A Toolkit for Local League Outreach

<u>Elect Justice CA</u> is a non-partisan campaign designed to educate and empower California voters to make informed decisions this November about local candidates who have the power to directly impact the criminal justice system: District Attorneys, Judges, City Council Members, Mayors, and Sheriffs.

These officials make decisions that impact voters' daily lives, but local elections receive little media attention. Voters often cast their ballot without understanding candidates' platforms or the positions. It is critical that those who have the ability to vote elect candidates who will best serve and protect their community.

<u>ElectJusticeCA.org</u> will feature local candidate information from <u>VotersEdge.org</u>, where users can find personalized ballots by address. A plain-language job description for each of the elected offices is highlighted on the site.

Criminal Justice Reform is on the Ballot

#MeetYourMayor

Your mayor and city council are in charge of the day-to-day operations of your city. They have the power to spend your tax dollars on programs like criminal justice reform and public safety. But do you know the candidates competing to be your mayor? Meet them on <u>ElectJusticeCA.org</u>.

Judge

Judges are responsible for protecting the rights of people in the criminal justice system. Their everyday decisions can have important consequences for people in your community. And YOU get to elect them. Find out if there are candidates for judge on your ballot at ElectJusticeCA.org.

District Attorney

For November 2020, the only DA race is in Los Angeles County.

Your district attorney is one of the most powerful people in your county. They make important decisions like who deserves a jail or prison sentence, and who should instead be placed into a rehabilitation program. Criminal Justice Ballot Measures

There are 3 criminal justice ballot measures you get to vote on for the November Election!

- ★ Prop 17 would allow people who have completed their prison term to register to vote and vote in elections.
- ★ Prop 20 would undo parts of laws, passed over the past 10 years, that reduced punishments for people convicted of some nonviolent crimes.
- ★ Prop 25 is a referendum to decide whether or not to get rid of the cash bail system and replace it with a risk assessments system.

You can use this sample letter to the editor to share Elect Justice in your local newspaper. Excluding the italicized section at the bottom, the letter is 150 words.

- Determine how individuals are treated in the criminal justice system, and so much more.

And you get to choose them.

However, finding unbiased information about local candidates can be difficult. **That's why Elect Justice CA is such a crucial tool for voters.** This brand new website lets voters learn more about the power their local officials have to impact the criminal justice system and get information about the candidates running for those offices.

Candidate Forum Questions

District Attorney

- ★ What is your position on mandatory minimums such as three-strikes laws?
- ★ This year, Governor Newsom announced a plan to close the state's Division of Juvenile Justice. How would this impact your office's approach to charging and sentencing youth accused of committing crimes in your county?
- ★ What factors will you consider when making recommendations about cash bail for people accused of crimes?
- ★ How will you work with the police department to make sure your communities are safe? How would you respond to allegations of misconduct against local law enforcement?

Mayors and City Councils

- ★ With 8,000 people eligible for release from CA prisons to help reduce the transmission of COVID-19, how, if at all, would your office help these Californians and their families navigate reentry to the community?
- ★ This year, Governor Newsom announced a plan to close the Division of Juvenile Justice, diverting the care of these young people to the county. If elected, what would you do to ensure that the rehabilitative and developmental needs of system-impacted youth in your county continue to be met after this transition?
- ★ What kind of relationship do you envision you will have with local law enforcement as well as community members and organizations?
- ★ When it comes to budgeting, how will you allocate resources to keep your city and its residents safe?

Sheriffs (there are no contest for Sheriff, but this might be useful in the 2022 election cycle)

- ★ How, if at all, would you work to increase transparency and accountability of the Sheriff's Department's activities in jails to the Board of Supervisors and the system-impacted community at large?
- ★ What kind of use-of-force policies do you support? Which, if any, would you implement if elected?
- ★ To what extent would you coordinate with US Immigrations and Customs Enforcement?
- ★ What will you do to ensure everyone housed in county jails is treated appropriately?

Judges

- ★ What steps will you take to make sure your courtroom is free of bias?
- ★ Do you believe that all residents of your county—regardless of geography, race, gender, personal financial resources, age, or English language proficiency—have adequate access to legal help and the legal system? Why or why not?
- ★ Do you favor alternative, non-jail sentences for non-violent offenders? What sentencing options do you think should be available?
