source should be evaluated for its contribution, methodology, and limitations to build a solid academic argument.

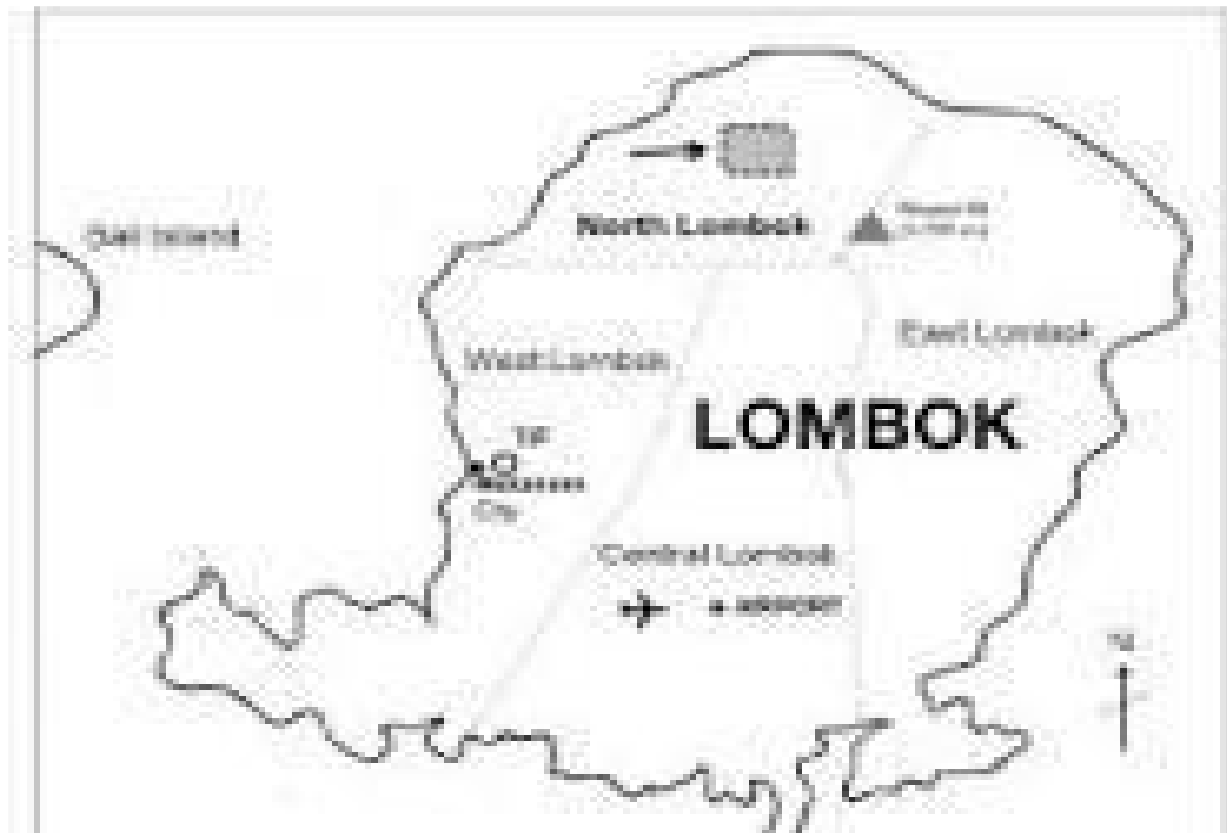


Figure 1. LOMBOK Island

It must not simply repeat earlier sections but instead synthesize the key insights that emerged from the study, highlighting how they answer the research questions or address the identified problem. This section should also reaffirm the significance and originality of the research contribution to theory, practice, or policy.

In addition, the conclusion may offer recommendations for practitioners, policymakers, or future researchers based on the study's results. It should also acknowledge any limitations that may have influenced the outcomes, ensuring academic transparency.
