Session Overview

Africa's health challenges are evolving rapidly, shaped by demographic shifts, technological advancement, climate change, and complex health system demands. While medical and health sciences training traditionally focuses on clinical competence, the continent now requires professionals who can do more than diagnose and treat.

Future health workers must be leaders, innovators, digitally literate professionals, and systems thinkers capable of transforming healthcare delivery in resource-constrained settings. However, gaps remain in leadership training, governance exposure, digital health competencies, AI literacy, and structured student engagement in decision-making spaces.

This panel seeks to move the conversation beyond clinical skills and explore how African institutions can intentionally prepare students for leadership, innovation, and digital transformation in healthcare.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this session, participants will be able to:

- Critically examine whether current health professions training in Africa adequately prepares students beyond clinical practice.
- Identify gaps in leadership development, innovation ecosystems, and digital literacy within medical education.
- Generate practical, student-driven recommendations for curriculum reform and institutional transformation.

Panel Discussion Questions

♦ Opening (set the tone)

1. “In one sentence—what is one skill African medical schools are still undertraining that will matter most in the next 10 years?”

♦ Leadership (move beyond theory)

2. Student leadership is often limited to associations and advocacy. What does clinical leadership look like for a young doctor in your context and where are we failing to prepare for it?

3. Can you share a moment where being ‘just a student’ either limited your impact or gave you unexpected power to lead change?”

♦ Innovation (ground it in Africa)

4. “We talk a lot about innovation, but most ideas don’t scale. What’s one student-led innovation from your region that actually worked and why?”

5. “Are we over-romanticizing innovation? In resource-limited settings, is the priority innovation—or fixing broken systems?”

♦ Digital literacy & AI (very current)

6. “AI tools like clinical decision support and diagnostic apps are already here. Are African medical schools preparing students to *use them critically—or just ignoring them?”

7. “What’s one digital tool you’ve personally used in your training that genuinely improved patient care or learning?”

8. “There’s a risk of digital colonialism where Africa adopts tools built elsewhere. How do we ensure African students are not just users, but creators?”

♦ Systems & inequity (important for LMIC framing)

9. “Across your regions, what’s the biggest mismatch between what you’re taught in medical school and the realities of your health system?”

10. “Do you think our curricula are preparing us to stay and build within African systems or to leave and adapt elsewhere?”

♦ **Cross-regional perspective (use the diversity)**

11. “What’s one thing your region is doing well in medical education that the rest of Africa should copy?”

12. “And what’s one thing your region is getting wrong?”

♦ **Future-focused close**

13. “If you could redesign African medical education from scratch, what is one thing you would remove and one thing you would add?”

14. “In 2035, what will define a ‘competent African doctor’ beyond clinical skills?”

♦ **Optional audience engagement (if time allows only)**

15. “For the students in this room - what is one skill you think you’ll need that your school is not teaching you?”
