lined up in the beginning of the year, before school starts.
- There is now an electronic registration system which has really simplified things.
- Co-leadership role is an option too, though the county would likely need to have just one person set up as a vendor.
- Alison: her daughter has been doing it since 3rd grade. Helps when needed or as available. Great for
 the kids and for the participating parent. Kids get a lot out of it. There can be some close calls with the
 rush of cars and kids. Really does add safety in addition to leadership skills. Kids take their job really
 seriously, great to greet and welcome the community. Since you're bringing your kid anyway, it just
 means showing up a bit early. Santosh: really helps to have a second parent volunteer.

- -Coordinator for Summer Colby Park welcome parties (usually have incoming kindergarteners and an older student).

New PPTG CoChairs:

Erin Rich (two current second graders, looking forward to new role at Peralta!) Christina Means (current first grader, incoming kinder; looking forward to it!)

(And thank you to Drew and Kristel for their three years in the role.)

Budget:

Drew - We need to agree on a Draft Budget. This year there is extra emphasis on "DRAFT" because Dr. Clem has a wishlist and we will not know about OUSD funding until summer.

Jocelyn presented a summary of anticipated costs and income.

Total expenses at \$294K. (Separate fund of \$10K for supporting Sankofa.)

Dr. Clem says OUSD is going through all the wishlists from all the schools. It may not be the person we hired or people in our local control, though principals are working on that. We just can't guarantee that the COVID relief money will be able to be used for the exact things that we've used in the past. What we get from the government may be parts of people's time, as opposed to funds – may not be of our own design.

Question for Garden Budget (Sarah Selvidge) – is the same amount is budgeted as last year, but we weren't here last year, and we'd like to return to having a garden support worker and activities on campus. Garden Committee wants to advocate for institutionalizing those activities to benefit the students and build on all the garden work everyone did this year.

Drew – Actually, we're back to \$7,500, which is back to pre-pandemic levels (as opposed to \$500 for this year) – some confusion in reading the form during the meeting. Encourage communication this summer between PPTG Chairs and Garden Committee.

Grant for cross grade projects with Art and Dance. Ellen would take older grade kids over to work with younger grade kids to do art projects. Sherice would take older grade kids from Sankofa over to work with our younger kids on dance. We wrote the grant for Sankofa because our school is not eligible, but it can work as a partnership. Performances planned, using Sankofa's large auditorium.

We ended the year in the black (still two months left). This is because our teacher aides are being subsidized by the federal government – PPP Covid Relief Money – so that kept us on budget.

It is typical that each year's budget runs somewhat of a deficit. Financially we have enough money in the bank to start the school year started (about \$200K), and the hope is that after Dr. Clem gets some money information from the OUSD and our budget will be more neutral when the school year starts. We also budget our fundraisers conservatively, but we typically exceed our fundraising goals, so in past years our budget has evened out.

Coach is moving out of the Bay Area because of his wife's job, so we will greatly miss him. We've posted the job, but much of the interest has been art related and wanting to be incorporated into our art curriculum, but that isn't Coach's job. So we're working on recruiting in different avenues. Drew thinks we can keep with the same budget designation, however Dr. Clem fills it.

Motion to Approve the Draft Budget (Kristel). Second. Vote.

Observe 17 YES votes. Zero NO Votes.

Thank you. We passed a Draft Budget. Will revisit in the summer.

Outdoor Learning Spaces – Proposal for using Peralta Rising Fund

(Drew presenting survey results)

Survey conducted this past week. 90 people completed the survey, and nearly everyone approved the expenditure.

Some questions raised in the survey:

Will this help our kids get back to school? Sorry, no, we don't have any control over this decision. It's up to the school district. But if we're back in school we'd love to have more outdoor learning options

Timing? If we all pitch in it will be quicker.

Did we have any other plans for this money? No, we did not. The money has been sitting there for capital expenses and emergencies, and this fits both.

The plans are not lavish. If there are more interests, concerns about the details of the project, come to Garden Work Day and/or ask specifically.

Seismic needs? OUSD says we don't have any.

OUSD is dealing with air filters in the classrooms.

An equity concern about spending the money "just" at Peralta. The money was donated for Peralta specifically, so we are going to keep that restriction on the money in place. Certainly other ways to express interest in funding for other projects.

Any Questions?

Interest in the proposal as it was presented at the last meeting. Relinking to the slides.

Doing a walk through with the teachers on professional development day next week.

What involvement at Garden work day? – whole range of manual labor, weeding, raking, and also building furniture, depending on skills and interests.

Are there costs to doing short term projects that would have to be converted to long term use? There are some plans for temporary shade tents and nice umbrellas, and could be used in the future for events. But we also want to pursue these projects for planting and more significant long-term use for outdoor spaces that will better facilitate learning.

How can kids help? Unfortunately kids aren't allowed onsite. We intend for the younger kids to participate in design of some of the shade structures. And the teachers might be able to incorporate remotely. As soon as allowed to, we'll be incorporating students.

VOTE AND APPROVAL - \$40K for this from the Peralta Rising Fund. (Affirmatively raised hands for approval (able to see 13 votes); NO votes against.)

February 3, 2021 PPTG Meeting

Announcements:

(Principal, Dr. Shirley Clem)

Picking a Mascot – Through the Monday Morning Meetings with the students, Shirley has engaged the students in what might make a good mascot. The ideas so far are ladybugs, lemmings, jaguars, pandas; we'll continue to collect ideas. Can email ideas to Shirley on Konstella. She's also asking for a rationale as to why the students want a particular animal. Staff will narrow it down to a few choices for voting. Once we pick, we can make some spirit gear, swag, Tshirts, etc.

Library - Our library is organized like a teacher would organize, but difficult for students to find things (as opposed to a Dewey system, for example). We'd like to create a fiction, nonfiction, reference section with some labeling so that students can find things. We'll also do some upgrade and cleanup of the library, remove things that aren't getting a lot of use. Don't need a lot, just need some really good things. Looking for a few volunteers. Can be done at your leisure while the school is open during the day. Jennifer Everhart and Sonia K. are on board and excited for working with parents. We've got PPE, and will follow safety protocol.

Heather Dodge (parent) would like to volunteer, and is a librarian. She knows some other librarian parents may be interested. Hadn't wanted to step in earlier, but thought people liked it that way. (Shirley) - everyone is ready for a change.

Auction Update:

This year we're excited to have a professional auctioneer. He's done some walkthroughs, so the team is excited.

We're collecting auction items. Step up if know of items that can be donated, like rental homes, for example, to help make up for lost asks to businesses due to the pandemic.

Puberty Ed.:

Traditionally the PPTG sponsors puberty education (outside teacher) for the 5th graders, and we're doing so this year too. Scheduled online during President's Day week (T,W,Th), three days. Still making it work despite the pandemic and hopeful it will be a good experience online.

Virtual Schoolyard Party:

Raquel Maria Dillon and Heather Dodge – We miss the casual pickup and dropoff social environment of the Peralta campus. It's also nice to know parents from other grades and talk about next year, etc. There's a proposal for a Zoom get together with no agenda, 7pm-8pm next Wednesday, February 10. We can see how it goes. Open to morning times, or later, if that's desired. Just an opportunity to have conversation. A lot of people are missing that.

Outdoor Learning Spaces and Anna's Corner (Garden Committee):

(Sarah Selvidge and Christine Martin - Presentation, using a slide deck)

This is an ongoing project, but with moving targets as the pandemic has changed. It is a design process that is collaborative with the teachers. We're proposing a budget based on these projections.

Outdoor learning is already happening in a lot of places, so there are a lot of resources and places for support out there. For example, even in Portland Maine they are doing outdoor school.

We look at this as an opportunity to build something positive, help teachers, build the relationships between students and kids, and support everyone's health. Coronavirus transmission is so much greater inside than outside. So even though OUSD's focus is on improved indoor ventilation, that's not enough, and we want to develop outdoor options.

First, Anna's Corner - a section of the main garden, near Dana Street, across from amphitheater.

Second, the rear access kindergarten area.

Third, future outdoor learning lab behind the 1-3 grades.

Fourth, exploring 4-5 grade options.

Anna's Corner to commemorate Anna Wyman. Casually known as "the store" by students – sometimes a hair salon or taco stand, some area of pretend commerce. Keep it open for playing. Also, the teachers are

interested in a patch of lawn because we don't otherwise have any other lawn at Peralta. Want to bring up some boulders that could have a lot of uses, endless uses, don't rot, very cheap. Mindful of plant choices. Drought tolerant native plants that could potentially be useful to the play and hosts to native butterflies. Doesn't require infrastructure approval. Open to flexibility of design with the teachers.

Kinderpod – L-shaped area behind the kinder classes. This could accommodate one cohort at a time. Access to three classrooms. Storage options to access supplies. Working on some thorny irrigation issues. Potentially a sandbox, mud kitchen. Goal is to make it a vibrant, joyful, colorful space.

1st-3rd Outdoor Learning Lab – almost entirely not utilized now (just asphalt and some trees). So there are a lot of opportunities for STEAM projects, with a utility sink and more outside room. Could fit three cohorts, but will function well beyond the pandemic. For example, we're considering design options, benches for example, that would avoid the approval processes of more significant infrastructure. Posts for shade sails can attach to benches instead of having to go into the ground, for example.

4th-5th additional plans – some area by North Street could be used as a pollinator garden as an homage to Ms. Pam, retired first grade teacher who spearheading lessons on bees.

Paying for this. Budgeting total is nearly \$40K. (Estimated \$39,437.00.)

There is a Peralta Rising Fund that was gifted to the school after a fire. It is for capital improvements. In addition, there are possibilities we could get money from OUSD (though we're not sure, and they're not that focused on outdoor spaces for our school because others are more in need), government funding, measure Y funds, grants, donations (auction), in-kind donations.

Timeline goals. Continuing to design, and work at Garden Day later this month. After more coordination with OUSD, we hope to be working by May. We welcome everyone's participation. Looking for feedback, ideas, help.

Questions:

At a OUSD listening session, question about opening playgrounds and ballfields, so is there any insight on that? Right now we know that unfortunately right now kids can't come to garden work day. Not sure about OUSD's steps on access.

Drew – Hoping for a sense of appetite for using the Peralta Rising Fund for this. Should we look at other sources, and use this as a backstop? Or should it fund it fully?

Question - are the multiple phases, can we authorize a start to get it going, while we also consider other sources of funding?

Sarah – the timeframe is pretty short for a lot of work. The permission issues from OUSD are thorny, so we have to be pragmatic. Because we have so much to do and without professionals (though there are professionals on our team), we have to start with the things that we can do without permission.

The PPTG meetings are the opportunity to speak voice to this issue and how money is used. This is how we approve use of our budget and the Peralta Rising Fund.

Ellen Oppenheimer (art and cooking teacher with long-time involvement in the community, part of PPTG) - Concern of the optics of approving use of the money with only about two dozen people on the line.

Question – Can SSC approve? The money is governed by the PPTG, not the SSC.

Having these spaces will not impact when we can bring kids back to campus. Except that it may impact how afterschool can operate. The kids will return at a certain time. But we think the quality and safety will be better if have outdoor spaces.

To get more input, we could fast track another PPTG gathering in order to give another opportunity to approving funding. What is the impact of charter schools?

Austin -

I met with charter school group on Monday. Don't want to criticize families and teachers who choose that. It's about acknowledging big systems issues. Charter schools drain enrollment in public schools. No 40 year leases to charter schools.

Stacey -

In favor or moratorium on new charters. Don't want to close, for same reasons mentioned.

Would be great if could incentivize their return to the district.

And can we merge in underutilizied space, and not have an us versus them system

Sam -

District hasn't approved new charters since 2016. We don't need any new – community agrees – also don't need to district schools. Practical approach – charters that are equitably enrolling are welcome to stay and provide for communities.

And if they aren't, they shouldn't be candidates for continuing relationship.

Example of NAACP leader who explained that for many black families this was first option at successful school.

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Are there costs to doing short term projects that would have to be converted to long term use? There are some plans for temporary shade tents and nice umbrellas, and could be used in the future for events. But we also want to pursue these projects for planting and more significant long-term use for outdoor spaces that will better facilitate learning.

How can kids help? Unfortunately kids aren't allowed onsite. We intend for the younger kids to participate in design of some of the shade structures. And the teachers might be able to incorporate remotely. As soon as allowed to, we'll be incorporating students.

This year we're excited to have a professional auctioneer. He's done some walkthroughs, so the team is excited.

We're collecting auction items. Step up if know of items that can be donated, like rental homes, for example, to help make up for lost asks to businesses due to the pandemic.

Puberty Ed.:

Raquel Maria Dillon and Heather Dodge – We miss the casual pickup and dropoff social environment of the Peralta campus. It's also nice to know parents from other grades and talk about next year, etc. There's a proposal for a Zoom get together with no agenda, 7pm-8pm next Wednesday, February 10. We can see how it

goes. Open to morning times, or later, if that's desired. Just an opportunity to have conversation. A lot of people are missing that.

Outdoor Learning Spaces and Anna's Corner (Garden Committee):

(Sarah Selvidge and Christine Martin - Presentation, using a slide deck)

This is an ongoing project, but with moving targets as the pandemic has changed. It is a design process that is collaborative with the teachers. We're proposing a budget based on these projections.

Outdoor learning is already happening in a lot of places, so there are a lot of resources and places for support out there. For example, even in Portland Maine they are doing outdoor school.

We look at this as an opportunity to build something positive, help teachers, build the relationships between students and kids, and support everyone's health. Coronavirus transmission is so much greater inside than outside. So even though OUSD's focus is on improved indoor ventilation, that's not enough, and we want to develop outdoor options.

First, Anna's Corner - a section of the main garden, near Dana Street, across from amphitheater.

Second, the rear access kindergarten area.

Third, future outdoor learning lab behind the 1-3 grades.

Fourth, exploring 4-5 grade options.

Anna's Corner to commemorate Anna Wyman. Casually known as "the store" by students – sometimes a hair salon or taco stand, some area of pretend commerce. Keep it open for playing. Also, the teachers are interested in a patch of lawn because we don't otherwise have any other lawn at Peralta. Want to bring up some boulders that could have a lot of uses, endless uses, don't rot, very cheap. Mindful of plant choices. Drought tolerant native plants that could potentially be useful to the play and hosts to native butterflies. Doesn't require infrastructure approval. Open to flexibility of design with the teachers.

Kinderpod – L-shaped area behind the kinder classes. This could accommodate one cohort at a time. Access to three classrooms. Storage options to access supplies. Working on some thorny irrigation issues. Potentially a sandbox, mud kitchen. Goal is to make it a vibrant, joyful, colorful space.

1st-3rd Outdoor Learning Lab – almost entirely not utilized now (just asphalt and some trees). So there are a lot of opportunities for STEAM projects, with a utility sink and more outside room. Could fit three cohorts, but will function well beyond the pandemic. For example, we're considering design options, benches for example, that would avoid the approval processes of more significant infrastructure. Posts for shade sails can attach to benches instead of having to go into the ground, for example.

4th-5th additional plans – some area by North Street could be used as a pollinator garden as an homage to Ms. Pam, retired first grade teacher who spearheading lessons on bees.

Paying for this. Budgeting total is nearly \$40K. (Estimated \$39,437.00.)

There is a Peralta Rising Fund that was gifted to the school after a fire. It is for capital improvements. In addition, there are possibilities we could get money from OUSD (though we're not sure, and they're not that focused on outdoor spaces for our school because others are more in need), government funding, measure Y funds, grants, donations (auction), in-kind donations.

Timeline goals. Continuing to design, and work at Garden Day later this month. After more coordination with OUSD, we hope to be working by May. We welcome everyone's participation. Looking for feedback, ideas, help.

Inclusive hub that would support special ed, kids with IEPs, families with essential workers, single parents, other students that are struggling or not showing up. Jonathon Stewart & Rachel Latta: Presentation

Goal: Peralta and other schools that are interested have high demand. This would give families that don't have neighborhood priority, access that they wouldn't otherwise have. Priority ranking changes have already been made at MetWest and CCPA.

Edna Brewer, Sequoia, Chabot - have identified that they've been becoming more wealthy and more white. Thought about ways to maintain diversity or get it back to where it was (in the case of Chabot). Think more about the goal, and less about the mechanics. Note this is not diversity as a commodity. Link to enrollment data:

74% of students at Peralta live in the neighborhood, compared to 09/10 when 45% students lived in the neighborhood. One of the highest in the city. Peralta is the most full school of those attempting a pilot program. MetWest is close, but they don't have a neighborhood catchment.

Timeline: decision needs to be made in the next year, ready to be part of the 22/23 school year Questions:

Where are we now? We are deciding whether we want to move forward with our own pilot. If we do, what are the details about identification that we will use?

Are people interested in having a conversation about changing our enrollment process at Peralta? 6 or 7 informal votes of support in the chat.

There is a working group already in place - this is an introduction, we need volunteers to join that process, and help get our community engaged. What do we want our school to look like and what might our pilot look like? Where in the process does Peralta the school decide? What is the process? District process: Any pilot has to be approved by the Board. Edna Brewer, Chabot and Sequoia submitted their proposals and it was passed. Now the individual schools need to decide. We as a community need to decide what this process will look like. Teachers, principals and parents need to show broad support. A teacher champion would be helpful. What is it looking like at the other schools? At the other schools, priority has been added for low-income families. It sits below neighborhood priority. There was an attempt to put it higher than neighborhood, but neighborhood families were opposed. The goal is to use census level data to identify the area as low income. Not ideal, but collecting income data at the application stage can be a barrier to the family, and is a challenge to verify. Not legal to identify by race or ethnic background.

Might we be contributing to inequities with this? What does it mean for transportation to school? How will it impact access to aftercare? Can we include schools like Sankofa United as well.

Concern that the message to black and brown and low income people is - you'll need to come over to the white neighborhoods to have equal access to education. This particular pilot is not going to address the inequities of the neighborhood school system. Tension between school choice vs. neighborhood schools

Hello from Principal Dr. Clem

Hello, and thank you to the PPTG. I'm watching all of the hard work that the PPTG has put in. I've watched Coach teach PE, watched Jill do a music session with some kids the other day. Instructional aides. We are working through some glitches getting started, but we're getting there. Ellen's art program is fantastic. She is supporting kids with social emotional regulation through art. She put out spinners - these can also help kids with focusing.

Announcement: we're ready to start scheduling and taking on volunteers! If you want to work with a teacher or do some small group work let us know. Volunteers need to get processed through the ed fund. Let your teacher know or call the school and we'll get you plugged in.

School Site Council has 5 Openings: We have many openings on the School Site Council. One site council at every school is required by the state. This is the oversight and planning committee for funding. There is a big focus on equity, who the money will support. We look at the schools' data. Who is struggling, who needs help. School devises a plan to support the kids with needs. For example, literacy, or professional development for staff. Part of a growth plan for the school to better address the needs of the kids. SSC is part of school planning and how that budget is spent. If you want to be part of that leadership, it's fun, you get to talk to teachers, and you get the inside scoop on everything.

Next meeting is end of September

Q: Are there business partners? A: Yes fiscal partner, we were just assigned someone who will go over our budget.

Tips for making remote learning better

So much is hard about being a parent and navigating these waters. We want to use this as a productive time to help one another. This is not a time to complain about what is hard. If you had something hard and did something to fix it, share that. Keep it positive and supportive of one another.

- -1st grade son can't keep his hands off the screen. Touches everything. Now, every Zoom class I give him something to hold. Silly putty, beads, keychains, pipe cleaners.
- -K daughter I give her a piece of paper I'm a doodler and I listen well when I doodle. I give her one crayon and she doodles while she listens. Helps her stay in her seat and not run off every 5 minutes.
- -Talk to the teachers. Some things were really hard with our 2nd grader. A phone call with a teacher made everything better. Don't hesitate to reach out. She worked on helping me help him be more independent. We talked about ways the teacher could hold my child more accountable. Was also helpful to the teacher to know those things. Really helpful to me to troubleshoot on a microlevel. She was very approachable and helpful.
- -Echo that teachers have been really helpful. We have a really responsive and helpful faculty, reach out!
- -Ellen: how can the art program be more helpful?
- -K student. 1) One parent w/ older kids suggested we have him run around in the morning. 2) He was very shy and not into Zoom meetings. I stepped back from sitting right next to him, and now he's much more engaged and talks the whole time. Stepping back and letting him be him.
- -Echo that 1st grader has so much to share and the minute I show up he freezes. When I do my own work, I see a difference in how he engages. I also bribe and that works. Gummy bears go a long way in my house. He's into timing things, so we make it into a game.
- -Mr. Davis suggested introducing novelty. Maybe one week gummy bears, one day cuddly reading time, switch it up to keep it from getting repetitive.

- -Our son is better with not having his parents trying to teach him, but other people. What about a group where we tag team teaching each others' kids?
- -Drew: Agree, my kids respond better to other people. Dr. Clem is looking for volunteers. We've talked to teachers about this some teachers are more on board with this than others. Run the idea through your room parent.
- -Question: Why do parents need the same kind of clearance when doing remote volunteering as opposed to in person? A: Bureaucratic. Also need to make sure there are no registered sex offenders, something like that. What can parents do to get cleared? What are the steps? Kristel will send out an email with specific instructions. Live Scan is still possible at private facilities.
- -1st grader has been Facetiming with his grandparents. They do sight words, read together.
- -We put on some songs in the morning to dance to good day, beautiful day songs to dance to together. Gets her ready to start the day in a motivational way.
- -Reward your kid for the smallest things. I keep telling my son that I'm proud of him and it helps. Constantly affirm them.
- -Child thrives on a little competition. There's a reading app that has levels in it and it is very motivating achieving and comparing levels. Seems pretty good natured. Having benchmarks with bells and whistles is motivating. The levels are publicly posted. Not sure of the name of the app.
- -Short stories with 2 or 3 questions that validate what he reads has been really helpful for 1st grader.
- -Allowing some of the assignments to be done on paper helps them slow down, and also allows for parent to look at what they're working on.
- -For kinesthetic people writing notes as a learning tool

Welcome Parties

Lola Dvorak

Co-hosts for welcome parties typically have an incoming kindergartener and also an older kid, so have some depth of knowledge. Lola has set up about five parties on Zoom at different time slots. There are also some affinity groups – one for queer families; another for racial justice, that will be more like a working meeting.

Pod Spreadsheet and Community Support Page

There is a PPTG Spreadsheet for parents who are looking for a pod to connect. You can enter what you are looking for. Maybe by grade level, or maybe by where you live.

This is primarily about making a social bubble with other families and trying to swap and help out with childcare and some social time – to perhaps do school together. The spreadsheet is just a connecting place. A lot of pods are parent run, though some people are hiring support.

PPTG is supporting those who may need help hiring someone, scholarship money - confidential on the *community support page*, which is a place to express a need for help, and also offer help.

Front Porch Project

A family in each class will host pick up and drop off of class materials at the family's porch.

The use of this is very variable by teacher – some are active, and some are not.

Wear a mask and maintain distancing. Simply pick up your materials. No need to knock on door or get assistance from the host family.

Peralta Fund

Biggest fundraising drive of the year for money to support our school.

For example, shade structures for outdoor classrooms, and support for music, art, PE, mentors. As well as the financial support for pod/childcare support.

Goal is to have 80% participation of families donating.

The drive is starting this week, and will continue through the month.

BUDGET FY2020-2021

We need to pass a PPTG Budget; required as a non-profit organization.

Everyone here is a voting member (unlike PTAs).

(Drew shared the proposed budget on screen for all to review.)

Reminders about our income - Peralta Fund is our biggest source of income.

Due to the impact of the pandemic on our fundraising last school year, we may need to dip into reserves/savings.

With our spending, the focus is on people and staff.

Coach, Music (Eric Swihart, Jill Rogers, Ms. Bonnie – and new teacher, Rhonda Clark, working with kindergarteners).

Note there is no money budgeted to garden because in the past we've hired a garden teacher, and we aren't doing that this year.

Note that there is a separate fund, the Peralta Rising Fund (based on a prior donation), that may be used for structural improvements. Capital projects (like outdoor classrooms) and technology can be paid for from that fund.

The field trip money will hopefully be utilized in the spring. It has been popular with parents, and we'd like to continue to support that when it's possible to have field trips.

Mentors are the classroom aides. Drew is in touch with teachers to see how aides could be used to help the teachers even in distance learning. They'll be supporting students, but not on campus, so not as much of an expense. Kindergarten classes have their own aide; other classes share aides.

Earthquake and disaster preparedness line item (\$25K) – the scholarships and community support discussed earlier. Please help get the word out that this is available. It could be for childcare, or any support families need, including groceries, rent, etc. If there are needs, we want to know because we want all kids to feel supported and secure in school.

The Oakland Ed Fund applied for PPP federal support, which got us about \$17,000 for paying staff.

The Diversity/Unity program has a lower amount budgeted this year because it is usually used for events on campus. Last year we supported a Peralta family, and also used it as a donation to the Equity Fund. Overall, the idea with the proposed budget is that money is going into community support this year (the disaster preparedness community support program).

We will be having a separate fundraiser this year for the Equity Allies organization. Separate from Peralta Fund and PPTG Budget.

Question – Does the Garden Committee needs at least some money for planting? (Currently there are zero funds budgeted.)

The committee says they've looked into donations in the past, but it would be nice to have a small line item in the budget.

Kristel proposed an amendment to the proposed budget to include \$500 dollars for the Garden Committee. Seconded (Lola).

Question – how is PE funding being used this year?

We fund the position (Coach), but the school (Dr. Clem) decides how to utilize his time. We know that he has picked up a lot of outreach work, which isn't PE, but still supporting the school. We understand Coach will be jumping in to distance meetings for PE instruction with the classes.

Question from Drew - Are we comfortable planning for a \$40K loss, when our reserves are about \$70K? Opinions expressed - our estimates of income are conservative on purpose and we may exceed, hard to predict, but important to support the programs we value. Of any year, this seems to be the year to dip into reserves. These are emergency circumstances; this is the rainy day. Enthusiasm for supporting our community and focusing the budget on staff; we need to lean on each other now.

Question – Is there a role for Mr. Daniel in the proposed budget? Currently no, due to the first-grade teachers not requesting an aide, and communication challenges. If people are in touch with him, they can see what kind of involvement he may be interested in and explore pod support.

Question – Do we have to decide the budget for the whole year? Typically we pass a budget at the beginning of a school year. It's possible to continue to revisit it. We could plan to look at it again in December when we know what the spring will look like.

Voting through the chat function of Zoom. THE BUDGET PASSED.

OEA and OUSD Agreement

An email went to parents tonight, but it did not share details. We're not sure about what is in the agreement.

Support groups? Maybe by grade. Maybe once a month. Just an open forum for advice. "Parent Hacks" either to share in helpful ideas and/or share in our frustrations. Maybe the room parents could help with this. Also keep in mind the Konstella has a group function to speak informally.
